Northville doctor charged with mutilation

Dr. Nagarwala is alleged to have performed horrifying acts of brutality on the most vulnerable victims.

A Northville doctor has been charged with the genital mutilation of two 7-year-old girls although federal agents believe many more children may have been subjected to the surgical procedure performed in her Livonia office.

Dr. Jumanu Nagarwala, 44, was arrested last Thursday by federal agents and appeared in U.S. District Court Monday when U.S. Magistrate Judge Mona Majnoub ordered her jailed until his next court appearance on the charges. The judge called Nagarwala "a danger to the community." Nagarwala is facing 30 years imprisonment on the genital mutilation charge, which is considered a criminal sex act,

along with another 5-year sentence for transportation of an individual with intent to engage in criminal sexual activity.

She is accused of performing genital mutilation on two 7-year-old girls brought to the area from Minnesota by their parents to have the procedure, a practice of some religious sects in Africa, the Middle East and Asia.

Agents from the United States

Attorney's Office for the District of Eastern Michigan said in a statement that they believe this is the first such prosecution in the country under the federal female genital mutilation law. The indictment claims that Nagarwala may have performed the procedure on girls as young as 6. Nagarwala's attorney, Shannon Smith told the court Monday that Nagarwala per-

formed a "cleansing" of the children, not a genital mutilation. Smith had no response to Majnoub's questions as to why there were no records of the children's visits and no billing records. She demanded Smith explain exactly what Nagarwala did to the children during the after-hours visits. Smith characterized the procedures as "a scraping of a membrane."

"According to the complaint, despite her oath to care for her patients, Dr. Nagarwala is alleged to have performed horrifying acts of brutality on the most vulnerable victims," Acting Assistant Attorney General

Day of service

Kiwanis event pays tribute to founder

Linda Siegrist is grateful the second annual Greater Plymouth Service Project will take place on Saturday, May 13, at the Plymouth Arts & Recreation Complex (PARC) in downtown Plymouth.

"Oh, absolutely," the Plymouth Township resident said of the anti-hunger effort. Her husband, Dave Siegrist, who on Jan. 1 lost his battle with cancer at age 61, had the vision for last year's inaugural service event last spring.

"He had that vision of trying to unite the community. He would tell me, 'I never started a project I haven't successfully finished,'" she said. "He just put his whole heart and soul into it."

"He had this vision of connecting all the service clubs together," said Nick Schultz of Plymouth Township, chairman of the event this year. He added that connection quickly branched out to include churches and school groups.

Dave Siegrist was a long-time Colonial Kiwanis member and headed the Community Foundation of Plymouth, affiliated with the Ann Arbor Foundation.

"He never complained, never made it his focus," Schultz said of Siegrist's illness. A volunteer committee is carrying on the May 13 event to benefit the Kids Coalition

Against Hunger. Like last year, volunteers will gather at PARC to package meals.

Committee members said they were gratified that nearly \$40,000 of the \$70,000 goal for this year had been collected by mid-March. That will provide 250,000 adult meals, Schultz said. He said he was also pleased with the number of young volunteers scheduled to participate.

"This is something they can identify with, get their hands around," Schultz added.

Donations can also be made online at www.cfpymouth.org May 13 and registrations to volunteer are also welcome at the website. Doug Wallace of Plymouth Township, membership director for the Plymouth Community Chamber of Commerce, also has volunteer information at (734) 433-1540.

The goal is to recruit 1,500 volunteers, Wallace said he's

pleased NorthRidge Church has donated \$15,000.

"They're planning on bringing 300 volunteers, which is great," Wallace said.

Linda Siegrist said the volunteers enjoy a sense of community.

"They were so grateful to have this opportunity to come together as a unified group. I feel the community has become a family."

Dave Siegrist was an avid golfer, hunter and fisherman. "He went to Scotland, and to Alaska several times. He had a family member who lived there," she said.

The couple has three grown children, two in Texas and son, Michael, who is the Canton Township Clerk.

Dave was a CPA and investment advisor. "He loved the challenge, anything unusual that came up," his wife of 38 years, said. She's also a CPA and the couple worked together.

Schultz urged the public to volunteer for the Greater Plymouth Service Project, "and it's Mother's Day weekend, too. That's kind of a nice time," he said.

Westland Earth Day honors 'green' efforts

Opening the city's original time capsule was exciting and fascinating.

Earth Day in Westland will be marked with recognition of past accomplishments along with plans for future energy-conscious efforts.

The eighth annual Earth Day celebration will take place at 3 p.m. tomorrow at Westland City Hall and include the burial of a time capsule to be opened during the 100th anniversary of the city in 2093.

Included in the time capsule will be items collected from residents, businesses, city officials and various civic organizations that detail life in Westland as it is during the present day. During a celebration of the 50th anniversary of the city last year officials opened a time capsule

buried half a century ago which contained artifacts and items from the 1960s.

"Opening the city's original time capsule was exciting and fascinating," commented Mayor William Wild. "We have worked closely with the Westland Historic Commission to ensure that in 50 years, when the capsule is exhumed, they will have an insight into what it was

like in Westland and how our All American City developed."

During the Earth Day celebration tomorrow, Wild will be presenting the coveted Mission: Green Eco-Award to DTE Energy in recognition of the partnership which saw the replacement of 2,882 mercury vapor streetlights with energy-efficient LED lights in the city, to David Miller, president of Duo

Guard for donating an electric vehicle charging station to the city and to State Rep. Robert Kosowski for helping to secure a \$150,000 grant from the Department of Natural Resources for the recreation complex at Jefferson Barns Community Vitality Center and a separate \$100,000 grant from the Michigan Economic Development Corporation for the Lincoln Field recreation complex.

"As part of my Mission: Green Initiative, I use our Annual Earth Day Celebration to recognize members of the community who have shown dedication to

Town hall Officials host citizens' meeting

State Rep. Kristy Pagan (D-Canton) was joined by U.S. Congresswoman Debbie Dingell (MI-12) for a town hall at Belleville High School last Thursday. Pagan and Dingell discussed the federal health care proposal, in addition to several federal budget proposals and how they would impact the people of Michigan. Following the discussion, the legislators took questions from the audience.

"With all the changes happening under the new administration, I have heard a lot of concerns from residents about how the decisions made in Washington will impact Michigan and our local communities," Pagan said. "That is why I was honored to have Congresswoman Dingell join to help address these concerns head on. It is so important that residents feel connected to those they elected to serve them, and

Congresswoman Dingell has truly been a champion for our communities. I value the input and feedback we received from the town hall, as it will certainly help me better represent our community in the Michigan Legislature."

Pagan and Dingell were joined by Ezime Ndokwe, a health care analyst for the Center for Healthcare Research & Transformation (CHRT), a nonprofit, nonpartisan organization committed to improving health and informing policy based on facts, and Timothy Michling, a research associate with the Citizens Research Council of Michigan (CRC), a nonprofit, nonpartisan research organization that provides factual, unbiased, independent information.

Pagan and Dingell addressed a full room on Thursday evening and topics varied from the failed federal health care bill to proposed federal cuts to the

Great Lakes Restoration Initiative, Meals on Wheels and after-school programs.

"Thursday's discussion addressed the deep concerns many people have about the future of our country's healthcare system and potential budget cuts that jeopardize critical programs that protect the environment and allow our seniors to

age with dignity. State Rep. Kristy Pagan and I understand the importance of providing Michigan residents the facts," Dingell said. "It is critical for all of us on the federal and local level to work together to ensure Michigan stays strong and our residents have their voices heard."

Former supervisor indicted in state lawsuit

Former Plymouth Township Supervisor Shannon Price is among the 20 state employees named in a lawsuit seeking personal emails from the staff of State Attorney General Bill Schuette.

Price worked in the department of constituent relations for Schuette from 2011 until 2015 when he left to become the Wayne County Commissioner from the 11th District.

A group called Progress Michigan launched a lawsuit against Schuette claiming his office violated the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) law and failed to preserve state records, Mark Brewer, representing the

group, hand-delivered the suit to the Court of Claims inside the Lansing hall of Justice last Tuesday.

The lawsuit claims that Schuette and 20 of his staff members, including Price, used private emails to conduct government business during a six-year period.

State employees who use personal e-mail accounts to perform official functions are clearly exempt from public records subject to the provisions of the Freedom of

"The lawsuit claims that Schuette and 20 of his staff members, including Price, used private emails to conduct government business during a six-year period."

Information Act, the lawsuit contends.

The lawsuit further alleges that Schuette and at least 12 other state employees used personal e-mail accounts for official communications. The lawsuit lists a series of e-mails from May 2014 and May 2015 in which senior staff meetings, news conference and media interviews were scheduled.

Progress Michigan is described on the website as a non-profit corporation group that seeks to advocate and educate people about "progressive issues."

Brewer said the complaint is seeking the production of the requested emails, or a declaration that their destruction was illegal.

Currently, members of the

Michigan Legislature, governor, and lieutenant governor are not subject to FOIA requests while the office of the attorney general is not excluded from the provisions of the law.

Schuette's Communications Director Andrea Bitley, also named in the suit, said the office is reviewing the lawsuit.

Price left the Wayne County Commission when he was appointed to fill the supervisor's term left vacant by the resignation of Richard Reuse. He was subsequently defeated in the November 2016 election and is now reportedly working in Government Affairs with M&B Consulting.

Kenneth Blanco said in a statement. "The Department of Justice is committed to stopping female genital mutilation in this country and will use the full power of the law to ensure that no girls suffer such physical and emotional abuse."

Nagarwalla has been placed on administrative leave from her job as an emergency care physician with the Henry Ford Health System.

"We are shocked by the allegations. The alleged criminal activity did not occur at any Henry Ford facility. We would never support or condone, anything relating to this practice, said Henry Ford Health System spokesman David Olszajn in a prepared statement. According to the Henry Ford Health System website, Nagarwalla earned her medical

degree from Johns Hopkins in 1998 and completed her residency at Henry Ford Hospital in Detroit in 1999 specializing in emergency medicine.

"Female genital mutilation constitutes a particularly brutal form of violence against women and girls. It is also a federal felony in the United States. The practice has no place in modern society, and those who perform female genital mutilation on minors will be held accountable under federal law," said Acting U.S. Attorney Daniel Lemich.

Federal investigators said that Nagarwalla is alleged to be part of a religious and cultural community that is known to practice genital mutilation on girls.

Steve Kamajala, president of the Indian Association of Minnesota, where the alleged victim reside with their parents, said the allegations are shocking and deplorable. He said that genital mutilation is not a Hindu practice or condoned in India.

Mayor submits balanced budget to council members

Mayor William Wild presented the members of city council a \$66,361,088 balanced budget for consideration earlier this month.

In his attached comments, Wild told the members of the council members that the proposed budget adds \$553,413 to the fund balance for the 2017-2018 fiscal year.

Wild said the city could anticipate very low increase in property tax revenue of about 3.05 percent, which is an increase from the last few years and more than the anticipated 1.5 percent increase. Wild said the increase was estimated at \$312,000.

Wild has proposed the current 18,882 mills remain in place this year in the five-year plan he presented with the budget.

He noted that state shared revenue this year will decrease and be \$60,000 less than projected levels in the 2016-2017 budget. He told the council that the city expects to receive an estimated \$1,253 million in state revenue sharing this year.

Additionally, he noted, revenue sources in the city have remained consist-

ent or increased for several line items including court revenue which is expected to increase to \$5 million for 2017-2018; community development building rental has increased to \$90,000 as a result of successful effort to rent excess space in the Jefferson Barnes building and the city cable television department will begin providing video production services to other communities and organizations estimated to bring in about \$10,000 in revenue for 2017-2018.

This budget also includes cost recovery fees for additional services from the

city fire department incurred during rescue runs. The costs are allowable recoveries from insurance companies and are not additional fees charged to residents or businesses. These fees are estimated at \$75,000 in revenue for the city.

The budget also includes an anticipated sale of the Hawthorne Valley property and/or other excess city assets for an additional \$500,000 in revenue. Wild noted that the city received a refund from MMRMA of \$372,049, which was \$2,000 more than anticipated.

Wild detailed the savings that federal

SAFER and COPS grants have provided in the fire and police departments but noted that there have been some added costs that could continue to increase.

"The most significant change is related to the City's required contribution amounts into the MERS pension plan," he said. Annual increases through 2026 to the plan are estimated at 10 percent or more annually.

Healthcare costs also continue to be a significant expenditure line item for most department budgets, Wild noted. Based on estimates from Plante Moran, Wild said, the city has included 7 percent annual increases in the budget forecast. The proposed 2017-18 budget includes a 10 percent decrease in all departmental overtime budgets (except those originally below \$7,500).

Wild did not include any reductions in staffing or layoffs and stressed the continued level of city services remain in place.

The budget will now be studied and considered by members of the council and any revisions or changes implemented prior to submission to the state as required by law.
