Ex-officer sentenced to prison for assault

Improper, predatory, and illegal police conduct will not be tolerated. The vast majority of police officers are hard working law enforcers.

William Melendez, a former Inkster police officer, was sentenced last week to 13 months to 10 years for his assault on a motorist during a traffic stop in 2015.

Melendez, 47, was convicted by a jury Nov. 19 of assault with intent to do great bodily harm in the vicious beating of Floyd Dent of Detroit, along with a charge of misconduct in office. He was immediately remanded to jail following that verdict.

Wayne County Circuit Court Judge Vonda Evans sentenced Melendez Feb. 2 on the assault charge and also sentenced him

to 90 days in jail on the misconduct in office charge, with credit for time served at the Wayne County Jail since his conviction.

Evans' ruling did not seem to agree with sentencing guidelines which range from two years and five months to four years and nine months. Prosecutors had urged Evans, in a court memorandum, to

exceed the sentencing guidelines, as they said, the guidelines do not adequately reflect "the absolute betrayal of the trust and authority placed in the defendant to protect the community and uphold the laws of this state."

Melendez' attorney James Thomas asked the judge not to send his client to prison and

cited his actions as a police officer and in the military.

Evans, however, told Melendez in court that his conduct and the beating of Dent were "disgusting."

Wayne County Prosecutor Kym Worthy issued a prepared statement following the verdict stating, "Improper, predatory, and illegal police conduct will not be tolerated. The vast majority of police officers are hard working law enforcers. Former officer Melendez was not one of them."

Celebrate City plans month of Black History events

The event is co-organized by the Rev. Rita Talley and her daughter, Minister Tina Talley, in partnership with Romulus Community Schools, Romulus Ministerial Alliance and the City of Romulus.

The event took place at Romulus High School and a special black history program followed the dinner which is authentic Southern-style soul food. All the food at the dinner was prepared and cooked by local churches and volunteers.

Next week, at 6 p.m. Feb. 18, the library will screen The Great Detroit and filmmaker Anthony Brodgen will be available for a question and answer session with attendees.

Brodgen, a resident of Detroit, will share a positive story about the city, its people, and industries. He has been recognized by several organizations for his efforts in creating the film.

The event at Romulus Public Library will be an opportunity for the community of Romulus to be a part of sharing this positive outlook, officials noted.

Brodgen is currently working on and promoting his new film, *Business in the Black*. This film will examine the black business community in Detroit, starting with the height of the Black Bottom years through the 1990s. The film will also contain footage of recent interviews with people who are knowledgeable about the subject plus photos and narrative.

Township golf course contract is considered

Last week, a Billy Casper Golf sales team presented the members of the Plymouth Township Board of Trustees forecasts, charts, graphs, weather data and new management ideas in an effort to obtain renewal of a soon-to-expire, five-year management contract at the township golf course.

Hilltop Golf Course, a one-time source of revenues for Plymouth Township, currently shows a \$493,000 deficit and has operated at a financial loss for several years. The Billy Casper representatives showed operating deficits for 2013 and 2014 and a break-even financial report for 2015 operations.

The 18-hole, par-70 course located within the 80-acre McLumpha Park has been a

long-time bone of contention among residents and trustees, many of whom have questioned the continuance of the money-losing operation with so many privately-owned courses in the area. The township course opened in 1927.

An audit, titled Comprehensive Annual Financial Report, prepared by Plymouth Township Sept. 22, 2015, shows a liability in the

amount of \$500,000 for the golf course—an amount owed to the township general fund which is explained as, "the long-term advance from the General Fund to the Golf Fund is cover operations and debt payments..."

Billy Casper Golf, LLC, based in Reston, Va., took over the management contract at the golf course in 2011 from competing

Police academy applications now accepted

The Canton Police Department is now accepting applications for the next Citizens Police Academy for individuals who are interested in acquiring insight and knowledge about how the police department works.

Individuals attending the academy will learn about the policies and operational procedures of the department through presentations, demonstrations and hands-on activities. Students' personal knowledge about the role of law enforcement in the criminal jus-

tice system will be enhanced, as well as their understanding of the training and education required for police officers to effectively handle the challenges of police work.

"Academy participants will gain insight into the difficult challenges law enforcement personnel face on a daily basis through interesting and informative instruction," said Canton Public Safety Director Todd Mutchler.

The overall mission of the Citizens Police Academy is to

develop positive relationships between citizens and police officers, enhancing cooperation, understanding, and general good will.

"We recognize the value of transparency in police work, and believe in the age-old concept of the police are the public and the public are the police," said Mutchler.

"Last year, the department offered the first Citizens Police Academy in over 30 years and it was extremely well received by

participants," said Mutchler. "We appreciate the public's interest in our agency and look forward to the opportunity of providing this worthwhile, educational program to the citizens of our community."

Canton Police Department Citizens Police Academy will take place from 6:00 p.m. on Thursdays for six weeks, starting April 14 - May 19, with one Saturday morning session on May 7.

Class size is limited for this free program. Applicants must be residents of Canton Township, be

21 or older; have no felony convictions, and no misdemeanor convictions in the past 3 years and will be subject to a background check.

Arrest made in bank robbery

Canton Township police have arrested a 26-year-old man in the armed robbery of the Citizens Bank Jan. 14.

Damon Ross Davis, Jr. of Canton was arraigned in 35th District Court following the police investigation of the attempted robbery which included assistance from the Michigan State Police and the Western Wayne Community Response Team, a multi-jurisdictional task force that provides resources to participating agencies working large cases.

Davis is charged with one count of bank robbery and one count of robbery, armed which are both punishable by life in prison or a term of years.

Chief Judge Michael J. Geron set Davis' bond at \$1 million or 10 percent and scheduled his preliminary court examination on the charges for Feb. 19.

The bank, located on the corner of Ford and Hagerty roads in Canton, provided surveillance camera video to police to aid in the investigation. The robber can be seen on the tape entering the bank and presenting a note to a teller demanding cash and a vehicle. The teller refused to comply and the suspect exited the bank, removing his mask and heading south on foot, according to police reports.

No weapons were visible, police said, and no injuries were reported in the incident.

Township water is safe

Officials in Canton Township have issued a statement assuring all residents that the drinking water in the community is safe and that they "take the safety of our water supply system very seriously."

In a prepared statement, the officials said that each year, Canton issues a Consumer Confidence Report (CCR) that gives a detailed analysis about where the water in Canton comes from and the treatment process the water goes through. The report also provides consumers with detailed information about the quality of their drinking water. The 2014 report as well as all reports dating back to 2008 can

be found at www.canton-mi.gov/210PublicWorks.

"Canton's water is tested for lead every three years, the last tests were taken in 2014 and showed no detection of lead," the statement continued. "While it is not uncommon for many older communities to use lead piping for water services, Canton's infrastructure does not contain any lead services," the prepared release stated.

The 2015 Consumer Confidence Report will be posted to the township website in June. Questions can be referred to the Canton Division of Public Works at (734) 397-1011.

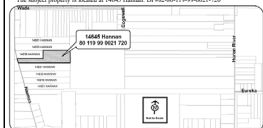

Golf course contract considered by trustees

American Golf Corporation. Casper manages all aspects of the business including property and financial management, marketing, staffing, training and clubhouse operations. When the contract was approved, township officials approved \$120,000 to improve the Hilltop facility and attract more business. Since 2011, the course has continued to operate at loss under the Billy Casper management agreement, with the exception of the 2015 report which claims the course "broke even" with the \$200,000 subsidy from the general fund.

Billy Casper's Regional Director Nick Bodnar said, "I don't think it's a secret that golf courses post-recession have struggled."

Many disillusioned golfers, some of whom posted comments about the Hilltop course on golf websites say tee-times are often over-booked.

"I hate the worst course I've ever been to. I have any other course that packs people in for more money," said one disgruntled player in a post. "The course layout was

atrocious, too hilly, tree roots on the cart paths everywhere," said another.

Trustee Bob Doroszewitz said he felt there were, "Too many holes on too little land."

Many residents who voiced their concerns said they objected to the township's rampant investments for recreation and think the golf course is an unnecessary and poor business investment; none however said they would want the land developed with homes, condominiums or businesses, if the golf course were to be eliminated.

Bodnar said the company goal for 2016 is to increase sales growth with the number of rounds, citing that if they can get 28,000 rounds it would produce revenue of \$642,000, facilitating another break-even point.

Doroszewitz told Bodnar, "Rounds may go up but revenue doesn't necessarily go up," and told the sales team he was "pretty disappointed" with their performance, complaining that sales and status reports have been absent for years and phone calls are not returned. Further discussion indicated that Billy Casper LLC had been

sending the reports to Township Treasurer Ron Edwards and later to Parks Director Mike Mitchell and neither had shared the information with the trustees.

Trustee Chuck Curren wanted to know what was on Billy Casper's list of improvements. Bodnar said the improvements would include maintenance to the cart-paths or building new cart paths.

Supervisor Shannon Price said that in the review of the golf course operations, officials are also looking into the feasibility of building a new banquet-hall restaurant facility, "like the one located at Idyl Wyld Golf Course on Five Mile Road in Livonia."

"This is something Ron (Edwards) has always wanted, in fact at one time he thought about mising the roof on the clubhouse," Price said later.

Price said the most desirable area for a new facility would be in the triangle, a section

bordered by Beck Road to the west, Powell Road (service drive) to the north and Ann Arbor Trail to the south.

Hilltop is exempt from property tax as the land is public. If Hilltop were taxable the added tax burden to the operation could be as much as \$40,000 annually according to people familiar with land assessments.

In contrast, just four miles from Hilltop and still within township borders is The Inn at St. John, located at Five Mile and Shadeland Road. That facility pays more than \$400,000 annually in real estate tax.

"We'd have a third party developer who'd pay for it...build it and run it," Price said of the proposed new banquet facility; although he did not identify any interested developer.

Township trustees are expected to vote on the contract with Billy Casper next week during the regular meeting.

Computer crime fighter Wayne-Westland police using new software to report incidents

Most police departments lack the tools to determine if their training, equipment, techniques and policies are effective. Soon this will no longer be the case for both the Wayne and Westland police departments.

Both departments are implementing Force LMS (Liability Management Solution), a new software program that will allow them to make informed decisions to increase citizen and officer safety and decrease liability.

Force Liability Management Solution was developed by AM Data Service, a software development and IT managed service company, in concert with Center Mass, a law enforcement training organization owned by Jeff Felts, a retired Wayne police officer. Both companies are located in Livonia.

The developers recently donated Force LMS to the Wayne Police Department, which includes installation and configuration in addition to maintenance for five years. Police Chief Alan Maciag invited them to present a system overview at a Police Community Meeting earlier this month at the Wayne Police Department.

"I believe in transparency and this is part of that," Maciag said. "We need to show the public what's going on. In these tough times we're productive and getting things done but we need to do things differently."

Currently the department uses paper forms to document and report training, uses of force and pursuits. With Force LMS, they will enter this information into an automated system. Supervisors can review and approve information in this same system instead of moving paper around the precinct.

"So here's part of the problem," Felts, a Canton Township resident, said. "In most police departments, it goes like this: We've got three boxes. These are where all our

training files are kept. One box is for use of force incidents, one box is for training, one box is for pursuits. How many pursuits do you think don't end in some sort of use of force? The bad guy is running because he doesn't want to go to jail. They generally just don't give up and say, 'OK, you got me.' Either they're going to keep running and fight when they get out or they're going to fight when you chase them down. They don't want to go to jail."

"But use of force generally is not associated with driving and pursuits. This training officer over here isn't talking to this training officer over here. None of them really communicate or share the information, even in a small police department. And that's one of the major problems. We're going to change that... with this program."

Felts guarantees Force LMS will lead to changes in the way the department polices the City of Wayne.

"They're going to see the things they're doing aren't actually the best things to be doing and they'll be able to make the changes they need to make for all the reasons we're talking about: the officer's safety, your safety, community support and, most of all, transparency," he said.

Police agencies are generally slow to change or evolve their training, equipment and policies simply because they don't have the information required to validate what is working and what isn't.

"The only time training really changes mandatorily in police work is when an employee does such an egregious act that you have to change it because it cannot happen again," Felts said. "That's one way training changes, that's one way policy changes. The other time that happens is when the laws actually change and the law forces us. The other time it happens is through lawsuits, whether it's directly against us or if it's case law established out

there that says we need to do this or that.

"A lot of places don't listen to the case law until it rears up and bites them in the rear end. So we repeat. This is the problem, folks. And we repeat it because we assume that what we're doing - our training, our policy and our equipment - are the absolute best means to an end or we wouldn't have that. Nobody's trying to be sly or anything like that, we just haven't taken the time to see what actually works and

what really doesn't work. And the only way you can do that is through reviewing effectiveness to every use of force officers deploy."

Force LMS tracks every use of force, including suspects' demographics; where it happened and under which conditions; which technique departments are using most and how effective each technique is.

During the trial, the jury was shown a police patrol car video of the traffic stop which took place in January of 2015. The video showed Melendez holding Dent down on the ground in what appeared to be a choke hold with one arm while repeatedly striking him in the head with his closed fist. The videotape records Melendez forcefully striking Dent 16 times with his fist and another officer kicking Dent while Melendez is striking him.

The case and the videotape were repeatedly featured on both local and national news programs.

Prosecutors, in urging a more severe sentence, wrote, "The defendant's actions have been a severe detrimental impact on both the police community and the community at large."

Melendez was immediately fired by Inkster when the videotape was released to the media by Dent's attorney and Inkster District Court Judge Sabrina Johnson dropped the charges of resisting arrest and obstructing officers leveled against Dent when she viewed the tape. When Worthly saw the tape, which was not included by Inkster police in their request for a warrant against Dent on charges of resisting arrest and drug possession, she refused to prosecute and strongly criticized the conduct of the officers who sent the request to her office without the tape.

Prosecutors said that Dent, a longtime Ford Motor Co. employee, still suffers from post-traumatic stress disorder and that Melendez "lied in a police

report, repeatedly committed perjury, including in a search warrant and perhaps planted evidence in Mr. Dent's vehicle."

Conflicting interpretations of the tape show Melendez at the rear of Dent's Cadillac, where it appears he could be removing something from his pocket, and then announcing that he has found a packet of cocaine in the vehicle.

Dent admitted that he had run a stop sign, which triggered the original traffic stop "in an area known for drug trafficking," according to the original police report. He also admitted he was driving on a suspended license at the time but vehemently denied any drug use or possession at the time of the incident and also denied any attempt to flee from or resist the officers.

Two other Inkster officers at the scene were disciplined as a result of the videotape but were not criminally charged.

Dent was hospitalized for his injuries for two days. He subsequently reached a financial settlement with the city for \$1.37 million last year.

Evans said from the bench that she knew Dent would give back "every dime" of the settlement to return to his life prior to the incident.

"I wonder: What would one-half of that \$1.4 million settlement awarded to Mr. Dent have done for the Inkster Police Department, training officers that wanted to serve and not baring officers that didn't belong?" the judge said.

Melendez was immediately returned to the Wayne County Jail where he has been segregated from the general inmate population. He will be transferred to an as yet undetermined state prison to begin his sentence.

Homicide suspect sought

Investigators from the Michigan State Police are seeking the help of the public in identifying the killer of an Inkster man last week.

According to police reports, Detectives assigned to the Michigan State Police special investigation Section responded to reports of a shooting at 1390 S. Feb. 1 in the area of Magnolia near Center Street in Inkster.

The responding officers deter-

mined that the victim, James Ngoc Nguyen, 53, was sitting in his parked car when he was shot by an assailant. Nguyen was immediately transported to a local hospital from the scene and was pronounced dead on arrival at the medical facility.

Police said that witnesses have described the shooter as a 30-year-old light-skinned black man about 5-foot, 7-inches tall. The suspect was reportedly wearing a dark gray hooded zip-

pered jacket, dark-colored jeans and "timberland" type shoes.

Police said that the victim's next of kin have been notified of his death and that the shooting remains an active investigation. Detectives have urged anyone who may have witnessed the incident or have any information about the shooter to contact the Michigan State Police Special Investigation Section at (734) 287-5000 or Crime Stoppers at 800-SPEAK UP.

what unit and which officers use force most often.

"For pursuits, it tracks the average speed, time and distance traveled before pursuits end; most successful technique to end pursuits; number ending in crashes and injuries and how often pursued drivers are initiated.

All training is documented, cataloged and sorted into granular detail including hours, subjects, instructor, rounds fired and with which weapons.

"I love it," said Wayne resident Nita Wright after the Force LMS presentation. "I think that's phenomenal to have that information at your fingertips. I like the analogy of running a police department like a business."

Nancy Price saw value in the heightened transparency and accountability Force LMS pro-

vides. "It will be difficult for police officers to fudge what happens," she said. "It's a good way to monitor who's doing what."

Force LMS launched on Jan. 15. It's already used by several police departments across the country, including Ypsilanti, Gadsden, AL and Live Oak, TX. The Westland Police Department received approval from the members of the city council to purchase the software at a meeting earlier this month.

Angry parents question school board

The largest crowd in two decades appeared at the Jan. 25 meeting of the Van Buren Public Schools Board of Education to criticize both the superintendent of schools and the high school principal's recent handling of a student found with a handgun.

Parents were also vocal about the determination of the Michigan State Board of Education that cheating took place during M-STEP testing at Savage Elementary School that resulted in the suspension of five teachers.

Richard Ryman acted as the spokesperson for a number of parents at the meeting who he said were afraid to speak to the board members publicly for fear of retribution. He said that since Michael Van Tassel became superintendent of schools, 164 teachers have left the district and

said there is now a hostile working environment in the schools.

He added the board members for an independent investigation of the schools regarding the working environment. He also criticized the dismissal of the five Savage teachers, who, he said, were walked out of the building during school hours when students were in class.

Board member Sherry Prater said that the board members had no knowledge of the teachers being walked out of the school. Members of the audience responded that Director of Curriculum Jeff Moore knew of the situation.

Board President Brent Mikulski asked, through a written statement he read, that no employees be named at the board meeting and that names not be used regarding the testing

at Savage or the student with the gun at the high school.

Parents said they were upset and concerned when both Van Tassel and Belleville High School principal Abdul Maymun did not notify them of the student found at the high school with the gun on Jan. 15. A 14-year-old was expelled by administrators at the school with an unloaded gun and live ammunition in a backpack. Parents were not notified of the incident until it was reported on WDIV TV news Jan. 22, a week after the fact.

Van Tassel subsequently addressed the situation on the district website and agreed that while the correct procedures in handling the situation, which ultimately saw the student expelled, the district had failed in notifying parents. He also addressed the cheating allegations on the website, but has made no other public comment on either situation.

Ryman told the board emphatically that when the student thought about bringing a gun to school he endangered the

students. "When he entered that building with a gun, he endangered all the students."

Ryman also told the board members that all the information regarding the investigation into the M-STEP testing was not provided to them. He said students were questioned by investigators several times and asked questions in various ways and many of the children were confused and upset and could have provided incorrect answers to the questions.

"This is setting the board up for a lawsuit," Ryman said. "The entire investigation is in jeopardy because of the way it was handled."

Van Tassel did not speak during the meeting and has refused to speak or make any comment to the media regarding the situation.
