Proposed outlet mall scuttled in Romulus

They just couldn't find enough tenants to break ground. The retail market is really struggling.

The project, initially announced in 2015, was first scheduled to break ground in 2016. As recently as January, a third partner had been announced and the development had been pushed back to 2018, but was still considered a live project.

Keyes said contact had dropped off after that, however, and progress has been nonexistent.

"In the end, I didn't think it was much of a surprise," he said. "This has been languishing for a while."

The construction of regional

outlet malls is downgrading across the country. National figures showed only eight outlet malls opened in 2016, compared to 15 the year before that. Even existing, profitable malls are losing major tenants.

Keyes' announcement came amidst a development report to the city council that showed a solid year in 2016 and a promising start to 2017. Nearly 60 major projects were initiated or completed in 2016 and another 30 are in the pipeline for 2017 already, he said. Last year, the

Ford to invest \$850 million at Wayne plant

The new Ford Ranger and Ford Bronco trucks will be built in Wayne.

Ford officials announced the plans to invest more than \$850 million at the Michigan Assembly Plant on Michigan Avenue to facilitate production of the vehicles in what Joe Hinrichs, Ford Motor Co. president of the Americas described as "consistent with what we agreed to and talked about with the UAW in 2015 negotiations."

Ford will retain all 4,000 workers currently at the Wayne facility. The announced invest-

ment is \$100 million more than Ford agreed to invest during the union contract negotiations, a spokesman said.

Ford spokesmen said the company would be making a total investment at three plants of \$1.2 billion, including \$200 million for a new advanced data center adjacent to the Flat Rock assembly plant and \$150 million at the engine plant in Romeo.

Plans to build the Ranger and Bronco trucks in Wayne was first announced last January at the Detroit Auto

Show. The trucks will replace the current Ford Focus and Ford C-Max being built in Wayne. Those models will be built at a Ford plant in Mexico.

Hinrichs said the new Ranger will have some changes in styling making it unique for North American customers. The Bronco will be a full-size truck based on the Ranger platform, he added.

"It's a package deal - the two vehicles go very nicely together," Hinrichs said.

The new vehicles will also have a new engine but Ford did

not announce where those engines would be manufactured. Hinrichs confirmed that state tax incentives were a factor in the decision to make the investments.

Michigan Strategic Fund board members announced last week that an economic development incentive package comprising a \$10 million performance-based grant and a State Essential Services Assessment Exemption estimated to be worth \$10.4 million over 15 years had been approved for the automaker.

Marshmallows will fly

Wayne County Parks and the Easter Bunny will kick off the 2017 special events season at 11 a.m. Friday, April 14 with its 23rd Annual Marshmallow Drop at Nankin Mills in Westland.

Thousands of children will gather to await a helicopter loaded with more than 20,000 marshmallows. As the marshmallows drop, children will race to collect as many as possible before trading them in for prizes. Children can also search for a special colored egg dropped among the marshmallows which can be redeemed for a prize.

Children will be separated in three age categories, 4 years old and younger, 5-7 years old, and 8 years and older.

New this year will be a selfie session at each park where families can take a photo using the hashtag #ItsRainingMarshmallows to post on their favorite social media site.

Grants (CDBGs), the former fire station on Goddard Road will be transformed into a restaurant, run by a Romulus resident who will lease the facility from the city. The former Whistle Stop restaurant downtown will re-open this year as a brew pub. Keyes said they hope to serve their first customers in June.

"We're sending most of our staff through the Redevelopment Ready program right now," Keyes said. "The program will open us up to various grant and loan programs and other forms of assistance to help bring businesses to the town."

The silver lining to the scuttled mall project, he added, is that the land is still there and still available for its best use. He said it was unfortunate that the mall was not going to happen at this time, but better for the city to have the project fall through now than not be successful.

"I'd rather have the empty land than to have something up, built, and always struggling," he said.

Rising high - Special plane rides offered at museum

Winter is slowly leaving Michigan, and soon the historic Waco biplane will be making its first public appearance when the 2017 flying season begins May 20 at the Detroit Aviation and Airline Collectibles Show at Yankee Air Museum.

"We are excited to open the hangar doors and offer rides in one of our newest flyable aircraft," said Kevin Walsh, executive director of the Yankee Air Museum. "Passengers enjoy its vibrant red color, vast wingspan and open cockpit design."

The YMF5C Waco biplane pays tribute to the barnstorming era; an important time in aviation history, spanning the 1920s and 1930s, in which biplanes (or aircraft with wings stacked one above the other) became increasingly popular. Waco Aircraft Co. quickly became the most recognized biplane manufacturer and has retained that title, even to this day. Modifications have been made to modernize the aircraft, but the spirit of the barnstorming era continues to inspire those who fly it, Walsh said.

Although generations have passed since the invention, Waco biplanes continue to impress all ages with their open-cockpit design and remarkable flying capabilities. "Everyone who flies in the Waco always has a great time and really

enjoys learning the history of the aircraft," said Geoff Bush, Waco Air Adventure representative at the Yankee Air Museum.

Sitting in an open-cockpit, riders view the landscape, landmarks and experience a new sense of freedom. The pilot will fly under Visual Flight Rules (VFR), which ensures the weather is ideal for an Air Adventure in the Waco. Yankee Air Museum pilots are knowledgeable about the aircraft, and have logged numerous hours of flight time.

The Detroit Aviation and Airline Collectibles Show will take place at Willow Run Airport, Hangar 1, 801 Kirk Field Dr., Ypsilanti, beginning at 9 a.m. Saturday May 20.

Although on-site openings may be available, reservations for Waco rides are highly recommended. Anyone wishing to reserve a ride and view additional information, is encouraged to visit the YAM website at <http://www.yankeeairmuseum.org/waco-biplane>, email: biplanerides@yankeeairmuseum.org or contact Bush at (734) 726-7569. projects represented about a \$149 million investment in the community as well as 1,130 new jobs. An additional 840 jobs were retained.

Some of those projects included adaptive reuse, such as the YPS company taking over the former Lee Steel facility and Panera Bread has renovated a warehouse and will now bake all the bread for its Detroit-based restaurants there.

Keyes said there was hope for smaller, inspiring projects, too. By embracing the Redevelopment Ready Certified Community Program through the Michigan Economic Development Corporation (MEDC), the city hopes to bring new life to the former Romulus Marketplace grocery store. Through the use of Community Development Block

NOTICE TO CUT NODDUS WEEDS

In the event of inclement or any persons or persons, firm or corporation having charge of any land in the Charter Township of Plymouth.

Notice is hereby given that all noxious weeds growing on any land in the Charter Township of Plymouth, Wayne County, Michigan, must be cut and destroyed on or before the 30th day of April, A.D. 2017. And every owner, occupant, or person having charge of any such land must notify the Township that such weeds have been destroyed within three days of such cutting. Any person failing to comply with this Township on or before the date mentioned shall be liable for the imposition of the penalties set forth in Ordinance Number 64, of the Charter Township of Plymouth, Wayne County, Michigan, and shall be liable for all expenses incurred by the Township in destroying said noxious weeds. If, in any case, it is required by the owner or the occupant, shall be spread against the property on the next County and School Tax Roll collection of such expenses. The Township may, with or without land with written notice registered, the owner, occupant, or agent, or the owner or the owner's County and School Tax Roll, of any land on which such noxious weeds are found growing. Such notice shall contain the methods of cutting and eradicating such noxious weeds and a summary of the financial position. Failure of the Township to give such notice shall not, however, constitute a defense to any action to enforce the payment of any penalty provided in this article or any other statute under this article.

Residents can now comment on proposed city projects

Westland residents now have the opportunity to actively participate in plans for development in their community.

The city has launched a web page that includes two short surveys for residents who can access the site and let their opinions be known. The website, citywestland.com, under Master Plan, also contains information about

meeting dates and updates on projects throughout the planning process, according to a statement from the office of Mayor William Wild.

The city master plan is not a rigid ordinance or local statute but is a guide to be used by the community, particularly members of the city planning commission, acting based on appeals and

the city council as policies and decisions that will affect the physical development of the community. As time progresses, the master plan must remain flexible to adapt to changes, according to the statement. A review of the master plan is mandated every five years by state statute.

Westland currently has a master plan steering committee and

members have met several times to start shaping policies, goals and objectives. The latest master plan update includes two small area projects, the Historic Village Park Plan and the Norwagayne Park. Each of these plans will be designed to guide development, redevelopment and investment in these specific areas.

"We held meetings on each of

these area plans in the month of March," commented Wild. "The feedback we received was informative and helpful and these surveys will give residents that missed the public meetings a chance to participate in the process."

All information related to the master plan process will be posted on the website.
