City offers settlement in pension dispute

From 1.45 million to \$1.1 million
is a generous settlement.

Despite authorization earlier this month allowing Plymouth Township Supervisor Kurt Heise to cancel a tolling agreement and proceed with litigation, a settlement may be near in the disputed fire pension obligation from the City of Plymouth.

The pension obligation remained following the 2010 dissolution of the intergovernmental fire protection agreement. Under that agreement, one department provided all fire services to both the city and township for 17 years.

The two communities did not agree as to the financial obligation and the accounting method-

ology used to determine the amount the city owed the employees' pension fund. Last month, township officials reported the city obligation to be near \$1.5 million. At the board of trustees meeting last week, however, that number was revised to \$1.45 million.

City officials have reportedly offered a settlement of \$800,000 and a used 2010 Pierce fire truck as full payment of the obligation.

Heise told the board members last Tuesday that he would prefer a lump sum payment and

recommend a \$1.1 million settlement amount be proffered to the city. Heise, an attorney, estimated the cost of litigation at \$300,000. He said the settlement time would drag on and he felt the township would be at the mercy of the courts as to timing.

"My recommendation is we get this done by the end of the year. I recommend a \$1.1 million settlement plus a MERS acknowledgement from the city. I want a universal settlement," Heise said.

Trustees Chuck Curmi and

Bob Doroshewitz were not in favor of Heise's suggestion and the two cast dissenting votes on a motion to approve the settlement offer. The motion was approved by a 4 to 2 vote following lengthy discussion.

Curmi said he thought the township needed to consult an expert pension attorney while Doroshewitz said he was not happy with the suggested amount.

"From 1.45 million to \$1.1 million is a generous settlement," Doroshewitz said.

"We want a cash settlement, with no fire truck," Clerk Jerry Vorva commented.

Trustee Gary Heitman characterized the offer from the city as "a joke."

In memoriam City vows to honor long forgotten hero

A long-deceased war hero buried in Romulus has been overlooked by the federal government for nearly a century.

Local officials, however, intend to see that he receives the honor he earned with his valiant military service and that he deserves at his place of final rest.

Members of the Romulus Cemetery Board of Trustees led by Chairwoman Jan Lemmon have taken on the responsibility for a new headstone and marker at the grave of Charles Cawetzka, who was presented with the United States of America Medal of Honor for his heroism during the Philippine-American War. Mr. Cawetzka is buried in the Romulus Memorial Cemetery but his government-issued headstone does not recognize his heroic earning of the most prestigious honor bestowed on members of the armed forces. Mr. Cawetzka was presented the medal by President Theodore Roosevelt in 1902, honoring his heroic conduct on Aug. 23, 1900 in Sariaya in the province of Quezon, Philippines.

The oversight was discovered by Ret. Army Master Sgt. Greg Farino of Riverview who learned of the Medal of Honor omission and researched Mr. Cawetzka's military history, discovering that he "single-handedly defended a disabled comrade against a greatly superior force of the enemy."

Mr. Cawetzka's gravestone shows his dates of birth (March 1, 1877) and death (Oct. 23, 1951) and states that he served as a corporal in the Army in the 30th United States Volunteer Infantry in the Spanish-American War.

But neither his Medal of Honor nor the fact that he was recognized for his service in the Philippine-American War are mentioned on the

current headstone.

Farino, who loves military history, studies military gravesites and corrects mistakes and omissions, was researching another gravesite when he learned of Mr. Cawetzka's grave.

"Holy cow, I didn't know a Medal of Honor recipient was buried anywhere near me," Farino said. "I wanted to pay my respects to someone who earned a Medal of Honor. I found his headstone mentions nothing about him being a Medal of Honor recipient. There is no higher honor than the Medal of Honor. I just couldn't let it go."

According to records discovered by Farino, seven months before the incident that led to the Medal of Honor, Mr. Cawetzka was severely

no registration of any such political group could be located.

Heise, visibly upset by the claims made in the robocalls and in some Facebook posts, made his position clear at the meeting.

"If you are here because you were told we are going to raise your taxes tonight, you are being lied to. If you are here because you were told we are voting to sell the golf course, you are being lied to. If you are here because you were told we are going to vote on a massive new recreation authority that

will have unlimited taxing power; you are being lied to. If you are here because you were told we are disbanded the senior bus service, you are being lied to," Heise stated.

Heise's remarks criticizing the robocalls were seconded by several members of the audience who expressed their shock and dismay at the claims made by the caller.

"Shame on all the disrespectful," commented Doroshewitz.

"Let the people decide about PARC, (Plymouth Arts and

Recreation Complex). They have a lot to offer people in this community. The small amount of money we'd have to come up with would be a benefit," she said.

Some of those in attendance said they were there in response to information posted on the Facebook page of former Township Clerk Nancy Conzelmann who was soundly defeated during her bid for reelection in November.

"The presentation is in the board packet," Conzelmann posted. "It calls for an authority to raise taxes to build the stand alone 800 seat orchestra hall, renovate Central, and enter into an agreement with PARC, that can never be terminated, to

wounded in both thighs during an engagement in the town of Imus in the Philippine province of Cavite.

Mr. Cavetzka's military career ended on April 3, 1901. On Dec. 2, 1902, he married Clara Cross and the couple had eight children.

Farino contacted Romulus City Clerk Ellen Cragg Bragg's office and then followed up with an appearance at a Cemetery Board meeting last October to make his case. Lemmon then met with Romulus Mayor LeRoy Burrell who gave his blessing for a campaign to fund a new monument.

Romulus Public Services Director Robert McCraight contacted a representative of the Veterans Administration in an attempt to discover why Mr. Cavetzka's history and medal had been overlooked. He was informed that that since Mr. Cavetzka has a "historic" headstone, that is "still serviceable," the marker would not be replaced by the government.

Even if it were to break or deteriorate and need to be replaced, a replacement would include the original language, which did not include recognition of the Medal of Honor.

"We knew they weren't going to do anything for us, so we decided to fix it," Lemmon said.

"We decided to have a benefit, get donations, buy this man a proper monument and put it in the cemetery. We are doing this because it's the right thing to do."

The Cemetery Board will purchase the monument at cost of \$1,540 with the help of Crane Funeral Home of Romulus and Inch Monuments of Northville. The monument will be 18 inches high and 24 inches wide and rest on a 6-inch base. It will be put in place and unveiled during a special memorial service on a date to be announced.

The original headstone will remain in place and the new monument will be installed at the gravesite.

"I believe this man has been neglected all these years," Lemmon said. "Everybody walked by the monument and didn't know the honor he received for serving his country. He wasn't given his rightful due. It's important to his family, important to the cemetery and important to the city."

A spaghetti dinner has been scheduled to raise funds for the new monument. It is planned for 5 to 7 p.m. Friday, April 20, at Romulus Veterans of Foreign Wars Post 9568, 30270 Huron River Dr. Tickets are \$10 each.

Grandson Bruce Cavetzka of Ypsilanti said he was very young when Charles Cavetzka died. His father, Frances, served in the Air Force during World War II and was a prisoner of war in Germany.

Cavetzka said Frances did not talk much about the military before he passed away.

"Once I heard about my grandfather, I was very proud of him," Cavetzka said. "It's a great honor to receive this honor. We're fortunate that Greg is so passionate about honoring my grandfather."

Cavetzka said a number of his grandfathers' descendants will attend the spaghetti dinner, including his daughters, who are Mr. Cavetzka's great-granddaughters. Cavetzka said he will bring the actual Medal of Honor and a certificate signed by the President, which was passed down to him by his father.

Cavetzka said a number of his relatives lived in Romulus and are buried in the Romulus Cemetery, which is considered a historical place since so many notable people are buried there.

"We were very surprised and very thankful," he said. "We have a lot of gratitude to the commission that's doing this. It's very gracious of them."

The fundraiser also will include basketball raffles and a \$500 drawing.

"To me, it's an honor to have him in our cemetery. This cemetery is one of the most valuable pieces of property in the city. The history we have in that cemetery is all of Romulus. We thought it was something we had to do," Lemmon said.

Superstar Wayne player wins full-ride scholarship

Camree Clegg, 17, is excited about her full-ride women's basketball scholarship to Clemson University in South Carolina.

"Super-excited," the Wayne Memorial High School senior said. "They just had everything I wanted in a school. I have a lot of family down South so it was a perfect fit."

The Westland resident was also a Miss Basketball finalist this year, and she and her team reached Class A state semifinals in a March 16 loss to East Lansing.

"We just came up a game short. I don't see it as a disappointment," she said. "I say it was a great experience."

Coach Jarvis Mitchell, in his fourth year at Wayne Memorial, noted, "She's worked so hard. She had to do a lot. We're very proud."

She is the only graduating senior on the team this year, so prospects are good for the Wayne squad next year. "We've got some kids coming back that are famil-

iar with the program," Mitchell said.

Clegg transferred from sports powerhouse Detroit Country Day, and said the decision was difficult in part due to academics and her parents' concerns.

"At first, it was hard but it ended up paying off in the end," she said. Her coach noted the long drive to Country Day "those things collectively played a part in her coming back to her home school," he said.

She's roughly 5-foot-5, although Mitchell said with a smile he's added some height when talking about Clegg with college recruiters. She boasts a 4.5 grade point average, and had scholarship offers from about 14 schools.

The point guard was easy to coach, Mitchell said, and he sees God's hand in her coming to Wayne Memorial. "That was like air for me," he said. "Oh, absolutely, oh, my God. I was so blessed. An absolute blessing."

She's been a help to younger teammates both on and off the court. "She was always giving them words of encouragement,"

Mitchell said.

Clegg will study sports communication at Clemson, with plans to become a sports journalist or analyst.

First, she hopes to play overseas or in the professional women's basketball league.

"That's definitely my plan A," she said. When the Detroit Shock played locally, Clegg said she admired Swin Cash and the team, "especially because it was the hometown team."

Other height, she said, "I just kind of worked my game around to it." She noted that Detroit Pistons' Isaiah Thomas and Spud Webb of the NBA were shorter.

She likes the play of the NBA player Chris Paul and the Women's National Basketball Association star Diana Taurasi.

"I'm just going to continue working on my game," said Clegg, who reports to Clemson in June.

"I'll be all working out and getting faster and stronger."

Her coach coined a "Godzilla" type nickname for her of "The Beast That Swallowed Tokyo," with his team finishing the sea-

"We tried to add a little spice to it," he said of the nickname. "Just add a little spice to it, to the nickname."

Clegg had helped Country Day win the 2014-15 Class B state championship. She visited the Clemson campus and liked it.

Her coach said her work ethic

will help with the Women's National Basketball Association.

"It's tough," Mitchell said. "I'm hoping she makes it. It was just an extraordinary pleasure coaching her."

He added of the transfer, "Never a hiccup. It just was this rare synergy that I think made the program successful."

manage and operate both facilities. PARC will continue to run Central Middle School as a landlord that leases space to anybody who is a nonprofit. Don Soenen will get his orchestra hall at taxpayer expense," the post continues.

Soenen said the rebroadcast calls were completely misleading and full of false information.

"This is crazy stuff. All of this is unsubstantiated information. It's a bunch of nonsense. These rebroadcast calls are a deliberate attempt to mislead the public," he said.

Conezma has also been critical of the proposed pension plan settlement with the city and claims that Heise has plans to sell the golf course to developers. She also claimed that proper procedures

were not followed in the adoption of the township budget in January.

Starting last year, shortly after the 2016 election, Conezma and a group of supporters commenced a barrage of Freedom of Information Act requests from the township offices. Recently Conezma requested all of Heise's emails regarding conversations surrounding the topic of the Hilltop Golf Course which is undergoing a citizens' advisory review process to determine its viability.

"Those who are responsible for the rebroadcasts know they are lying and they want to scare you. They think you are stupid. It speaks volumes about their character and sense of community."

"These robo-calls are being put out by people who lost the 2016 township elections and still can't deal with their loss. I hope they will find closure and get on with their lives," he concluded.
