## Inkster officer faces charges in arrest

William Melendez, the Inkster officer seen on a patrol-car videotape severely beating a suspect during a traffic stop, has been charged with misconduct in office, mistreatment of a prisoner and assault with intent to do great bodily harm less than murder by Wayne County Prosecutor Kym Worthy.

The charges carry a maximum five-year and a 10-year prison sentence respectively. Melendez, 46, was also fired by Inkster City Manager Richard Marsh, Jr. on April 15, following the completion of the investigation into the incident by the Michigan State Police and a departmental investigation ordered by Inkster Police Chief Vicki Yost. Melendez was

officially fired by Inkster after a five-day suspension according to his union representative, Teamsters Local 214 Business Representative Al Lewis. He was also fired from his part-time detective position in Highland Park, officials said.

The incident achieved statewide publicity and went viral on the internet after Gregory Rohl, the attorney for Floyd Dent, the 57-year-old Detroit man beaten during the Jan. 28 traffic stop, released the video-

tape in defense of his client who was arrested on drug charges. Rohl said at the time that further videotape from the patrol car showed Melendez planting drugs in Dent's car. That claim was apparently validated by the state police investigation which resulted in the decision by Worthy to dismiss the remaining possession of cocaine charges against Dent. The charges of assault and resisting arrest were dismissed against Dent at his ini-

tial arraignment in 22nd District Court before Judge Sabrina Johnson after the videotape was shown. Dent has no criminal record.

Dent was admitted to a local hospital following the arrest and processing at his Inkster Police Station. He was hospitalized for two days for treatment of his injuries which included a broken eye socket. The videotape shows Melendez pulling Dent from his vehicle executing and maintaining a choke hold on him while continuing to strike him in the head. Dent used his right arm in an apparent attempt to shield himself from Melendez' blows, preventing a

## County commission appoints Barone to seat

Plymouth attorney Joe Barone has been appointed to the Wayne County Commission to fill the vacancy created by the departure of Shannon Price, who resigned from the commission to accept the appointment as Plymouth Township supervisor.

The commission accepted Price's resignation and subsequently appointed Barone at its April 16 meeting. Barone will represent the 10th Commission District, which includes Canton Township, Plymouth and Plymouth Township.

Price, R-Plymouth Township, was appointed as the new supervisor on April 2, replacing Richard Reaume, who opted to retire. Price began his second two-year term on the Wayne County Commission on Jan. 1. The term runs through Dec. 31, 2016.

"It's a bittersweet moment for me," Price said in his resignation letter, which became effective April 10. "I enjoyed working with every single one of you on the commission, but I have a tremendous opportunity in front of me.

"You have a tremendous task ahead of you, but you know that," he continued. "I have great stories about getting things done here."

Price supported the appointment of Barone as his replacement. The Wayne County Charter says the commission shall fill a vacancy by appointing someone who is a registered voter from the district and of the same political party as the departing commissioner.

Barone, 43, has been an attorney with Barone Law Offices PLC in Plymouth since 1997. He is the managing partner and is a member of the state bars of Michigan and Illinois. He has extensive experience in several areas of law and served as the Northville Township interim prosecuting attorney. In 2008, he narrowly lost in a race for judge in the Plymouth-based 35th District Court.

## Wayne council still divided on ward voting

Members of the Wayne City Council were again divided on the issue of city-wide voting for each council seat despite voter approval of election by precincts.

A resolution calling for at-large or city-wide voting for each council seat was again stymied by a tie vote during the council meeting recently.

Voters approved two charter amendments last November, one establishing term limits for elected offices in the city and the other requiring city council members be elected from wards or precincts. While ballot language was specific that the mayor was subject to city-wide voting, the ballot did not

spell out the requirement that the candidate from each ward be elected by voters only from that ward.

Ron Roberts, who initiated the ballot initiatives, made it clear to the members of the council during a meeting last month and again last week, that the petition language was clear on this point and only the ballot language was less specific. He cautioned the council members he believes are attempting to

circumvent the intent of the changes that they are violating the will of the voters.

"The intent of the petitions and the vote was very clear," Roberts said, and he urged the council members to follow the specific language of the original petitions.

"There is no doubt of the intent. Do we have a council up there that is going to break the law and go against the oath they took?" Roberts said. "The

law was passed by the majority of voters. There was no ambiguity. The attorney general approved this; they don't have a dog in this fight."

His opinion was seconded by community-activist Chris Sanders who said it was clear what people voted on.

"It seems to some people like the ballot question language was purposely vague," Sanders said. "The intent of this change was very clear."

Without a clear specification in the local governmental charter, at-large voting is the accepted norm throughout the state, according to the office of the

## Canton water rates to increase by 8.6 percent

Water rates in Canton Township will increase by 8.6 percent following approval of the new rate by members of the board of trustees last week.

The new rate could increase typical homeowners' quarterly bills from \$358 to \$389 based on use of about 32,000 a quarter. That is an additional \$31 quarterly or \$124 annually for each household in the township.

In a plan to offset the expense, township officials have been negotiating a purchase of a water storage tank from the

Detroit Water and Sewerage Department which is one of two located in the township. The tank, located near Joy and Morton Taylor, would allow the township to store water and ease the usage from Detroit during peak morning and evening hours.

At the meeting last week, Supervisor Phil LaJoy said that talks regarding the purchase of the tank are continuing and that he is hopeful some agreement could be reached this summer.

LaJoy told the board members that the two sides are close to reaching an agreement. The

purchase would be a cost-efficient alternative to the township installing a new storage tank or water tower, which could be a significant financial burden. LaJoy said he was hopeful that the township could save "a lot of money" with the purchase of an existing tank from Detroit.

Talks with Detroit have been under way since last year. Detroit Water and Sewerage Department Director Sue McCormick discussed the issue

second officer from handcuffing Dent's arms behind his back. Dent struggled against having his arm restrained and Melendez continued to pound his head with his fist. The three continue to struggle on the ground as a third officer arrives on the scene and violently kicks Dent. Then a fourth officer Tasers Dent in the thigh and stomach as he is being handcuffed.

Dent, according to official police reports, ran a stop sign in the area of South River Park Drive and Inkster Drive at about 10 p.m. He allegedly did not immediately respond as the officers attempted to make a traffic stop but drove another four blocks. When Dent did pull over, he opened his car door as officers approached his 2011 Cadillac with guns drawn. Police reports indicate that Dent made a verbal threat against the officers as he opened the car door, prompting their defensive actions, an allegation Dent and Rohl strongly deny. Police said in their report that Dent was in a "known drug trafficking area."

In a prepared statement, Worthy said the Michigan State Police began an investigation into the incident on March 23. The results of that investigation were submitted to the prosecutor's office where a separate and independent investigation was conducted. Worthy said that investigation included the review of police and televised video footage, along with witness statements, police documents, radio and dispatch recordings, photographs of Dent's injuries, statements made by Dent and interviews of officers who responded to

the scene where Dent was arrested.

"Public confidence in the law enforcement is eroded when police officers abuse citizens. This devalues greatly the work that the majority of police officers in this country perform daily," Worthy said.

"The alleged police brutality in this case cannot and will not be tolerated."

Melendez is also listed as the CEO of Strategic Security, a private security and firearms training company. Prior to being hired in Inkster, Melendez was a Detroit Police Officer where he was involved in as many as 12 prior lawsuits alleging civil rights violations and police brutality. He is accused in a federal lawsuit, along with six other officers, of choking and beating a man unconscious, then detaining him for three days before releasing him. No criminal charges were ever filed against the plaintiff in the case who claims that when police barged into an Inkster home in July of 2011, he was in the bathroom. He says in the suit that he complied with the officers' orders, dropped to the floor and was subsequently subjected to a violent beating by officers on the scene, including Melendez.

Melendez is also accused in a lawsuit filed by surviving family members of invading a home without a warrant in November of 2003 and fatally shooting a man. That suit was settled by the City of Detroit for \$50,000. Melendez was indicted along with 16 fellow Detroit police officers in 2003 stemming from claims they planted evidence, falsified reports and stole cash and property from suspects. A jury acquitted the officers in that case.

Melendez was arraigned on the felony charges Tuesday at the 22nd District Court.

Hivert-Carthew will discuss the life and works of Austen. Born and educated in France, Hivert-Carthew currently lives in Michigan. She first became known for her work on Antoine de Lamothe Cadillac, founder of Detroit. She wrote “Cadillac and the Dawn of Detroit” in 1994, then went on to write five more books.

with township officials during a visit last year and she seemed amenable to the plan, officials said. The benefit to the Detroit department is a cost savings in having Canton manage water usage in the

township.

Detroit levied a 21-percent water and sewer rate increase on the township this year. To offset those increased costs, township officials used \$2.5 million from the local water-sewer fund, allowing the increase to homeowners at the lower 8.6 percent rate. LaJoy added that the township was able to help offset the costs by “good basic financial management.”

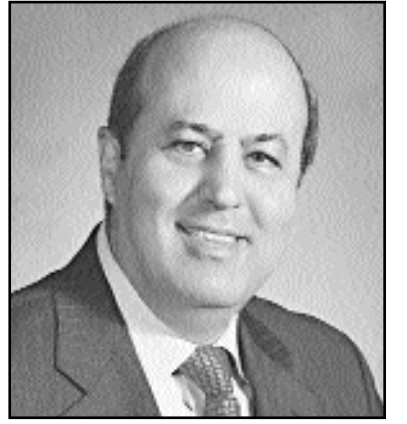

attorney general.

City attorney Keith Madden disagreed with Roberts and Sanders, however. He said that his discussion with the office of the attorney general did not solve the issue. He told the council members and the audience that the issue must be resolved by action of the city council with an amendment clarifying the voting procedures. Madden also said that clarifying the language on the ballot and the petitions was not the responsibility of the city but fell to Roberts.

Councilman Anthony Miller agreed with Roberts and Sanders and said the proposal to implement city-wide voting for the council precincts violated the will of the people.

"The citizens are yearning for a change; I'm asking my colleagues to reconsider," Miller said. "People are looking for leaders who make doors and windows, not walls. This doesn't increase

the confidence level. The council needs to do what the will of the people was."

The council resolution came following a recommendation from a committee which included Roberts, council members Skip Monit and John Rhaesa and residents Buddy Shuh and Margaret Harlow. Shuh said that without this resolution, he would only be allowed to vote for one member of the city council rather than all six officials.

Councilman Al Damitio suggested for the second time that the council put the issue before voters, rather than make an arbitrary decision. No action was taken on his suggestion, and Damitio joined Monit and Rhaesa in voting for the resolution allowing city-wide voting for all council seats.

Councilwoman Susan Rowe, Miller and David James cast no votes. Mayor James Hawley, who voted against the amendment at the previous vote, was absent from the meeting. Rowe suggested a second committee, without participation from sitting council members, be named to review the issue.

No action was taken on her suggestion.

## Builder to replace faulty concrete at pavilion

New Plymouth Township Supervisor Shannon Price has responded quickly to the concerns of some residents with property bordering McClumpha Park.

The neighboring property owners, many with several years construction experience, expressed concern regarding the quality of material and workmanship at the all-weather pavilion currently being constructed in the park.

The residents questioned the concrete foundation installed by the second-lowest bidder on the project, Acme Enterprises of Roseville. The pavilion project was a hotly-contested issue prompting severe criticism and unfavorable citizen comment dur-

ing meetings of the board of trustees prior to approval by the trustees. Citizens questioned and protested the expense of the pavilion which is part of a \$1.5 million recreation plan approved by the township board.

Last week, observers discovered that the interior floor of the main plaza of the pavilion had been demolished and large broken concrete slabs stacked at the edge of the structure. They say a glycol generator system with strips of tubing that has been covered with tarpaulins has been placed inside to heat the exposed soil. Residents surmised that the cement was poured this winter when frost covered the ground. The cold temperature created an

adverse factor, they said, requiring the breaking up and re-pouring of the concrete. Neighbors speculated that the reason for the inadvisable installation during cold weather may have been an effort to expedite the completion of the structure in time for the July 4 Township Picnic.

Price said in a telephone interview last week, that there was a serious problem with the floor in the \$750,000 plus structure.

Price said he appreciated the citizens' concern and blamed the failure on the general contractor who he claimed, "cut corners." Price claimed the floor was poured last fall rather than in the winter and the builder changed the specifications of the concrete

thickness from 4 inches to 2 inches and immediately covered it with plastic wrap. He said the contractor is re-pouring the floor to meet the original specifications at no additional cost to the township.

"Little League is starting soon and we have to make the area safe," said Price. "We don't always do a good job of informing people." Price said he expects the pavilion construction will be complete by mid May.

Architect-designer firm D.S. Wright and Associates of Plymouth requested bids for construction in July 2014. The planned structure grew from a basic picnic pavilion to a sprawling facility, increasing costs by 750

percent since the project was originally approved by members of the Plymouth Township Board of Trustees. When complete, it will be a 4,500 square foot, one-story structure with a walk-out basement. It will include restrooms, a warming center and a kitchen area with a sink and refrigerator. The \$21,820 snow making cannon that is to be installed near the structure arrived in the township last week. Industrial electric and plumbing capacity installations are required to operate the snow machines.

Township Treasurer Ron Edwards is acting as construction manager and was the originator of the project.
