Threat of emergency manager looms in Wayne

The City of Wayne will formally contact the Michigan Office of Fiscal Responsibility for assistance in facing the \$1 million budget shortfall this year.

Financial consultant Vince Pastue told the members of the city council last week that Wayne "clearly has the makings of a financial emergency" in recommending taking this interim step prior to seeking an emergency financial manager appointed by the governor. Pastue, hired earlier this year to help analyze and prepare the city budget, is the city manager in Farmington.

Long term it will require hard decisions. You need more revenue to make thoughtful decisions. It's pretty hopeless without more revenue. It's that bad.

He told the council members that the city "will have a negative fund balance at the end of the fiscal year. Some of your assumptions in the budget did not happen. You need to take steps to address that."

Pastue said necessary actions would include ending the internal transfers to the general fund. "Enterprise and service funds were used to prop up the general fund—in excess of \$3 million with revenues of \$14 million."

He said the city would have to "take pretty dramatic steps for the rest of the fiscal year" which ends in June. He suggested more employee layoffs, wage and benefit reductions and other cuts in

He added that he was not optimistic about property tax revenue increasing for the city. He said the city had experienced a greater loss in property values and therefore a much greater loss in tax revenue than some other communi-

Hometown Hero

Family donates \$5,000 to Goodfellows in memory of Air Force Colonel

The Romulus Goodfellows recently received one of the largest donations in the history of the organization.

A \$5,000 donation was made by the family of the late retired Air Force Colonel Douglas C. Roach, who passed away from complications of cancer on Jan. 11, 2013.

Col. Roach was featured as a Romulus "Hometown Hero" in the 2013 program guide to the 16th annual Romulus DDA Pumpkin Festival, published September. A story told of Col. Roach's heroics as "an important Air Force advocate as a staffer with the House Armed Services Committee" and as a one-time Thunderbirds air demonstration

"Doug was a patriot who embodied Air Force core values, and his loss will be felt for years to come," said Tony Reardon, deputy director and legislative liaison of the Office of the Secretary of the Air Force in Washington DC.

The story, placed in the Pumpkin Festival guide by Romulus resident Sheldon Chandler, came to the attention of fellow resident Elsie Russell, who knew Col. Roach and his family. Her daughter, Pam, forwarded the book to Col. Roach's brother, L.

Jarmin Roach, living in Newport Beach, California.

Jarmin Roach was so moved by the story that he wrote a \$5,000 check to the Goodfellows and mailed it to Russell, who presented the donation to Mayor LeRoy D. Burcroff.

"He was so touched by how Romulus had recognized the family and his loved ones," Burcroff said. "He remembered how his dad, Leo, sold Goodfellows papers on the corner as a way to raise money to help Romulus families in need. What better way to say 'thank you' than to make a donation to the Goodfellows?"

The late Leo Roach also was mentioned in the story about his son. Russell said the Roach family lived on Bibbins Street across from the Romulus Police Station and that Mr. Roach served as president of the Romulus State Bank, now a branch of Comerica Bank. The mayor's late father, Dean, also knew Leo Roach and did business with him at the bank.

The Roach children - Doug, Jarmin and Mary Ann - all graduated from Romulus High School. Russell was in Jarmin's graduating class. After moving to California, she said, Jarmin became a successful interior decorator in





When Col. Roach died, Russell said she sent a sympathy card to Jarmin, who mailed her information about his late brother. The two-way communication continued with the eventual mailing of the Pumpkin Festival and then the \$5,000 check, which was a pleasant

"We kept in touch all the time," Russell said. "When he saw the story on Doug, he was thrilled. He saw the map in the magazine and remembered the streets. He said he looked at that magazine for

Romulus to reopen parks with federal grant funds

The City of Romulus took steps last week to start to restore the parks within the community.

The city earmarked the bulk of the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds for the 2014/2014 fiscal year to restore some park facilities and hire three employees to help maintain them.

In total, the city will spend about \$17,741 to restore baseball fields, basketball courts and play equipment at qualifying parks and about \$81,000 to hire a full-time

and two part-time recreation employees. The Community Development Block Grant program is a federal one administered through Wayne County; the money must be spent in low

income areas of the community.

Also, the city will spend about \$36,000 at the Thomas J. Coleman Center on Beverly Road, the home of the American Progressive Association. Those funds will pay for a new play structure, a 16 by 20-foot wooden pavilion, five picnic tables and some interior repairs, according to Bronson Bell, president of the

on DeHoCo property set for next month **Court hearing**

The legal battle regarding the land erroneously sold to Plymouth Township in a Wayne County foreclosure sale is not over.

The township paid \$606,150 in 2011 for two parcels of land totaling 323 acres being foreclosed and sold by Wayne County for back taxes. According to an affidavit filed by attorneys for the City of Detroit Jan. 9, 2013, the 190-acre parcel of the former Detroit House

of Corrections property bordered by Napier, Five Mile, Beck and Ridge roads still belonged to the City of Detroit and as such was exempt from any sale for back

The Detroit suit was filed April 5, 2013 and amended April 18. Detroit contends that following the 2006 sale of 133 acres on the eastern-most part of the 323-acre site to Demco 54 LLC, a property

transfer affidavit was filed and a property split approved that should have indicated Detroit had kept the remaining 190 acres. It states that state law, and specifically the State Tax Commission, forbid the foreclosure of property owned by a city.

In November, attorneys for the City of Detroit were forced to withdraw their request for a hearing in Wayne County Circuit Court regarding the lawsuit filed against Plymouth Township and Wayne County demanding the return of the land. The withdrawal was based on the relationship of Plymouth Township with the law firm Miller-Canfield, the same firm chosen by the City of Detroit officials to represent the municipality in the city bankruptcy filing.

ORDINANCE AMENDMENT ARTICLE I. IN GENERAL. Sec. 14-1. - Definitions. The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this chapter, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning: ***Dangerous or vicious dog shall mean any dog that is exposed to rabies, or any dog that is capable of inflicting death or serious injury on a person or domesticated animal and that: (a)Has, without provocation, attacked or bitten a person engaged in lawful activities; (b)Has left the property of its owner and, without provocation, killed or seriously injured another animal; (c)Has, without provocation, chased, confronted or approached a person on the street, sidewalk, or public property in a menacing fashion that would put a reasonably prudent person in fear of an attack; (d)Has exhibited a propensity, tendency, or disposition to attack, cause injury, or threaten the safety of persons or other domesticated animals without provocation; or (e)Has acted in a manner that causes or should cause its owner to know that it is potentially vicious and/or dangerous. No dog shall be declared "dangerous" for any of the following reasons alone: (a)If the dog was protecting or defending a person within the immediate vicinity of the dog from attack or assault; (b) If at the time another person was committing a crime or offense upon the property of the owner, or custodian, of the dog; (c) If the person was teasing, tormenting, abusing, or assaulting the dog, or in the past had teased, tormented, abused, or assaulted the dog, (d)If the dog was attacked or menaced by another domestic animal, or the other domestic animal was on the property of the owner, or custodian, of the dog; (e) If the dog was responding to pain or injury, or protecting itself, its kennel, or its offspring; (f)If a person or other domestic animal was disturbing the dog's natural functions, such as sleeping or eating; (g)Neither growling or barking, nor both, shall alone constitute grounds upon which to find a dog "dangerous." ARTICLE III. DANGEROUS OR VICIOUS AND WILD ANIMALS. Sec. 14-91. Dangerous animals prohibited. Except as otherwise permitted in this chapter, no person shall own or keep, harbor, breed, exchange or buy a dangerous aninal, including a dangerous or vicious dog, or wild or exotic animal in the township. Sec. 14-92. Vicious or dangerous dogs. (a) The owner of a vicious dog must: (1)Be eighteen (18) years of age or older; (2)Have such dog tattooed, registered and licensed with the town ship, (3)Provide information including the name, address and telephone number of the person from whom or the place where the owner acquired the dog; (4) Notify the animal control officer or his agent within a 24-hour period when the owner has knowledge that the dog is at large, is unconfined, and has attacked an individual or other animal, or that the dog has died; and (5)Notify the animal control officer or his agent when the dog is sold or given away to another person. The notification shall include the name, address, and telephone number of the new owner. (b) The owner of a dangerous or vicious dog shall not suffer or permit such dog to be unconfined, unless such dog is securely restrained, leashed and muzzled. Sec. 14-93. Exceptions. The prohibition in section 14-91 shall not apply to the following: (a)Animals under the control of a law enforcement or military agency; (b)Animals that are kept for the protection of property, provided that such animals are restrained by a leash or chain, cage, fence, or other adequate means, from contact with the public, or with persons who enter the premises with the actual or implied permission of the owner or occupant; (c)Animals under display or exhibition to the public, provided that: (1)Such animals are restrained by a leash or chain, cage, fence, or other adequate means, from contact with the public; (2)The display or exhibition is for a period of not exceeding ten (10) days; (3)The display or exhibition is conducted in full compliance with the township zoning ordinance; (4) Animals kept in a licensed veterinary hospital for treatment; and (5) Animals for sale in a commercial establishment. Secs. 14-94—14-120. Reserved SECTION 2. VIOLATION AND PENALTY Any person or entity that violates any provision of this Ordinance may, upon conviction, be fined not more than Five Hundred (\$500.00) Dollars or impris oned not more than Ninety (90) days, or both, in the discretion of the court. SECTION 3. SEVERABILITY If any clause, sentence. section, paragraph or part of this Ordinance, or the application of thereof to any person, firm, corporation, legal entity or circumstances shall be for any reason adjudged by a court of competent jurisdiction to be unconstitutional or invalid, said judgment shall not affect, impair or invalid the remainder of this Ordinance. It is hereby declared to the legislative intent of this body that the Ordinance is severable, and that the Ordinance would have been adopted had such invalid or unconstitutional provisions not have been included in this ordinance. SECTION 4. REPEAL OF CONFLICTING ORDINANCES All Ordinance or parts of Ordinance is conflict herewith is hereby repealed only to the extent necessary to give this Ordinance full force and effect. Wayne wins designation as 'Main Street' community

Gov. Rick Snyder announced last week that Wayne was among the three communities selected by the Michigan State Housing Development Authority (MSHDA) to take part in the Selected Level Michigan Main Street program. The other two communities are Three Rivers and Grayling.

As part of the Selected Level of Michigan Main Street, these three communities will receive five years of intensive technical assistance, with a focus on revitalization strategies designed to attract new residents, business investment, economic growth and job creation to their central business districts. The value of the professional help is estimated at about \$200,000.

"The Main Street Program is not so much a grant in terms of funds,

but rather a Do-It-Yourself with technical assistance program," explained Ripple Effect member Sherrie Brindley. "They provide professional architectural services for facade renovation, retail assistance to help the downtown merchants, fundraising training, event planning training, volunteer training and a variety of services to help our volunteers with business recruitment, branding, volunteer recruitment, etc" she added.

Members of the Wayne Ripple Effect, joined by four members of the city council, traveled to Lansing Feb. 5 to present their program application. The Ripple Effect members prepared a 45-minute presentation about Wayne and the reasons the community should be selected for the program. entation ended with a 15-minute question and answer program.

"In general the affected area is the walkable area of downtown," said Brindley. "Once we are actively up and running the folks from Michigan Main Street Center will help us determine our specific area of focus and set boundaries. In Wayne, one of their concerns is the large, spread-out nature of our downtown, so we have some work to do there."

"The next step is a visit from the Main Street team to train our board

of directors and the hiring of a fulltime Main Street manager," Brindley said.

"We are responsible for raising the money to fund the full-time staff person and the expense of our projects for each of the five years of the Select Level program."

Brindley said that City Councilman John Rhaesa described it best.

"Main Street designation in 2014 comes at a pivotal point in the history of our community. The city is struggling and we have some difficult decisions ahead. We need to be able to point to our Main Street designation and our downtown revitalization efforts as a positive thing, something to give our citizens hope and give us the tools to help turn our downtown - and our city - around."

Wayne Ripple Effect members have been working on acceptance into the state program since they began at the associate level in 2012.

The Michigan Main Street program ties in with Gov. Snyder's placemaking efforts to create vibrant communities across Michigan.

Members of The Wayne Ripple Effect were joined in the Lansing presentation by city council members Al Damitio, Jim Hawley, Jim Henley and Rhaesa.

Inkster woman charged in collision

Meonsha Lashawna Robinson, 28, of the scene that she was driving westbound Inkster will face several criminal charges as a result of a vehicle accident in Wayne earlier this month.

The crash, which took place at about 4:30 p.m. Feb. 3 near Van born Road and Second Street, involved three cars and injured two people. Robinson was arraigned Feb. 5 in 29th District Court in Wayne on charges of drunken driving causing serious injury and driving with a suspended license causing serious injury, driving with a suspended license and commission of a felony with a motor vehicle.

At the scene of the accident, a witness said that one vehicle apparently didn't see a second one stopped at a traffic light and struck the stopped car. The driver attempted to change lanes rapidly after striking the other car and subsequently pushed a third vehicle into a light pole. According to police reports, Robinson could only tell officers on

on Van Born and that she did not know how the accident occurred.

Two people were transported by ambulance from the scene of the crash to an area hospital for treatment of non-life threatening injuries. One of those was a passenger in Robinson's vehicle who told officers she was pregnant.

Police said that Robinson failed sobriety tests and registered a .16 on the Breathalyzer, which is twice the legal limit in Michigan. She was arrested at the scene. The officer noted at the time that she had a prior conviction for drunk driving which resulted in her license being confiscated.

A not-guilty plea was entered on her behalf at Robinson's court arraignment. The judge set her bond at \$5,000 or 10 percent. She was expected back in court for a preliminary hearing on the charges last Tuesday.



Plymouth trustees OK new senior living complex

Members of the Plymouth Township Board of Trustees have given preliminary approval to a planned adult nursing and senior living center off Ann Arbor Road.

Stefan Stration, president of Pomeroy Living, addressed board members' questions during the regular board meeting two weeks ago. Stration and his partner, Keith J. Pomeroy, a Birmingham attorney, plan to construct a 7,000 square foot commercial building on Ann Arbor Road with 253 dwelling units. Of those, 150 would be dedicated to adult assisted living, 63 to assistedmemory care and 40 would be designated as villas for senior living. The project would be constructed on a 33-acre parcel located north of Ann Arbor Road, east of the CSX Railroad. The Plymouth Elks Club currently occupies the southern portion of the site.

Last January, the township plan- township planning commission. ning department recommended approval of the project subject to certain terms and conditions.

According to trustees, the township attorney has reviewed environmental restrictions on the planned site and has concluded they would not restrict building construction nor parking lots within the restricted area along the west side of the property. That area was formerly occupied by Wycoff Steel and was at one time reportedly contaminated.

Pomeroy had previously requested a Planned Unit Development at the same location, but using 27 acres of the land. At the time, plans submitted to the township alleged that only 17 acres of the site was buildable as the other 10 were contaminated. That PUD was also approved by the

Board members did not address a Jan. 7, letter from the CSX Railroad realty division,

CSX Real Property. The letter, addressed to the township planning commission, expressed concern about the construction of a senior living facility adjacent to the railroad right of way, saying safety is their number one concern.

"It has been CSX's experience that residents living near active railroad tracks are often unhappy with the associated noise of rail operations. Trains may use the tracks 24 hours a day, and the number and schedule of trains can change at any time...," the letter stated.

In the letter, CSX cited federal law which requires trains to sound horns at all highway crossings and gave other factors including vibra-

tions, noise, passing trains to illus- from their office. trate their concern.

"Should the Planning Commission of Plymouth Charter Township elect to approve the request for the (PUD) at this location despite our concerns, we ask that you consider a 50-foot buffer between any residential development and rail right of way in addition to fencing..." the letter stated.

In a later phone interview, Stration said the approval was only for a Planned Unit Development option and that the plans were not final. "We need to sit down with the township and go through some more detail," he said.

Pomeroy and Stration have worked together since 1994 when they formed Pomeroy Health, a network of care communities and skilled nursing facilities in Michigan, according to a release

According to court documents, Stration and Pomeroy were named as defendants in a lawsuit against another company in which they were principals claiming breach of the terms of a therapy services contract and alleging damages in excess of \$2 million in 2007. Pomeroy was also named as the defendant in a lawsuit filed by Bank of America in 2011 alleging default on a loan guaranty of about \$3 million.

Increased costs or higher tax unfair to Wayne residents

A prime example of the good news-bad news scenario certainly took place in the City of Wayne recently.

The good news included notification from the State of Michigan that the city had been named a participant in the Main Street program and would receive help in developing and marketing the community for the next five years from various experts.

The bad news was that the consultant hired to help prepare the budget said officials needed to contact the Michigan Office of Fiscal Responsibility because the financial condition of the city is so perilous.

While the good news means that Wayne will receive a great deal of technical assistance in professional architectural services for façade renovations in the downtown area and assistance to help market downtown merchants, the bad news means that the community may face the dreaded prospect of a state-appointed financial manager while all this business and community promotion is going on.

Which, really, may not be such a bad situation.

Let's face it, most of the members of the Wayne City Council realize that the budget deficit the city faces now and in the next fiscal year are insurmountable without some drastic action. Some very difficult decisions have to be made if the City of Wayne is to survive the current financial crisis.

With the failure of the last millage the city asked for, Wayne residents clearly demonstrated that their patience and pockets are overextended.

Some of those drastic efforts, we know, have been implemented already. The city work force is at about half what it once was, severe cuts in expenses and spending have been made, and yet the looming crisis has not abated. And it won't.

Wayne, like the City of Inkster, was in the throes of a serious loss of home values even before the mortgage crisis and subsequent recession. Put simply, home prices in those communities kept going down, down, down. When homes lose value, as those in both Wayne and Inkster did, tax revenue which is a percentage of the value of those properties, also drops. In these two communities, it dropped like a stone down a deep well and the echoes are still being heard.

Wayne tried taking other city funds and transferring them into the general fund to prop up the budget, which may have worked short-term, but is no longer an option. The mayor has suggested going back to the residents for more revenue to avoid the threat of a state-appointed manager, but we truly think that is a bad idea.

Putting a higher tax burden on the residents or businesses in Wayne who have been more than supportive of their community so far, is simply reaching too far. These citizens approved a dedicated public safety millage, endured a water rate hike, paid for the city streetlights and the mayor wants them to do more? Likewise, asking them to pay higher fees for services is simply unconscionable. With the failure of the last millage the city asked for, Wayne residents clearly demonstrated that their patience and pockets are overextended. Enough is enough.

If the community is less than desirable to home buyers and new residents now, an even higher tax rate and steeper service costs will surely mean that even fewer people will choose to live in Wayne.

The Main Street project could certainly be part of the good news and a part of the solution, enticing businesses to the city and helping those already established in Wayne to succeed. Those marketing and downtown promotions could even attract more tax-paying residents to the city, which would help.

But there is no avoiding the unfunded pensions of retired city workers that hover perilously over the city budget. This is an expense Wayne has to face and solve—with or without a state-appointed financial manager.


