No primary for Romulus candidates

The Aug. 8 ballot will contain only the two millage questions from the Romulus Community Schools and will not ask voters to choose city officials.

Despite earlier reports, Romulus voters will wait until the November ballot to choose members of their city council.

The Aug. 8 ballot will contain only the two millage questions from the Romulus Community Schools and will not ask voters to choose city officials. The school district will be asking for a 2.5 millage renewal of a current 5.1314 mills, a reduction in the millage that expired in 2016. The district is also asking voters to approve a 10-year, 3 mill, or \$3 on every \$1,000 of taxable value, sinking fund millage to be used for non-operating expenses.

While there are 15 candidates for the seven available council terms, Sylvia Makowski,

an incumbent, will seek reelection as a write-in candidate, leaving only 14 names actually appearing on the official ballots, according to City Clerk Ellen Craig Bragg. Makowski met the April 25 filing deadline for candidates, but when she attempted to amend some information on her candidate affidavit, Wayne County withdrew all her nominating petitions along with the affidavit in question, according to Bobbie Marcell of the clerk's

office. Makowski has now registered as a write-in candidate although her name will not be on the ballot. Those names on the ballot will include incumbent council members Kathy Abdo, John Barden, Harry Croust, Celeste Roscoe and William Wadsworth. Also seeking terms on the council are Tomeska Boles, Sandra Croust, Edward Martell, Jesse McNally, Paris McCarthy, Tina Talley, Sharon Walker, Eva Webb and

Virginia Williams.

Webb previously served on the council prior to seeking a mayoral term. Sandra Croust served on the Romulus Community Schools Board of Education.

Mayor LeRoy Burrows will be unopposed in his bid for reelection while City Treasurer Stacy Paige will be challenged by Ursula Wester. Craig Bragg will also be unopposed for reelection to the clerk's position.

The deadline for write-in candidates to file for the November election is 4 p.m. Oct. 27. A declaration of intent must be filed with the city clerk's office by any candidate who intends to be a write-in candidate for any office.

Demonstrations, entertainment offered during Maybury Farm Fest

A blacksmith will ply his skill, farmers will shear sheep and wool will be spun into yarn at the annual Farm Fest at Maybury Farm.

Farm Fest is planned from 10 a.m. until 5 p.m. Saturday, June 3 and will also feature a wide variety of activities including games and activities for children, live music, wagon rides, farm animals and story time. In addition, there will be a building workshop, an art project and the planting of container gardens along with a family scavenger hunt.

"Farm Fest is the biggest summer event of the year and is sure to be entertaining for kids and adults alike," said

Jessica Striegler, executive director of the Northville Community Foundation which operates the farm through a 501(c)3 nonprofit organization. Maybury is a working farm with barns, fields, crops and livestock. The animals are all available to visitors and used to being admired and petted.

"Farm Fest at Maybury Farm has been growing in popularity because of the working farm presentations and activities to enjoy. Sheep shearing, wool spinning, and blacksmithing are just some of the fun demos to experience throughout the day. Maybury Farm has also partnered with the Plymouth Home Depot,

the Country Garden Club of Northville, and the Northville Art House to offer additional activities for children," Striegler said.

She added that in addition to all of the planned family activities, Maybury Farm would also be raffling a 55-inch Samsung LED television. The raffle is a fundraiser for the farm and the funds will be used to care for the animals and maintenance. Raffle tickets are \$5 each or five for \$20.

Tickets to Farm Fest are \$5 per person and children younger than 2 can enter for free with an adult. Striegler said she wanted to thank

2 charged in assault

Two area men have been charged in connection with an assault that took place in the early-morning hours April 16 in Grosse Pointe.

Wayne County prosecutors alleged that Terrell Carter, 28, of Westland and Tyron Larkins, 24, of Inkster, were two of eight men who severely beat Brandon Putnam, 23, of Detroit, causing great bodily injuries during the altercation that took place at about 1 a.m. April 16 on Monroe and St. Antoine streets.

Prosecutors claim that a friend of the victim's got into a verbal argument with the group of eight men. The argument escalated into a physical confrontation and another friend of Putnam's was assaulted by the group of eight. Putnam reportedly stepped in to aid his friend and the group turned on him, knocked him to the ground and violently beat him, causing serious injuries. As he was being beaten, Putnam's possessions were stolen, according to prosecutors, who allege that Carter and Larkins were among the men who assaulted and robbed the victim.

Putnam remains hospitalized for injuries sustained during the attack, according to prosecutors.

Carter and Larkins are each charged with Unarmed Robbery, Assault with Intent to Murder, Assault with Intent to Do Great Bodily Harm, and Felonious Assault.

Carter was arrested and subsequently arraigned before Magistrate Bari Blake Wood. Carter received a \$5 million cash/bond. Larkins was arraigned last week on the charges and also received a \$5 million bond.

Half century of service

He reminded the crowd of the long history of service of Kwanzaa, a club dedicated to programs that help youth in the community and joined the other past presidents for a commemorative photo. Rock on

Little garden of inspiration blooms in Plymouth

The tiny garden of colorfully painted rocks in Kellogg Park in downtown Plymouth is part of an international phenomenon that started in a Massachusetts seaside village located in Cape Cod.

The little garden is filled with rocks of all shapes and sizes, each with an inspirational message painted brightly on the stone. A sign at the head of the little display reads, "Take one when you need one. Share one with a friend who needs some inspiration or leave one for another. One message at just the right moment can change your whole day, outlook, life."

The rock garden was installed at the park by Elm Elementary

School Girls on the Run, and it is loaded with positive, kind messages.

The little gardens have grown to international proportions after being started in 2015 by Megan Murphy of Barnstable, MA. Now, with the help of countless others, her messages of hope and understanding have spread kindness and inspiration beyond her imagination, she said.

Murphy, 49, said she wanted to spread hope and comfort to those who would see her messages on painted rocks. Messages like, "Focus on what makes you happy and gives meaning to your life." She realized that even though she was successful in her business venture she was unhappy.

After selling her stake in a

local boutique to her business partner, Murphy decided she needed a change in her life and started training to become a life coach. She spent time meditating while walking the 6-mile long stretch of Sandy Neck Beach. She and her daughter began collecting and painting more than 200 rocks a week with messages of inspiration, then marking them with a hashtag on the reverse side to track their visibility.

Their effort met with an unexpected surge of popularity on social media, like Facebook, Instagram and Twitter. At last count #TheKindnessRocks Project page has 19,000 followers.

The little gardens now stretch throughout North America and



feedback in the form of inspiring rebounding positive messages from cancer patients, people in chemotherapy or distress have convinced Murphy that the project is a success.

"Kindness is the quality or state of being gentle and considerate to others. Kindness is a

noun. A noun being the object of a verb, or an act, therefore, you must act before it can be labeled 'kind.' To be described as kind, you must begin by taking actions that prove to be positive, inspirational, thoughtful, touching, selfless, caring, or charitable, Murphy said.

Students let off 'STEAM' at annual project exhibit

Students in the Northville schools were pretty steamed last month when they participated in an exhibition of their work.

About 1,500 students from across the district participated in the third annual Northville STEAM Fair presented by Community Choice Credit Union and funded by Northville Educational Foundation.

This year, the event went behind the fan and explored how STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Math) goes into the creation of games. From calculating angles for an art-inspired putt-putt golf course to coding and mixing up magnetic slime, students had an opportunity to dream up a game, figure out how to create it and then allow others to play it.

Nearly 100 student projects created by teams from first through 12th grade were on display. During the morning, every fourth grade student in the district walked through the fair and got to try out many of the games. In the afternoon, every seventh grader in the district visited the display and tried out the games.

Some of the student favorites included a marshmallow cannon, a life-size angry bird game, the Can You Duplicate the Drawing game, driving a robot and creative coloring the robotic way. In the evening, the event was open to families. The fair experienced the largest turnout to date, organizers said.

Even when a project broke down, the students didn't worry. It was an opportunity for them to figure out what went wrong and how to fix it and improve it, the organizers added.

Northville Educational Foundation provided funding for the event that is designed to take concepts students are learning in the classroom and connect them to real-life applications. AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER 46, SECTION 46-100(1)(2) OF THE WESTLAND CITY CODE TO AMEND THE RATES FOR INDUSTRIAL WASTE CONTROL CHARGES

THE CITY OF WESTLAND ORDAINS:

Section 1. That subsection (2) of Section 46-100(1)(2) of the Westland City Code entitled "Storage-Deposit rates (Section 46-100(1)(2)) shall be amended to provide as follows:

Section 2. That all other provisions of Chapter 46 of the Westland City Code, except as amended herein, shall remain in full force and effect.

Section 3. Severability. The various parts, sections and clauses of this Ordinance are hereby declared to be severable. If any part, section, paragraph, section or clause is held unconstitutional or invalid by a Court of competent jurisdiction, the remainder of the Ordinance shall not be affected thereby.

Section 4. Repeal. All other Ordinances inconsistent with the provisions of this Ordinance are, to the extent of such inconsistency, hereby repealed.

Section 5. Publication. The City Clerk shall cause this Ordinance to be published in the manner required by law.

Section 6. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall become effective upon publication.

Chase ends in 2 arrests

Westland police arrested both the driver and passenger of a vehicle involved in a lengthy pursuit spanning multiple cities last week.

According to police reports, the two were arrested after fleeing a home in the 35000 block of Pardo at about 9 p.m. May 17. Officers were in the area conducting a periodic check at a residence where a felonious domestic assault had occurred the day before, May 16. Police learned that the suspect in the previous assault call was also a parole absconder and were checking to see if he might be in the area, according to reports of the incident.

While the officers were near the residence in question, they noticed a vehicle

with two occupants leave the location. The officers recognized the passenger in the vehicle as the subject sought in the incident that occurred the day before, police reports said.

The patrol officers attempted a traffic stop of the vehicle but the female driver ignored them, according to reports, and drove away from the area.

Officers pursued the vehicle for approximately 35 minutes, police said, eventually stopping the vehicle near Evergreen and I-96. When the driver stopped the vehicle, both the female driver and the male passenger were taken into custody without incident, officers said.

Special guest Lt. Governor visits Inkster clinic

Michigan Lt. Gov. Brian Calley recently visited the Inkster location of Western Wayne Family Health Centers (WWFHC) for a tour of the facility and to learn more about the integrated behavioral health model practiced at the community health center.

The center provides primary medical care and general dentistry for all ages along with behavioral health services. Access to behavioral health (counseling, medication management by a psychiatrist) all start with a visit to a primary care provider who does a physical then refers people who are seeking mental health care or found to be in need of it to a behavioral health specialist. The specialist then assesses the person and offers counseling with a social worker or a psychologist and if needed, sets up an appointment with a psychiatrist. Patients talk with a psychiatrist from the Wayne State University Physicians Group via tele-medicine which is like highly encrypted Skype. Those services are available at all three WWFHC sites, and at Inkster, there is also a treatment program for opioid addiction.

Advantages to this integrated model make it easier for a patient and family to get all health related care in one place, and enhances care quality when all providers can access records and consult with each other about the best treatment

of a patient. Any embarrassment or stigma felt by someone seeking behavioral health care is reduced, as many services are offered in the same place.

Calley said he was impressed with the facilities of WWFHC and the approach to holistic treatment of those with behavioral health needs, including supported recovery for opioid addiction. He is an advocate for mental health services and said he was very impressed with the technology used in a demonstration of tele-psychiatry where he had the chance to talk with Alireza Amiradri MD. Calley also had the opportunity to talk with George Sawabini DO, about the new controlled substance prescription tracking system and medically assisted treatment for opioid addiction in Michigan.

Western Wayne Family Health Centers operates three community health centers in Inkster, Taylor and Lincoln Park offering primary care services for all ages, general dentistry, care coordination, nutrition education, exercise programs, insurance application assistance and integrated behavioral health services. In 2016, 15,515 patients were seen with just under 52,000 visits. Services are available on a sliding fee scale based on income, all Medicaid and Healthy Michigan Plan coverage accepted as well as most other health and dental insurance plans.
