Veterans monument to be moved, restored

The Veterans Memorial in Romulus will soon be coming down, but it will return and be better than it was before.

Officials in the City of Romulus said the memorial will be temporarily removed and put in storage to make way for the construction of a new courthouse for the 34th District Court, which will be located on the municipal campus at Wayne and Goddard roads.

"We didn't want to damage it during the construction," said Robert McCraight, director of the Romulus Building Department.

City and court officials agreed last year that it would be more cost effective to construct

a new, larger courthouse than it would be to refurbish and expand the existing one. That project, set to begin this year, will cost about \$14 million and be paid for through fees generated at the court-not city taxpayer.

Officials discussed the timeline for the project earlier this month, and the plans for the wall, as well.

original integrity of the monument and enhance it," said Romulus Mayor Leroy Burreroff. "We are committed to honoring and respecting our veterans."

McCraight said the plan was to preserve the original bricks with the names of veterans on them and replace them when the monument is reconstructed after the court project. The wall would be expanded, allowing room for additional nameplates,

too. If for any reason the bricks were damaged during the process, they would be replaced with new ones.

That portion of the court process, not discussed publicly prior to the meeting last week, drew some concern from veterans groups and supporters, as well as residents who had donated to have families members memorialized there.

"This is a very sensitive issue for all of us," said Jan Lemmon. "It's like sacred ground."

"I understand the need for a new courthouse, but this is a sensitive issue for me," added Councilman William

Cool class Students take virtual trip to Antarctica

Second grade students at Walker-Winter Elementary School took a virtual trip to Antarctica recently, all to pursue their study of penguins.

"The Antarctica Penguin Project was amazing, and the students seemed to enjoy every part," said teacher Chris Kozaczynski, who led the program.

First, the students took a trip to the Detroit Zoo and were able to visit and talk with zoo staff members at various exhibits. The main attraction for the students was the Polk Penguin Conservation Center where they were able to see the penguins up close and ask questions.

Following their visit to the Detroit Zoo, students continued their research and slideshows included pictures from the zoo, penguin facts from their research, and highlights from a Skype visit with a research scientist.

Jean Pennycook, a research scientist who is stationed at Cape Royds, Antarctica studying the Adelle penguins, visited with the students during a Skype call. During that call, students were able to ask questions about the penguins and what it was like to be in Antarctica for two months in such a small tent.

Pennycook also invited the class to name a pair of penguins that researchers were studying. The class voted for "Oreo and Cookie" for the penguin pair who were tending to a nest of eggs.

The students could then check each day online to see the progress of the eggs and see which penguin was guarding the nest while the other was out for food.

The students also designed and addressed postcards which were sent to Pennycook who then sent them back to the students with the Antarctica postmark.

Prior to the Skype call, the class worked with high school students in the graphic

design program, taught by Mark Benglian at the William D. Ford Career/Technical Center to design a flag. After several designs and a very close vote, a design was chosen. Jean Glenn High School student Emma O'Brien completed the flag and the students sent it to Antarctica to be flown at the research station.

The students could see their flag flying

when they made their virtual visit to the research station. After the flag was returned, the students invited O'Brien to speak to the class about the process and technology used to design the flag.

"The second graders put an incredible amount of effort in this project. I am so very proud of what they have accomplished and learned," said Kozaczynski.

Indoor Farmers Market offered at Summit

Spring is arriving early in Canton Township where three indoor Farmers Markets have been planned.

Food vendors, artists, musical entertainment and children's crafts will all be available at the off-season market for 10 a.m. until 2 p.m. Feb. 25 in the banquet lobby in the Summit on the Park building. Indoor markets are set for March 25 and April 22, in addition to the February date.

"Preparations are well under way for our off-season Farmers Markets that will provide a fun destination for families and individuals who value healthy, local food options," said Canton Farmers Market Coordinator Sherree Buckman. "Our goal is to create a unique shopping experience for our market-goers, while supporting our local farmers and producers and expanding access to fresh, healthy food sources."

In addition to more than a dozen food vendors, several artisan vendors will be onsite, including Minty Creations (featuring Michigan-themed items such as pillows and metal works, recycled sweaters, plus mittens, scarves, and headbands), and Bitts & Bitts (featuring up-cycled vintage, books, tin, cigar boxes, plus household items made into lamps). AnNatureShoe will also be onsite selling shoe body booter and lotions, sugar scrubs, lip balms, and

more.

Additional activities will be available during the Feb. 25 Off Season Market, including a free kids' craft, where children of all ages can make their own stress relief balloon. Musical entertainment will also be provided by Ryan Brake. Market-goers may also pick up a tasty lunch from this month's featured food truck, Hero or Villain, which will be onsite offering sandwiches and more.

A variety of local food growers and producers have signed on to participate in the off-season markets, too, including: Cheesecakes, Etc. (featuring cheesecakes and various baked goods); Good Times Kettle Corn; Holy Cannolis (featuring cassata cupcakes, baklava, Italian cookies, plus gluten free lemon Alfy Flams (featuring pork and chicken cuts, bacon, sausage, brats, Canadian bacon); Lula Bre's Sweet Eats (featuring artisan jams/jellies, hot fudge sauce, handmade fudge); Boblin House; Goose-neck Coffee Co.; The Pasta Shop (featuring fresh, dry pasta, frozen sauce); Simply Gourmet Fresh (featuring salsa, tortilla chips, queso dip, tamales, burritos, gourmet butters); Spice Grrl (featuring various spices/herbs); The Cheese Place; Detroit Gourmet Nut Co. (featuring maple walnuts, pecans and cashews); Kapnick



Orchards (featuring apples, apple cider, apple butter, nut butters, pies, donuts, breads, breakfast items, fudge, frozen blueberries, winter squash); Pick Michigan (featuring chicken/duck eggs, homemade corn and flour tortillas, seasonal produce, herbs, and fruit); Prochaska Farms (featuring hoop house produce); and Jalapeño (featuring jalapeño and jalapeño poppers).

During this indoor market, Bridge Card and Double Up Food Bucks transactions will also be accepted. Tokens may be purchased at the Canton Leisure Services table. Market-goers can also visit with Summit on the Park health and wellness personal trainers to get answers to essential training questions.

Plenty of parking is typically available toward the back of the Summit parking lot. Market-goers are encouraged to enter through the banquet doors.

Hours for the new season of the outdoor Canton Farmers Market will be from 9 a.m. until 1 p.m. beginning Sunday, May 13, and continuing run every Sunday through Oct. 14 in Preservation Park, located at 500 N. Ridge Road, Canton.

Veterans' dormitory project awarded \$5,350 in grant funds

The Partnership for the Arts & Humanities in Canton Township has been awarded \$5,350 to support the restoration of the Cherry Hill Veterans' Dormitory built by Henry Ford in the 1940s to house disabled World War II veterans.

The grant was awarded by the MotorCities National Heritage Area, a non-profit organization dedicated to the historic preservation

of the automotive industry. The organization awarded more than \$60,000 to various groups telling the story of how "We put the world on wheels" to launch the 2018 Challenge Grant cycle.

"MotorCities, now in its 20th year, is proud to continue to support such a varied selection of projects which support our rich automotive and labor heritage and its influence on our communities," said Shawn Pomaville-Size, MotorCities executive director, of the 10 projects which received grant funding this year.

In addition, MotorCities has launched Phase 2 of the Challenge Grant program with \$40,000 available for projects. Grants can cover up to 20 percent of total costs for eligible initiatives. Projects can include brick-and-mortar restoration and revitalization, educational outreach, exhibit creation and much more.

Non-profit organizations, government entities and educational institutions that are member organizations are all eligible to apply. Forms are available at www.motorcities.org/grants.

The deadline for 2018 grant submissions is Feb. 28. The MotorCities Challenge

Grant program has been funding historical and cultural preservation projects in Michigan since 1998 when Congress enacted the Automobile National Heritage Area Act. Since that time, MotorCities, an affiliate of the National Park Service and the only National Heritage Area in the state, has awarded \$1.4 million in grant monies to hundreds of projects.

Hilltop meetings planned

The committee met Feb. 6 and will meet again at 7 p.m. Feb. 14 at the Hilltop Golf Course Club House.

The meetings are open to the public and this meeting will include representatives of Bitts Casper Golf. More than a dozen residents attended the first meeting to offer their opinions to the committee members.

Future meetings are set for 7 p.m. March 6, March 20, April 3, April 17 and May 1, all at Plymouth Township Hall.

CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF CANTON ACCESS TO PUBLIC MEETINGS

The Charter Township of Canton will provide reasonable auxiliary aids and services to individuals with disabilities at the meeting/hearing upon notice to the Charter Township of Canton.

In accordance with the requirements of Title II of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 ("ADA"), the Charter Township of Canton will not discriminate against qualified individuals with disabilities on the basis of disability in its services, programs, or activities.

Canton Center Road, Canton, MI 48103, (734) 394-5200 as soon as possible but no later than 48 hours before the scheduled event.

The ADA does not require the Charter Township of Canton to take any action that would fundamentally alter the nature of its programs or services, or impose an undue burden or administrative burden.

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ORDINANCE NO. 2018-003 CITY OF ROMULUS APPENDIX A - ZONING AMENDMENT 1.241

An Ordinance to amend the Official Zoning Map of the City of Romulus by conditionally rezoning certain property from C-2, General Business District to C-3, Highway Business District.

THE CITY OF ROMULUS ORDINANCES:

SHORT TITLE: This Ordinance shall be known and cited as the Amended Zoning Ordinance.

SECTION 2: **Securing.** Should any word, sentence, phrase or any portion of this ordinance be held in any manner invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction or by any state agency having authority to do so for any reason whatsoever, each holding shall be construed and limited to such words, sentence, phrase, or any portion of the ordinance held to be so invalid and shall not be construed as affecting the validity of any of the remaining words, sentences, phrases or portions of this ordinance.

SECTION 3: **Conflicting Ordinances.** All prior existing ordinances adopted by the City of Romulus inconsistent or in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance are, to the extent of such conflict or inconsistency hereby expressly repealed.

SECTION 4: **Effective Date.** This ordinance shall take effect upon publication thereof in an official newspaper, which publication shall be made when the minutes passing the ordinance are published subject to revocation at will of the City of Romulus at any time.

Diabetes classes available at local clinic

Beaumont Health now offers diabetes programs and services throughout Metro Detroit for people interested in preventing type 2 diabetes or improving the self-management of their diabetes. Locally, the programs are offered in Inkster and the City of Wayne.

"Managing a chronic condition like diabetes can feel overwhelming at times. Having to watch what you eat, stay active, take your meds and check your blood sugar can be challenging," said Betty Priskorn, vice president, Beaumont Community Health and Outreach. "I see the people who attend our diabetes sessions as heroes because they are working hard to find the strength, knowledge and motivation to persevere and endure in spite of health obstacles."

Beaumont diabetes programs and services are offered free to qualified participants.

The Diabetes Prevention Program is for those who want to avoid type 2 diabetes. The research-based focus is on lifestyle changes, such as healthy eating and physical activity, as well as problem solving and coping skills. It's proven to be twice as effective as medication alone for preventing type 2 diabetes. Led by certified instructors, participants attend 16 weekly sessions, followed by monthly maintenance sessions. The Ford Motor Co. Fund and Beaumont Foundation sponsor this program.

The Diabetes-PATH, or Personal Action Toward Health, Program provides the skills and tools needed by people living with type 2 diabetes and those who make up their support team. Participants learn problem-solving techniques, ways to communicate better with their health care team, balancing blood sugar

and improving overall health and energy level. Certified instructors lead the six weekly sessions. This program is provided in partnership with the National Kidney Foundation of Michigan, The Senior Alliance and the Area Agency on Aging 1-B.

Cooking Matters EXTRA for Diabetes provides specialized recipes and information for adults living with diabetes and their caregivers. A hands-on workshop, discussions include the nutrition-health link, the affordability of healthy eating, healthy meal planning and cooking tips. Free groceries and cookbooks are included to practice new skills at home. This six-week program is led by trained culinary instructors and a registered dietitian and is sponsored by a Ford Motor Co. Fund grant, the Beaumont Foundation and Gleasons Food Bank.

"Type 2 diabetes is a largely

preventable disease, which can be kept at bay through healthy eating and moderate exercise. We teach those at risk, and those diagnosed, to tweak their diet and make other healthy changes," said Alicia Jackson, Ph.D., manager, Diabetes Program, Beaumont Community

Health and Outreach. "To help people transform their lives and attain healthy goals is so uplifting."

Down on the Farm Maybury Camp registration open
