If employment contracts are successful, Joseph Merucci, the current city manager in Lincoln Park, will be the new city manager in Wayne. He will replace Robert English who retired from the city in September after serving as city manager for about three years. City Engineer Ramzi El-Gharib has been interim city manager since that time.

Merucci was interviewed for about 90 minutes last Saturday by members of the Wayne City Council who were apparently satisfied with his responses to their questions, experience and education.

Merucci said the largest expenses in the city are in personnel particularly in the fire and police departments.

"I would first start working with the finance director - you've got to get control of the spending. The majority of that would be people. I would do a thorough review of the (labor) contracts. There are also contracts with attorneys, engineers and others. They all need to be examined," Merucci told the Wayne

Following the interview the council members voted unanimously to begin contract negotiations with Merucci, who has nearly 30 years experience in city government. He began his career as assistant city manger in Garden City and was then the city manager in Pleasant Ridge, Clawson and Fowlerville. He accepted the Lincoln Park job about a year ago. Merucci earned his bachelors degree in political science from the University of Michigan in Dearborn and earned his masters degree in public administration at Wayne State University. He would be contract employee and would not receive employee benefits.

Merrucci is no stranger to municipal financial problems. Lincoln Park will have an

Emergency Financial Manager appointed by Gov. Rick Snyder this year, based on the financial deficits in the city. Wayne currently faces a \$1.5 million deficit and a deficit of more than \$3 million is anticipated for next year. City officials recently met with the Michigan Office of Financial Responsibility at the recommendation of budget consultant Vince Pastue, the city manager in Farmington.

"People who say they want an EFM (Emergency Financial Manager) are foolish that's the last thing you want," said Merucci. "The EFM has a single job - that is to make sure the budget meets the revenues."

"You have a golden opportunity with Main Street. I'm quite shocked that your DDA (Downtown Development Authority) board only meets once or twice a year," said Merucci. "Most meet monthly. I realize the funding is committed but there are still things they can do with smaller expenses."

If employment agreement negotiations are successful, Merucci could start within 30 days.

Managers at IKEA, the leading home furnishings retailer in the world, have revealed plans to expand the warehouse area at the Canton store on Ford Road by about 44,000 square feet.

IKEA Canton, which opened in June 2006 at 311,000 square feet in size, would grow to a new footprint of about 355,000 square feet.

Initial utility work would begin this coming summer with actual

construction activity starting in the fall. The store will remain open and operational during construction, maintaining its full product offering throughout the project, expected to be complete next spring, according to Matt Hunsicker, Canton store manager.

The project will include expanding the Self-Serve Furniture Area where shoppers collect flat-packed furniture to take home on the same day, rearranging customer service functions to the newly-built part of the store and enlarging the home delivery area. This extension would blend into the existing structure so the store can preserve the unique architectural design for which IKEA stores are known.

"IKEA is thrilled with the success of IKEA Canton. But, as our customer base and sales continue to grow - along with our product assortment - the store's warehouse capacity now is less than ideal," said Hunsicker.

"Extending the store's selfserve furniture area so it can hold more products would allow us to improve the shopping experience, to meet our customers' needs more easily, and to enhance our ability to keep lowering prices," he added.

"We've been together for 20 years and I have always wanted to marry her but I could never make it a reality," said David Gorden, who recently married the love of his life, Maureen. "My bride and I have disabilities and because of the way entitlements are set up, we were always in fear of losing them so we never got married."

One night he was watching TV and saw a story about an organization called "Wish Upon a Wedding," (http://wishuponawedding.org/) a non-profit organization that donates wedding services to people who need help due to unusual life circumstances. Gorden said he quickly got on the computer and sent an e-mail.

"I contacted them secretly and filled out an application and the rest is history, before I knew it, I was planning a wedding without Maureen even knowing it!" As the date grew closer and more people got involved, the secret was let out of the bag and the prospective bride found out.

The officers entered the bar, two remaining near the door, as one of them approached Koth, according to police reports. The officer stated in his report that he told Koth that management requested he leave the establishment and suggested he walk him outside to the alley to talk.

The officer's report indicates that once outside the bar, Koth consented to a search of his person and that officers found two plastic bags containing 16 grams of a white powdery substance along with a wallet containing \$2,831. Officers arrested him at the scene and transported him to the Plymouth Township Police Department for processing. At the township, a second search revealed another \$60 in cash. The officer said that he told Koth at the time that all the money would now be forfeited to Wayne County.

In the report, the officer said a preliminary field test of the white powder was positive for cocaine. A second officer on the scene spoke with Dan Johnson, also identified as an owner of Ironwood Grill. This officer also interviewed the waitress who confirmed that Koth had given her a white powder in a small baggie which she had thrown away on three separate occasions.

According to the police reports, Johnson later told officers that when Koth was arrested and in the patrol car, the manager of Fiamma came into the alley behind the establishments. According to the police reports, Johnson said that the Fiamma manager iden-

tified Koth as "trying to peddle drugs in his place."

At the most recent Liquor License Review Committee in the city, the drug arrest was listed on the agenda under item H as "Drug Arrest, Fiamma/Ironwood." The owner of Fiamma has since protested erroneous reports that the arrest took place in his business.

Plymouth police sent a request for a felony drug warrant to the Wayne County Prosecutor's Office-Narcotics Unit on Nov. 25, 11 days following Koth's arrest.

There was no further action listed in police reports of the case until Feb. 11, more than 13 weeks following the arrest when officers called the prosecutor's office to check on the status of the warrant. Police reports state that an attorney in the prosecutor's office told the inquiring officer that the warrant was not in the system and "was likely stuck in the fax machine since 11/25/13 as they had no toner for the fax machine to print (warrant) requests."

According to Assistant Wayne County Prosecutor Maria Miller, however, all police departments received notification in early November that the prosecutor's office was changing to a new fax/computer system and given a new number to fax warrant requests.

Miller said that Plymouth received the felony warrant the day after the request was sent to the correct number.

Koth was formally charged March 6 by video arraignment in front of Judge James Plakas who entered a not-guilty plea on his behalf and set his bond at \$10,000.

Koth, 50, now faces up to 20 years in prison and a fine of up to \$25,000 if convicted of the charges. He remains free on bond.

2 new retailers to locate in Westland Center

Mayor William R. Wild said last week that the Westland Shopping Center will be welcoming two new major retailers as tenants.

The announcement came on the heels of a third new establishment, ULTA Beauty, recently approved by members of the city council. The two new projects, Charming Charlie and Shoe Carnival, will result in nearly \$1.2 million in additional investment in the Westland Shopping Center with an investment amount of \$750,000 by Shoe Carnival and \$400,000 by Charming Charlie. Each will be creating new exterior entrances with new facade improvements highlighting their tenant spaces outside the mall's exterior as well as within the interior of the mall structure, Wild said. The Charming Charlie will be located just east of the Kohl's store in the former Griffin Grill location. The current store exterior will be demolished and a 611 square foot storefront and vestibule entrance will be constructed. The Shoe Carnival will

be located at the former H&R Block location between Kohl's and Macy's and will occupy three current lease spaces within the mall.

"These additions of prominent national retail chains will be another shot in the arm for Westland's Shop and Dine District and exemplifies the continual collaborative efforts of the City and Westland Shopping Center in marketing our vital commercial center," Wild said. While an exact date has not been set for the grand opening of either

store, the renovations are expected to begin soon with Charming Charlie and Shoe Carnival occupying their spaces as soon as the renovations are complete, he added.

In addition, the Four Season Nursing Home, a multi-care, 180 bed nursing home located on the west side of Newburgh Road, just south of Joy Road, is planning extensive building renovations as part of their continued re-investment in the Westland facility. The project recently approved by members of the city council includes a 1,122 square foot canopy addition over the front entrance to the existing building as well as a new cultured stone veneer to the overall front of the building. Phased site improvements are included in the overall plan that will bring the investment amount for this project to nearly \$1 million as well and highlights the continued growth and investment in housing and care facilities for Westland's senior population, Wild said.

State may pay districts that took Inkster students

Senator Hoon-Yung Hopgood (D - Taylor) was among the legislators who voted to approve a budget supplemental bill that includes \$5.1 million in funding for school districts that received students from the dissolved Inkster district.

"When the Legislature cut education funding and mandated the dissolution of Inkster and Buena Vista Schools, an undue burden was forced upon many schools throughout our state, including several within my district," said Hopgood. "I am glad to finally see some financial assistance being extended to help these schools cope with the burden of maintaining empty buildings and other transition costs caused by Inkster schools' dissolution. This allocation of funding will make a big difference for these schools, which were already struggling with the financial burden created by the Legislature's continued cuts to education."

The dissolution of Inkster Schools resulted in students and properties being dispersed among Wayne-Westland, Romulus, Taylor and Westwood School Districts. Among other items included in the supplemental appropriations bill is \$100 million for state and local roads to offset maintenance costs related to the severe winter weather Michigan has endured this winter. In addition, the bill will provide more than \$2.5 million to the Michigan Veterans Affairs Agency to support veterans and expand the veterans' service delivery initiative.

"We all know that this has been a tough winter, and it's meant a lot of extra work and money maintaining our roads and keeping them safe for drivers. Driving around town, many feel that this is the worst pothole season in recent memory. The

money included in this bill will help offset those costs," Hopgood said. "I am also pleased that we could secure additional funding for Veteran Service Organizations, like the American Legion and the Veterans' of Foreign Wars, and the Michigan Veterans Affairs Agency to help connect our veterans with vital services and job training programs when they return home. Some state funding for veterans related services have been cut back in recent years and Michigan remains far too low in terms of dollars for qualified veterans."

The budget supplemental also

includes a \$600,000 appropriation for scholarships for foster children to help them receive their diploma, \$2.5 million to assist counties with foster care services and placement, and \$2.2 million for hospice services. SB 608 also provides \$65.2 million to the Michigan Department of Community Health to maintain services and cover the savings the state will not see due to the failure of the legislature to grant immediate effect to Medicaid expansion legislation last fall, thus delaying its implementation until the spring. Senate Bill 608 now heads to the House for further consideration.

Northville wins finance award

CITY OF ROMULUS NOXIOUS WEED NOTICE TO THE PROPERTY OWNERS IN THE **CITY OF ROMULUS**

In accordance with P.A. 359 of 1941, as amended and Chapter 19, Article 3, of the Romulus Code of Ordinances it shall be the duty of all owners of lands on which noxious weeds are found growing, to destroy the same before they reach a seed bearing stage and to prevent such weeds from becoming a detriment to public health.

If any such owner, agent or occupant of such land shall refuse to destroy such noxious weeds or cause them to be destroyed, it shall be the duty of the Noxious Weed Commissioner to enter upon such land and destroy such nox-

Nothing in this notice shall apply to weeds in fields devoted to growing any small grain crop such as wheat, oats,

All weeds not cut by May 1, 2014 will be cut by the City and the owner of the property will be charged with the cost. Subsequent violations will result in additional cuttings and will be done as often as necessary when vegetation reaches eight (8) inches in height and/or seed bearing stage.

Any expense incurred in such destruction shall be paid by the owner or owners of such land, and the city shall have a lien against such land for such expense. Any owner who shall refuse to destroy such noxious weeds shall also be subject to a fine of not more than \$100.00 per cutting in the discretion of the court.

All refuse and debris on the given owners property will be removed by the City at the owners' expense.



Wayne awaits new plans to keep Community Center, ice rink open

In an effort to balance the deficit budget, by those who formerly used the exercise room Wayne City Council members approved a plan last week to close several sections of the Wayne Community Center, which receives a \$1 million annual subsidy from the city.

According to Wayne-Westland Parks and Recreation Director Nathan Adams, however, the closures are not confirmed as city is waiting for two proposals from private organizations to assume management of the community center and the ice rink. The plan council members approved would include the closure of the Wayne Activities and Banquet Center, the Senior Department and the Patrick Norton Recreation Exercise Club and the ice arena. All will close June 30 if there is no outside proposal accepted, Adams said.

The pool will remain open and Adams said the staff would move some exercise equipment into a nearby observation area for use in the community center.

Adams said he is telling everyone concerned "not to panic and to sit tight for the month of April. What we'll be doing will become more clear in May."

The city council members will have a better grasp of the possibilities and "what they want to do" when the private investors or entities make their proposals regarding the community center and the ice arena, Adams said.

"We need to get the information and perform our due diligence," he said.

The Senior Center would reopen using funding from federal Community Development Block Grant allocations available in the 2014-15 budget. That funding would make the Senior Department self-sustaining beginning in April, Adams said.


