State of Canton Township is 'growing'

"The great thing is that every one of us is dedicated to making our community the very best it can be for all of our residents."

very best it can be for all of our residents," Williams said during an acknowledgment of the trustees during his address at the Village Theater at Cherry Hill hosted by the Canton Chamber of Commerce.

In addition to comments from Evans stressing the importance of road improvements in the township, Williams stressed the progress

the township continues to experience.

He told the assembled crowd that the new 2.5 million-gallon water storage facility scheduled to begin operations in June is expected to save the township up to \$8.5 million in fees paid annually to the Great Lakes Water Authority. The new tanks will allow the township to store water during off-

peak hours and then release it as needed, avoiding the higher peak rate water charges.

Another cost savings is the recent \$280,000 federal grant to the fire department to purchase self-contained breathing apparatus for firefighters.

Williams said the savings should help reduce the water rate increases that are passed on to residents.

He characterized the constant complaints about traffic on Ford Road in the township as a "frustrator" but noted that it is an indication of the growing new businesses and nation-

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Smilin' Irish

Plymouth resident is parade marshal

Everybody is Irish on St. Patrick's Day, but one proud Plymouth Township Irishman celebrates his heritage every day.

Last Sunday, many local residents saw a familiar face in the 50th Annual St. Patrick's Day Parade through downtown Detroit when Bryan Dunleavy acted as the grand marshal of the event. The proud Irishman was chosen by the United Irish Societies for the honor. He was celebrated during the largest ethnic parade in the state which this year saw more than 4,000 participants march through Corktown.

Members of the society annually select a grand marshal based on the individual's lifelong contributions to the Irish Community. Dunleavy has unstintingly donated his time, business and financial resources and philanthropy to

promote Irish heritage in the community, according to a spokesman. Dunleavy was on hand at the Plymouth Township Board of Trustees meeting recently to accept the congratulations of officials and accept a special official proclamation presented by Supervisor Kurt Heise.

Heise honored Dunleavy for his continued role in keeping Irish history, culture and religious beliefs alive in the community and his activities throughout Wayne County, including his dedication and

service to the St. Pat's Senior Citizens Group of Detroit. The Irish Falltime Farmers also named Dunleavy as the Man of the Year in 2013. Currently, he serves as president of the Fraternal Order of United Irish Men.

The United Irish Societies moved the parade from Woodward Avenue in 1987 to the historic Irish neighborhood in Corktown. The parade featured floats, high school bands, pipe drum bands and the Detroit Fire Department Cloven Team along with local dignitaries. Always a crowd

favorite, the cold temperatures didn't deter the bagpipers and drummers in their kilts.

Four mounted horses from the Detroit Police Department had green glitter hooves and five Model T cars marked the 100th anniversary of Henry Ford's first plant in Ireland. About 80,000 people gathered along the route to watch the parade, according to official estimates.

Dunleavy and his brother, Tom Dunleavy, have owned and operated Dunleavy's Irish Pub, located in Allen Park, for more than four decades.

Cemetery clean-up is urged

Romulus officials are urging the clean-up of the Romulus Memorial Cemetery this month and have provided a dumpster on site at the facility for discarded items removed during spring maintenance.

The historic cemetery is located at Shook and Tobine roads and is the final resting place of war heroes, political figures, a former major league baseball player, and the remains of historic community families spanning more than 190 years.

The cemetery was established in 1822, five years before Michigan attained statehood and was designated a historical landmark in 1989.

City Clerk Ellen Craig-Bragg is the

record-keeper of the cemetery and she has reminded residents with family members interred there that it is time for some maintenance at the site. She said that all floral arrangements including wreaths and grave blankets must be removed from the grounds, or they will be discarded.

The dumpster will be on site until March 31, she said, for the use of those tidying up and removing debris from around graves and tombstones. Hours at the cemetery are 8 a.m. until 5 p.m. Balloons and other arrangements regarding the cemetery are available at Craig-Bragg's office in city hall.

School district sets hearings on AIDS classes

The Northville Public Schools Board of Education will host two public hearings for school parents and community members to comment on a proposed fifth grade HIV/AIDS instructional unit and materials. The district previously provided the state-mandated HIV/AIDS instruction in third grade.

The recommended HIV/AIDS instructional unit for Northville fifth graders focuses on defining HIV and AIDS, explaining that it is safe to be friends with someone living with HIV/AIDS and describing the ways individuals can protect themselves from infection with a serious blood borne com-

municable disease. The unit also includes the video AIDS: Facts for Kids, 2009 (30:16 minutes).

The proposed curriculum, along with the unit materials and video have been reviewed and approved by the appropriate teachers and elementary principals, along with the district Health Advisory Board, comprising parents of children attending Northville schools, as well as district educators, a high school doctor, local clergy, and community health professionals, as required by law. The materials and video have also been approved by the District Curriculum Council.

The next step in the curricu-

lum review process is to offer parents and community members the opportunity to review and comment on the unit curriculum and materials, including the video, prior to board of education consideration. Preview opportunities and public hearings are planned for 6-6:30 p.m. with a preview opportunity from 5-4:55 p.m. Tuesday, March 21 at Northville

Public Schools Board of Education Office (Room 302), 501 West Main St. Northville, and at 7 p.m. with a preview opportunity from 6:30-7 p.m. Tuesday, April 11, at the board of education meeting at Hillsdale Middle School Forum, 775 North Center St., Northville.

Following the second public hearing opportunity, the fifth-

grade HIV/AIDS health unit and instructional materials recommendation will be brought forward for board members' consideration at the April 11 meeting. If approved, the new curriculum and materials will be used as part of the fifth-grade health lesson for students beginning this school year. Written parental permission is required for students to participate in the HIV/AIDS health lesson.

Manufacturer planning \$60 million plant investment

A subsidiary of one of the largest suppliers of plastic resins in the world is expanding operations in Canton Township.

Kingfa Science and Technology (USA) Inc. will invest \$60 million and create 150 addi-

tional jobs at the current facility on Michigan Avenue, near Beck Road in Canton.

Kingfa, which opened in Canton in 2009, is a joint venture subsidiary of a China-based company, Kingfa Science and

Technology. The company provides raw material for plastic injection molding companies that manufacture and supply parts to the auto industry.

The company is expected to seek tax abatements from Canton

officials for the new development which will be funded, in part, by a \$1 million grant from the Michigan Business Development Program, part of the Michigan Economic Development Corp. Any tax abatement would require

a vote of approval from the board of trustees. While there will be no expansion or addition to the current building, hiring as a result of the investment in new equipment is expected to take place during the next three years.

at retailers locating in the township.

He said that retail base helped keep Canton vibrant and growing during the recent economic downturn.

Recent growth in new home construction is also a positive sign of growth in Canton, Williams said, noting that the 208 permits issued in 2016 was more than double the total issued in 2014.

Williams cited the recent selection of the township as a gold-star community by the national Not in Our Town organ-

ization which noted that Canton has a commitment to safety, respect and diversity for all.

While legacy costs are still a priority for Williams who spent eight years on the board of trustees prior to becoming supervisor, he said progress is being made on retiree health care costs. He said the township allocated \$1.5 million last year

for health care and achieved savings by adopting a self-insurance plan.

New Treasurer Dian Sefranos and new Clerk Michael Siegrist are working to improve services in their offices, Williams said, and the township continues to make progress in supporting the arts. He said the efforts to turn the old Ford Motor Co. factory

Traffic study requested in rezoning request

Concerns from owners of existing homes in the area have delayed consideration of a rezoning request for the construction of 70 new Pulte homes in Westland.

Owner Glenn Shaw Jr. has requested a rezoning of 19.2 acres on Joy Road near the Hellenic Cultural Center to allow a Planned Unit Development (PUD). Pulte homes is planning to construct 70 homes at the site, utilizing smaller, 55-foot lots while leaving wetlands and woods in the area which abuts the Holiday Nature Preserve untouched. The homes would be constructed on the property by Pulte and be in the \$200,000 to \$300,000 price range, according to Shaw. The sale of the land to Pulte is contingent on the approval of the rezoning, he added.

The new development would be called Nankin Mills Village and would be south and east of the Hellenic Cultural Center at Sts. Constantine and Helen Greek Orthodox Church on the south side of Joy Road.

Neighboring property owners cited concerns about the impact of the development on the value of their homes which sit on lots ranging from one-half to three-quarters of an acre. Concerns about the number of homes and the subsequent density in the new development have been brought to both the planning commission and city council.

Residents have characterized the lots as "extremely small" and suggested that the 70 new homes would present a traffic problem on Joy Road as new residents

entered and left the subdivision. One resident of Ravine told the city council members that the development would be "right behind my house" and said that it would drive his home values down. Currently, many of the homes which back up to the proposed site have an unimpeded view of grass and trees.

Shaw said the planned homes are ideal for Westland and would be appropriately priced for the current demographics.

Members of the planning commission previously investigated the proposal and unanimously approved the development finding little or no merit in the concerns voiced by neighbors and recommended approval by the city council. The commissioners' opinion was seconded by city Planning/Building Director Bruce Thompson who told the members of the city council that the proposed development was "an excellent use of the property

and much less dense than the plans previously approved for the site."

"This project will preserve the woods and wetlands on the property, which abuts the Holiday Nature Preserve," Thompson explained. He said that more than 30 percent of the land under consideration would be open space and that the proposed homes would bring 70 families to the city.

Despite Thompson's assurances, members of the council tabled the proposed rezoning while a traffic impact study is conducted, in an apparent effort to address the concerns of residents.

No date for the reconsideration of the issue has been announced.

Wayne court earns high marks for 4th year

The verdict is in at the 29th District Court in Wayne and the public has found in favor of the court.

According to Inkster Police Chief William T. Riley five people were displaced by the eviction effort and the city paid to have the individuals housed until alternate arrangements were made for their well being. There were indications that some of them had lived in the

motel long-term, including two small children.

The severity of the conditions was discovered by patrol officers who reported their findings to command staff at the department who determined that some corrective action was necessary, according to Riley's office.

Riley said the city has spent more than \$100,000 in police runs to the motel on complaints of domestic violence and drug overdoses. The service provided at the motel far exceeds the taxes the two businesses pay to the city, he added.

Riley said the police recog-

nize that people have experienced bad economic times but that the police have a responsibility to ensure that the place they stay is safe. "We don't want anybody taking advantage of these people," Riley said.

Riley confirmed that investigations into other city businesses with similar issues are ongoing.

"We are looking at a lot of businesses in the city to make sure they are proper...that their licenses are proper; that the living areas are proper and that there are no code violations, no fire violations. This is just the beginning," Riley said.
