Suspect in hijackings, shootings killed

Farris was found deceased following an exchange of gunfire ...

The lone suspect in a violent overnight crime spree last week is deceased and has been identified as Allan Farris, 56, of Detroit.

According to a report from the Michigan State Police, the roughly 10-hour ordeal began in Canton Township and spanned nearly 20 miles of the metro Detroit area and included two carjackings, two shootings that injured two women, two attempted carjackings, one of which involved an undercover Michigan State Police Trooper,

and shots fired at police.

Farris was found deceased following an exchange of gunfire with members of the Michigan State Police Emergency Support Team in Detroit. The state police is the lead investigating agency with detectives from the Secure Cities Partnership Major Case Unit and First District

Investigative Response Team assigned to the investigation.

Based on the preliminary investigation, the following is a general timeline of events prepared from police reports and compiled by Michigan State Police:

• 9 p.m., Tuesday, April 3 - Report of attempted carjacking and

shooting near Joy and Morton Taylor roads in Canton near the Salvation Army thrift store. The female victim is in good condition.

• 9:05 p.m. - Report of attempted home invasion and shots fired in Canton. No injuries were reported.

• 9:15 p.m. - Report of home invasion, shooting and carjacking in Canton. The female victim in good condition.

• Police track Farris to the

Person of the Year Romulus to honor Rev. William Kren

For more than two decades, the Rev. William Kren has been active in the City of Romulus and a top supporter of community projects, programs and activities.

This year, Kren has been named the 33rd Romulus Person of the Year by the Greater Romulus Chamber of Commerce.

Kren will be honored during the annual Person of the Year Banquet on Friday, April 27, at the Radisson Detroit Metro Airport, 31500 Wick Road, Romulus. "His dedication, devotion and love for Romulus and its residents has always been a priority in Bill's life," said a group of individuals who nominated Kren for the honor. "He has been involved in our community for approximately 20 years and always steps up to the plate, when asked and not asked. He has always been a willing volunteer striving to

help make Romulus a better place to be."

Kren is an ordained minister in the Evangelical Church. He is currently the pastor of Dearborn Congregational Church in Dearborn. He has been in the ministry since 1982, serving churches in Michigan, Ohio and Indiana.

Kren and his wife, Sue, moved to Romulus in the summer of 1998 after accepting an assignment with Community United Methodist Church, Pastoring at Community United Methodist Church allowed him to serve outside the "four walls of the church" and in the community, he said. He would often tell others that "Romulus is my parish" and would volunteer whenever there was an opportunity to make a difference in the city he loves.

He also founded, served as the first president and remains an officer of, the Romulus Ministerial Alliance and helped organize Community Good Friday Services and the yearly Romulus National Day of Prayer ceremony. He organized special memorial services

each year and monthly Sunday services for seniors at the Senior Towers Apartments.

In 2006, after eight years with Community United Methodist Church, the Krens moved on to other adventures. They remain property owners in the city and Kren remains active in Romulus and continues to serve as secretary of the Romulus Downtown Development Authority.

He also remains an active member of the Rotary Club of

No millage increase in new Westland budget

Members of the Westland City Council received a \$87 million budget for approval from Mayor William R. Wild last week.

The balanced budget includes no increases in millage rates in the city and adds \$731,000 to the general fund balance, maintaining a rainy day fund of more than \$7 million.

The proposed budget includes funding for four police officers and three firefighters which are currently funded by

federal grants, as well as four additional dispatchers for the 911 center in the city. The budget also sets aside an additional \$300,000 contribution into the MERS pension plan for general employees to address the unfunded pension liability.

The budget also includes capital investments for parking lot improvements and building renovations at the Jefferson Barns Community Vitality Center, a new roof for Fire Station 4, lobby improvements

to the Mike Modano Ice Arena and various improvements at the Friendship Senior Center.

In terms of equipment, the budget includes provisions for new vehicles for the Cable Television Department and Department of Public Service, a new EMS Unit, a new refuse truck and three new police vehicles, body cameras, radios, vests and computers for the Police Department, maintenance equipment and amenities for the Parks and

Recreation Department and upgraded security cameras at the 18th District Court.

The budget proposal is available at www.cityofwestland.com under the OpenGov section.

"The administration has worked very hard on this year's budget proposal," commented Wild. "We are proud to present the city council with a proposal that reflects a continued reinvestment in our seniors, public safety, city assets and parks and recreation."

Canton Township Police Lt. Pat Sullivan understands the fear

disabled individuals can have for police and firefighters. He said he was pleased that the Canton Public Safety Department is partnering for an event to help families meet first responders, set for 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. Saturday, April 14.

"It's to dispel fears," he said, noting disabled people, such as those on the autism spectrum can fear flashing lights and authority figures. The event will

"The bright lights can scare them. It's getting them to know it's not necessarily a bad thing," the lieutenant said. "It's kind of like a meet and greet kind of thing."

Of those with autism, he said, "If they go missing, it makes it a challenge when we try to find them. Hopefully they won't hide from us."

The Community Connection Day is in partnership with Canton Public Safety, Plymouth-

Canton Community Schools as well as Canton Therapeutic Recreation. For more, call (734) 394-5367 or visit www.cantontown.org.

"Usually there's a good turnout. They get to meet officers and firefighters," he said, adding attendees also get to see police cars and trucks. "It's just another outreach for the community to get to know us and us to know the community better."

Westland Police uphold prestigious accreditation

"I am extremely proud of our staff," commented Westland Police Chief, Jeff Jedrusik. "This is not an easy process and fewer than 5 percent of the entire country's law enforcement agencies have been able to accomplish this task."

Since the first CALEA Accreditation Award was granted in 1984, the program has

become the primary method for an agency to voluntarily demonstrate their commitment to excellence in law enforcement. The standards upon which the Law Enforcement Accreditation Program is based reflect the current thinking and experience of law enforcement practitioners and researchers, according to the program website. Major law enforcement associations, leading educational and training institutions, governmental agencies, as well as law enforcement

executives internationally, acknowledge CALEA's Standards for Law Enforcement Agencies and its Accreditation Programs as benchmarks for professional law enforcement agencies.

"The Westland Police Department continues to demonstrate professional excellence," commented Mayor William R. Wild. "I commend Police Chief Jedrusik and the entire department for continuing to operate at this International Gold Standard for law enforcement agencies."

Cost for Kellogg Fountain repair is \$1.5 million

The highly-anticipated return of a revered Plymouth landmark has been delayed indefinitely as officials determine a way to fund the cost of renovations and replacement.

The fountain, which has graced Kellogg Park in the center of the city for nearly a half century, was removed pending repairs and replacement last year. The city itself had experienced numerous mechanical difficulties, officials said, and a

replacement design with new mechanics was accepted. Only one bid on the project was received by the city last week which was double the anticipated expense.

The bid, from FH Martin Constructors of Warren, totaled \$1.523 million for the work. The Wilcox Foundation had allocated \$700,000 for the new fountain. The late Jack Wilcox, for whom the foundation is named, donated the new fountain as a legacy

for his parents.

City officials had said they hoped to have the new fountain project under way this spring and complete by no later than

early next year.

While four companies had originally expressed an interest in the bid specifications, the city received only the single bid late

last month.

The design was prepared by landscape architect Mark Russell of Northville-based Russell Design. The design allows for easier access to the mechanics of the fountain which is planned for the same space as the former one. The new fountain design is 14 feet tall with water falling into a basin before flowing down granite steps to a lower basin. The top of the new fountain is designed in bronze.

County closes 3 'unsafe' bridges on Hines Drive

Wayne County Parks abruptly closed three Hines Parkway bridges Monday citing safety concerns.

A spokesman for the county said that serious shear cracks in the concrete members that support the middle concrete slab on the three bridges render them unsafe for pedestrian and vehicle traffic. Two of the bridges span the Rouge River. The first is located just west of Haggerty road and the second is further west on Haggerty just past Woods Drive. A third bridge is located west of I-

275 where the park drive underpasses the freeway. The bridges, built in 1932, are identical and should be completely replaced according to Wayne County Deputy Director of Roads Mike Gorman. Gorman said the bridges are past their design life.

Hines Drive has 282 bridges that undergo constant rotational inspection in alternate years, Gorman said. Until the inspection process is complete in about a week they will not know the total extent of the required repairs, he added. If the county budget permits, simultaneous construction repairs would take about a year from the commence-

ment date, he added. The bridges will remain closed until that work can be complete.

Gorman said county officials are concerned for the most affected users who will be the pedestrians and bikers who regularly travel Hines Drive. Gorman said he feels motorists will be able to resolve the closing with alternate paths.

Plymouth Township Fire Chief Dan Phillips says the road closure of Hines Drive for the bridge repairs will likely have little effect on the township fire department and public safety now that Northville Township firefighters are sharing the Lake

Pointe Fire Station.

Protocol for fire department vehicles stipulate they not use Haggerty Road when responding to Lake Pointe area calls from the Haggerty-Ann Arbor Road station

because of potential train delays on Haggerty south of Plymouth Road.

"It all has to do with budget," Gorman said regarding any timeframe for repairs.
