## 73-year-old charged in Van Buren homicide

A 73-year-old Van Buren Township man has charged with first degree premeditated murder in the shooting death of another township resident, described as his "drinking buddy."

Police were called to 49170 Michigan Ave. at 7:54 p.m. April 9 in response to a report of shots being fired. Officers searched the residence and then the area immediately surrounding the property where they discovered Eric Williams, 44, of Van Buren Township, lying on the ground with severe injuries to his abdomen and chest, according to police reports.

Officers reported that Williams was not breathing, did not have a pulse and had apparently expired from an apparent gunshot wound.

Van Buren Township Police officers secured the area and established preliminary investigative actions to locate any possible witnesses and preserve evidence, according to police reports. The police Investigative Division and Evidence Technician Team responded to the scene and assumed control of the investigation.


While at the scene, officers collected evidence and canvassed the area surrounding the address, searching for anyone who might have witnessed the incident or had information related to the investigation. During the course of this investigation, Van Buren Police officers detained 73-year-old Kenneth William Coskie, a Van

Buren Township resident, and transported him to police headquarters for questioning. Coskie was subsequently arrested and charged with the killing of Williams.

Coskie was arraigned April 11 at the 34th District Court in Romulus before Judge David M. Parrott. He is charged with felony firearm and as a habitual offender in addition to the first-degree murder charge.

Coskie is being held on a \$1 million or 10 percent cash bond. His preliminary court examination on the charges is scheduled for April 23 before 34th District Court Judge Brian Oakley.

### **'Fascinating Rhythm'** Local craftsman restores piano of legendary George Gershwin

An 80-year-old superstar left Plymouth last week after spending more than three months of rehabilitation in Old Village.

The star in question is the ebony grand piano that belonged to George Gershwin, who with his brother, Ira, composed nearly every Broadway hit show and score of the 1910s, 20s and 30s. Gershwin remains the most prolific and recognizable composer of his generation with much of his music written at the Steinway that Pat DeBeliso at PianoCrafters in Plymouth just finished restoring.

"If Gershwin walked in today

he would find the movement and action of his piano exactly the way he left it," DeBeliso explained.

The piano, a 6-foot, 4-inch Steinway Grand Model A, has now been carefully transported from DeBeliso's shop to the University of Michigan where it will be part of a permanent music exhibit, The Gershwin Initiative, at the School of Music, Theatre and Dance. The piano will be housed in a glass case and displayed along with a great deal of other Gershwin memorabilia donated to the school by the Gershwin family. Todd Gershwin, the grandnephew of George and Ira Gershwin, is a University of Michigan alumnus. He was instrumental in the donation of memorabilia through his father, Marc George Gershwin, who heads the Gershwin Foundation.

According to a crash analysis of the site, with data obtained from the Traffic Improvement Association (TIA), there have been 113 crashes in 36 months at the intersection, making the critical crash rate double that of crashes

visitors has always been a top priority for my administration. When I hear that there have been 27 crashes in 2013, and 40 in 2012 at

this location alone, I know that we need to come up with a solution immediately," said Mayor William Wild.

Construction on the intersection, slated to start in early July, is expected to be complete by mid-October. Private utility relocation will begin before the road project, starting this spring.

"The partnership with MDOT has given us the opportunity to address this problem with an emphasis on best practices for

drivers' safety, while allowing us to move forward without delay," added Wild. "The new design will improve traffic flow and make the intersection safer."

The upcoming project will not only include the reconstruction of the intersection of Cherry Hill and Newburgh Road, but the west side of Cherry Hill will also be widened from four to five lanes, and there will be an area at the west end of the project which transitions the road from the newlybuilt five-lanes to the existing twolane road. Other features of the project include a new traffic signal installation at the intersection, drainage improvements and sidewalk enhancements.

The estimated cost of the project is \$1,163,000. The state, through federal funding, will pay 81.85 percent of the total costs of construction, or \$952,000. Westland and Wayne County have agreed to split the remaining \$211,000 cost of the project, with a total cost to the city of \$105,500. The project was bid in November, 2013 with Florence Cement Co. awarded the contract for the work.

There is also a separate project on Newburgh Road from Palmer to Cherry Hill scheduled to commence in May. That project should be complete by early July. The two projects are being coordinated to provide the least impact on traffic and motorists, Wild said.

## Piano

DeBeliso said that working on the instrument was both thrilling and humbling, considering the history of the piano and the musical genius of its owner who created Porgy and Bess, My One and Only, Swanee, Rhapsody in Blue, Crazy for You, But Not For Me, They Can't Take That Away From Me and so many other unforgettable lexicons of American music. Gershwin's music and shows are frequently revived on Broadway today and a touring company of Porgy and Bess was recently at the Fisher Theater downtown where renditions of Summertime, It Ain't Necessarily So and Bess, You Is My Woman Now brought audiences to their feet nightly.

The piano remains dinged, dented, scratched and scarred as no effort has been or will be made to refinish the exterior. The superstar names of famous movie and Broadway legends who leaned on it, sat in front of it and sang to the music Gershwin played at it are legion.

Marks remain imbedded in the piano finish where Gershwin would lean spiral ringed notebooks as he wrote his iconic music. The soundboard and pin block, however, are exact handcrafted replicas of the originals, necessary replacements to preserve the musical integrity of the instrument.

"If they sent it to the Steinway factory,

they would just install a new soundboard," DeBeliso said. "That's not what I did. I replicated the originals exactly, in the most minute detail to ensure the integrity of the piano." That painstaking craftsmanship took more than three months of steady work, interspersed with some other restorations in the shop.

DeBeliso said he's pleased with the result because it is what the Gershwin family wanted it to be. "They were specific when they donated the piano, they didn't want it to be a relic. They wanted it to play music," DeBeliso said.

And play it does. DeBeliso ensured that the piano was in near perfect order before it left his shop. Bob Grijalva, the head piano technician at the University of Michigan, will fine tune the piano on site at the college.

"You could say, I installed the new engine and Bob will fine tune the racecar," DeBeliso said.

Not that he couldn't do the fine tuning himself. DeBeliso studied his craft for years and earned his piano technology degree in 1974. He then began working in the business, first at Smiley Brothers doing concert work tuning pianos. He worked at Pine Knob and Meadowbrook, too, and then, as his reputation and expertise increased, began to travel to tune and sometimes repair pianos out of state, several times for major celebrities.

For several years before he and his wife, LuAnne, opened PianoCrafters in 1983, he was fine tuning pianos across the country for some pretty recognizable names like

Frank Sinatra and Tony Bennett. The traveling, however, took a great deal of time, and after marriage, the couple moved to Plymouth and opened PianoCrafters. Music superstars, however, didn't forget DeBeliso's work, and he has had pianos belonging to Burt Bacharach, Steven Sills and Kenny Rogers in the shop.

"Bacharach wrote the title of all the songs he composed on that piano, on the inside of it," he recalled.

His reputation as one of the most gifted Steinway restorers in the country brought him to the attention of Grijalva at the university. Since DeBeliso now repairs and restores Steinways from colleges in New York, Florida and Overland College in Ohio, Grijalva decided he was the man with the experience, skill and sense of history to take on the legendary Gershwin piano.

The old, cracked soundboard, pin board and keyboard, which were irreparable, were also returned to the university and their future hasn't yet been determined.

"This man (Gershwin) was the major force behind American music. Everybody in the shop has been a buzz since the piano came in," DeBeliso said.

"I really did feel humbled just to work on it."



Beyond the art workshop and the computer lessons, student volunteer Zach Racho said the experience was more about engaging the seniors.


"This was fun," Racho said. "I really liked getting to know them and hear all their stories."



The plan will be considered by members of the Westland City Council this month and if approved then go to the State Court Administration Office for approval before the "concurrent jurisdiction" plan can go into effect.

"We are not merging the courts," explained Wayne 29th District Court Magistrate Linda Gable. "This is a plan to share jurisdiction and some services, it is not a merger."

The shared jurisdiction will solve the heavy caseload in the 18th

A plan to have the Wayne and district Court in Westland where the number of cases heard would require 2.83 judges, rather than the current two, according to a state study. In Wayne, Judge Laura Mack sees about .64 of the caseload suggested by the same state study.

According to Gable, this concurrent jurisdiction would allow Mack to hear small claims cases from Westland in the Wayne court, lightening the caseload of current Judges Mark McConnell and Sandra Cicirelli.

"We will each maintain our courts separately, but share some services," Gable said, "and this will also allow us to cross assign magistrates. If the caseload is heavy in Westland, I could be sent there or one of their magistrates could be sent here."

Currently, the work program is still effective in Wayne, although it is administered in the Westland court. The 18th District Court provides a van for the program and defendants do work in both communities, Gable said.

"People have said we don't have the work program here any longer which is clearly not true," Gable said.

Gable said the plan presented multiple efficiencies and cost savings for both communities although the exact amounts could not be quantified as the plan is too new. In fact, Gable said, she believes this is the first district to district concurrent jurisdiction plan in the state. Other courts have merged or had jurisdictional parity approved, but not when both were at the district level, she explained.

The plan, if approved by the Westland council members, will then be sent to the state for approval but there is no projected date for a decision. McConnell said that the new concurrent jurisdiction plan has received tentative approval at the state level during a presentation to the Wayne council members.

The concurrent jurisdiction plan is a variation of a court reorganization law that would eliminate the 29th District Court in Wayne and merge it with Westland. This

plan would avoid that merger while accomplishing the same goal, easing the caseload in the Westland court by adding cases to the Wayne docket, Gable said.

The two courts operate a joint probation program which began in October and judges from both courts have said that it is working well. Rather than hiring a probation officer at the Wayne court, the operation was transferred to Westland.

"This will help, too, when judges or magistrates are on vacation or unavailable and some immediate action like an arraignment or a search warrant is needed," Gable said.
