City faces court deadline on water credits

The City of Inkster must credit residential water sewer accounts with a total of \$2,559,321.63 by tomorrow by order of the Wayne County Circuit Court.

Inkster attorney Byron H. Nolen filed for a show cause hearing before Circuit Court Judge Robert L. Ziolkowski which took place June 16. The hearing, Nolen explained, was to force the city to explain or show cause as to why the previous orders of the court to make refunds on residential water bills had not been performed. Nolen, who represented Inkster resident Terrance D. Trahey and a class of similarly situated persons, sued the city seeking redress of the exorbitant water rate increases that were passed along to both residential and business customers. When new water meters were installed throughout the community, residents began receiving bills for as much as \$2,000, including charges for water allegedly used before the new meters were in place.

Earlier this year, the court determined that

the rates approved by the city council were unreasonable and the water and sewer charges from the new meters unsupportable. The court ordered that the city credit each water/sewer account for the period of July 1, 2012 through June 30, 2013 \$2.68 per unit for water used during that period. The court also ordered a credit to every water customer in the city of \$2.41 per unit of water used during the same period.

Each of the current 8,425 water/sewer customers in the city is to receive a total credit of \$303.78, by order of Ziolkowski, who also imposed the June 27 deadline for implementation of his order. According to court documents, this is the final pending claim and will close the case, unless the city fails to comply with the order. According to Nolen, should that happen, the city would face contempt of court charges and subsequent penalties which could include fines or even jail time.

"It feels good to finally obtain the relief the Inkster residents deserve," Nolen said, but he did caution residents that the relief may be temporary.

"Despite the ruling that the current rate of \$15.30 per unit of water was unreasonable pursuant to the city charter and that the city was being unjustly enriched by charging the residents that amount, as of July 1, the water and sewer rate will be raised again to \$15.52 per unit of water used," Nolen said.

"The only recourse the residents have is to sue the city again challenging the new higher rate because the Jan. 23 judgment does not apply to future rates."

Local police participate in training

Four local officers were among the 20 police personnel who encountered wounded victims lying on a school hallway floor last week as police exchanged gunfire with suspects. As shots rang out, the school principal shouted emergency instructions through the loudspeaker system while police commands were heard over the sounds of fired rounds booming as shell casings bounced off cement block walls. While it wasn't the real thing, the noise and chaos provided law enforcement officers including City of Plymouth Police Sgt. Chris Voorheis, and Sgt. Paul Sumner, Off. Matthew McKenzie and Off. Dan MacArthur, all from the Northville Township force, some real time experience in dealing with a school shooting scenario. The training exercise took place last week at Dickenson School in Livonia, where officers re-enacted several school emergency situations.

The training was provided by the Wayne County Department of Homeland Security using federal grant funding to offer specialized training to more than 1,000 police officers in 43 surrounding communities.

This was the second in a series of intensive three-day training exercises patterned to help local law enforcement officers prepare for an active school shooter emergency in a reality setting. The scenario-based training exercise labeled "Practical Day" was taught by veteran law enforcement officers.

A Homeland Security Emergency Management mobile command post was set up in the school parking lot loaded with hi-tech visual, video and infrared cameras plus state-of the-art satellite communications and radio equipment capable of reaching hundreds of miles.

There have been at least 74 school related shootings in the U.S. since the 2012 Sandy Hook School tragedy, according to national statistics. The latest occurred earlier this month at Seattle Pacific University in Seattle when a 26-year-old man killed one and wounded two others before being tackled by a security guard.

The former protocol waiting for SWAT (Special Weapons and Tactics), wasn't working," said Capt. Ron Taig, the 26-year Livonia police veteran in charge of the training exercise. "The safety of our schools is our top priority and all officers in Wayne County will be trained."

"We want to make sure our patrol officers are given the equipment and the training. In this day and age, every second counts. We teach them the rightway, the wrong-way and corrections." Taig said.

The program consists of lectures, demonstrations, isolation drills and scenario development.

The \$45,000 federal grant was prepared by the office of Wayne County Executive Robert Ficano, a strong supporter of the training.

"No Wayne County general fund money was used..." Ficano said.

Romulus celebrates reopening of city park

Romulus officials and residents celebrated the official ribbon-cutting ceremony marking the grand reopening of Elmer Johnson Community last Saturday. The park is located at 9755 Ozga Road on the west side of the city.

The 36.6-acre park was among several parks closed in recent years due to tough financial times and budget cuts in the city, officials said. The city workforce and several organizations have worked to restore the premiere

The 36.6-acre park was among recreation site to "better than veral parks closed in recent ever."

"We are excited to bring summer recreation back to Romulus starting with the grand reopening of Elmer Johnson Park," said Mayor LeRoy D. Burcroff, who has made restoring the park to its former glory a priority in his first year as mayor.

"Recreation is so important to a community," he added. "We've got a jewel in Elmer Johnson Park and I'm happy to say it's shining again."

Saturday's ribbon cutting coincided with the announcement of a variety of recreation programming that is returning to the city this summer. Three of the programs cheerleading classes, youth and adult softball - will take place at Elmer Johnson Park.

The park is named for Elmer

Johnson, a retired Kelsey-Hayes tool and die maker, who was the first and only president of the Romulus Progressive Club for nearly 40 years. The Progressive Club donated \$5,000 to the then-Romulus Township Parks and Recreation Commission for the park's development on Feb.6, 1967.

The park features a basketball court, a softball field, children's play areas, a large picnic shelter area with barbecue grills, two sand volleyball courts, horseshoe pits, an inline hockey court, children's play areas, restroom facilities and more.

Burcroffs plan called for a joint public/private partnership of city employee members of Teamster Union Local 214, a professional landscape design company, the

Burcroff praised the many volunteer groups that helped make the park reopening happen and said he wanted to be able to reopen other parks that were closed several years ago because of budget concerns, too.

"City staff and everyone involved have done an incredible job restoring the park," Burcroff said.

Commissioners approved signs for Belleville Church of God on Hull Road and Davenport Plaza on East Columbia Avenue. A request for a sign at Lake Plaza on Main Street was not approved as the petitioner, Sam Kassab, did not identify all the materials and colors

This was Kassab's second request for approval of the sign. At earlier meetings, city planning consultant Jill Bahm explained to Kassab in writing that his original proposal would interfere with sight lines at the driveway at Lake Plaza. This request did agree to a 4-foot setback to solve that issue, but did not provide the required information regarding the materials to be

used. He also did not provide details regarding landscaping and the proposed parking entry, specifics the commissioners requested in March.

The new Church of God sign at 45170 Hull Road will be a onesided ground sign on a 12-inch base.

The sign area is 3 feet by 8 feet. The sign will be installed 48 feet from the center of Hull Road. The sign will be illuminated.

The Davenport Plaza ground sign will be installed on a 1.7 foot block base and the sign area is 8.7 feet by 7.3 feet wide.

The sign will be have a limestone cap and a brick background. The individual sign panels are made of cut stainless steel and can change when the business tenants change. The sign will not be illuminated.

Canton Township Engineering Services will he performing sidewalk inspections in zone one to obtain preliminary quantities for replace ment. Sidewalks that need replacement will be denoted with one of two (2) colors.

GREEN - Denotes the property owner's responsibility for the cost of replacement. RED - Denotes Canton's responsibility for the cost of replacement

Defective sidewalk located within a drive may require driveway slabs directly adjacent to be marked for repair (owner's responsibility). Should an owner have a defective concrete drive approach, located between the sidewalk and curb, upon request only (owner's respon sibility) we can include with the sidewalk repair program.

In an effort to complete the inspections in a timely fashion, we ask that if there is a concern regarding responsibility that the property owner wait to contact Engineering Services until the fall of 2014 or Spring of 2015 to schedule an appointment to review the markings The paint dots are preliminary markings during the initial walk thru of the subdivision and along the public right-of-way. The Village Theater at Cherry Hill is teaming up with the Michigan Shakespeare Festival to bring special performances to Canton next year. For three weeks in the summer of 2015, from July 29 - Aug. 16, 2015, the Michigan Shakespeare Festival will present its 2015 Season lineup, which will consist of two Shakespearean plays and one classical comedy, in Canton.

"I am thrilled beyond belief that the Michigan Shakespeare Festival will be expanding to the Canton Village Theater next year," said Canton Arts Coordinator Jennifer Tobin. "The festival will give our residents the opportunity to see professional Equity actors performing classic theater in repertory; not an easy thing to find short of driving an hour or more. This will also be the opportunity of a lifetime for our resident arts groups to witness classical theatre being professionally produced - as they rub elbows with the best of the best in Michigan."

At last Navy veteran awarded service medals 68-years after discharge

When retired Northville barber and veteran Tom Arbanas disembarked the USS Walker in 1945, he had just returned from 80 days at sea and heavy combat in Okinawa. His Navy ship had sustained persistent Japanese kamikaze attacks and the young 18-year-old Petty Officer Third Class was ready for discharge.

All Arbanas could think about was getting home.

Now 68 years later, the 86-year-old World War II veteran is being recognized for his

bravery and courage during his military service.

Last Friday, U.S. District Veterans Liaison Joe Salvia, representing Congressman Kerry Bentivolio, R-11th District, along with Commander Steve Frazer and Past Commander Lyle Avery of VFW Northville Post 4012 presented Arbanas with service medals and ribbons he missed on that November day he was discharged in San Diego.

"I didn't think about much it," said Arbanas who lives in Kings Mill in Northville along with his wife of 64 years, Katherine.

"I didn't have enough time to get the medals," Arbanas said. He trained as a barber after leaving the Navy and owned his own shop on Dunlap Street in Northville from 1986 through 1992.

When Frazer got a call from Washington, D.C. regarding Arbanas' service, he went to work and contacted special emissary Salvia, from the AMVETS Commerce District Office to help get the paperwork in place so Arbanas, who served in the Asia Pacific campaign and Pearl Harbor, would receive his medals.
