# No charges filed in shootinas

No charges have been filed pinst any of three men arrested during a home invasion and shooting that left one man dead last month. The men were arrested fol

The men were arrested fol-lowing a shooting at a home on the 34000 block of Glenwood Street near Second Avenue in the morning of May 25. The resi-dent of the home called police dent of the home called police at about 9:35 nm. saying that he had shot a man who had forced his way into the house, accord-ing to police reports. When police arrived, the

man injured by the resident and two other suspects had fled the scene. The three were later located at Beaumont Wayne located at Beaumont Wayne Hospital where the injured man sought treatment for the gunshot wound. He disd of the injury at the hospital and was identified by police as ishamel Govantes, 24, of Westland. The Govantes, 24, of Westland. The other two men were identified only as a 24-year-old resident of Belleville and a 22-year-old res-ident of Inkster: While both men vere arrested at the hospital or charges of home invasion police were forced to release them from custody due to the lack of charges from the office of the Wayne County Prr ecutor.

Prosecutor. The resident of the home suf-fered a gunshot wound to his leg and was transported to Beaumont Hospital Dearborn for treatment. When he was released after treatment, police rrested him on stolen weap

Police investigators said that the shooting and home invasion were not random and that the men had a prior relationship. Unconfirmed reports said that the incident was some kind of retaliation for the resident hav-ing recently evicted his live-in

Kelly is seeing his third four-year term and Doroshewitz is seeking his fourth term. Curmi is seeking a sixth term on the board.

The supervisor's race will include current Supervisor Shannon Price who was appointed to the top spot about a year ago after the resignation of Richard Reaume. Price will face veteran legislator Kurt Heise, now a Michigan State Representative who is torm-limited at his state office. Both are Republicans so the winner is not expected to face any opposition on the November ballot.

Incumbent Township Clerk Nancy Conzelman will be challenged by former state legislator Jerry Vorva in the August primary where, once again, there is no Democratic challenger

The fire which the teens allegedly The fire, which the teens antegetiny started on the second floor of the aban-doned bakery building on the historic property, had fully engaged the building when firefighters from Westland, Garden City and Inkster arrived on the scene.

Furnighters initially reported there was difficulty in accessing the building due to a fence erected to keep out trespassers. When firefighters arrived, they said, the roof was nearly collapsed and the second floor was sagging, making entry into the structure to battle the blaze impossible. The building, according to official reports, will have to be demolished due to the fire da amage. The property, which includes the
