Teen in murder plot to be tried separately

Rivera and Sikorski have both

remained in custody on

Roksana Sikorski, the Plymouth Township teen accused of plotting to murder her family as they slept last October, has been granted a separate trial from that of her 23-year-old alleged co-conspirator and former boyfriend.

Last week, Wayne County Circuit Court Judge James Callahan opted to hear trial evidence against Michael Rivera, 23, before a jury separate from those who will hear evidence against Sikorski. Both face four counts of conspiracy to commit

\$1 million cash bond since their arrest. murder and assault with intent to murder along with a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon. Sikorski also faces

Police were called to the Sikorski home Oct. 17 after Sikorski, then 15, slashed the

charges of using a computer to

commit a crime.

throat of her brother. The attack woke her parents who summoned police and EMTs to the scene. Sikorski and Rivera were arrested the next day at his Detroit apartment. In the subsequent investigation, detectives discovered explicit text messages on Sikorski's phone

indicating she was in contact with Rivera during the attack during which he was prompting her with instructions on slashing the throats of her parents and both siblings. In light of the "truly haunting" evidence pre-Wavne County sented, Prosecutor Kym Worthy opted to charge Sikorski as an adult.

3 face felony charges in marijuana sales

Following a six-month investigation, three individuals have been charged with felonies associated with the distribution of marijuana at a Canton dispensa-

According to police reports, officers from the Western-Wayne Criminal Investigations Unit began looking into the Pure Wellness Marijuana Dispensary, located at 145 North Haggerty Road in Canton Township, last September: Detectives continued the investigation until March 19 when multiple search warrants were executed at the dispensary. Following examination of the evidence, police said, the office of the Michigan Attorney General authorized multiple felony charges against Amanda Elaine Joslin, 40, Eric Dejonghe, 26, and Jacob Scholin, 21. The three turned themselves in to police and were arraigned July 15 in 14A District Court in Saline before

Chief Judge Kirk W. Tabbey. Each entered not guilty pleas to charges of Conspiracy to Deliver/Manufacture Marijuana, 4-year felony Delivery/Manufacture Marijuana, also a 4-year felony.

All three were released on personal recognizance bond and are due in court today for a probable cause conference.

In addition, Joslin was arraigned in 35th District Court before Judge Ron Lowe on

Detroit attorney eager to fight township appeal

City of Detroit attorney Charles Raimi said last week he's anxious to get back in court to take on the appeal Plymouth Township attorneys filed asking for reconsideration of a court order requiring the township to return 190-acres of land to Detroit.

Attorneys representing the

eration in the Michigan Court of Appeals seeking to overturn a lower court decision that ordered the township to return 190-acres of land, part of a 323acre parcel formerly known as the Detroit House of Corrections, to the city. Township attorneys argued unsuccessfully for more than two years with the City of Detroit regarding the ownership of the

township filed for the reconsid-

\$16 million parcel of land, located on Five Mile Road, between Napier and Ridge roads. The land dispute has been in court since the Detroit bankruptcy filing in 2013. The property once housed the Detroit prison farm.

"I've asked the appellate court to expedite the appeal," said Raimi, City of Detroit deputy corporate counsel, in a telephone interview last week.


"There's a cloud over the

title," Raimi said. "We're ready to sell our property once this is cleared."

In February, Wayne County Circuit Court Chief Judge Robert Columbo Jr. ruled that the land should be returned to the City of Detroit as the legal owner and that the Wayne County tax foreclosure sale of the land to Plymouth Township was

Oct. 26, pending a decision by the Michigan Court of Appeals on the admissibility of her confession to the crimes. Callahan ruled that her confession to police was inadmissible based on her age and the content of the conversations with detectives. Prosecutors disagreed and requested the ruling from the appeals court which has agreed to hear the matter.

Sikorski's parents had filed a sexual misconduct complaint against Rivera in an attempt to separate the couple. Investigators have alleged that the murder plot was an attempt by the couple to avoid the legal proceedings and run away together. Sikorski had run away from home in July 2014 to be with Rivera, according to court documents.

Her parents have alleged that she was manipulated by Rivera and suffers from mental problems stemming from her early childhood in Poland prior to being adopted about 10 years ago.

Her new defense attorney appointed by the court, Matthew Evans, has requested that she be moved from the juvenile detention center to some type of residential treatment center in light of health issues. Sikorski is 4-foot, 8-inches tall and has lost weight while incarcerated, he said, and her health is in jeopardy.

Callahan said he would consider the move, but did not rule on the request.

Rivera's attorney, Wright Blake, argued last Friday that unless the trial went forward, bail for Rivera should be reduced in light of his right to a speedy trial under the law. Rather than reduce bail, Callahan opted to try Rivera separately.

Jury selection was scheduled to begin last Monday in his trial.

improper:

Plymouth Township paid \$606,150 in 2011 for two parcels of acreage at a foreclosure sale by the Wayne County treasurer's office. The land was foreclosed on by the county when the recorded owners, Demco 54, a subsidiary of DeMattia Corp., failed to pay taxes on the land. The two parcels were improperly recorded as belonging to Demco 54 by the Plymouth Township assessor's office, when in fact, the City of Detroit owned the 190-acre parcel and had never sold or transferred title to the land. The township reported the tax arrearage on the entire section of property to the county which then sold the land to the township at the tax foreclosure sale. Detroit was never notified of any tax arrearage by the township or the county as the notices went to Demco 54 which never paid any tax on any portion of the property

Plymouth Township, in the appeal of Columbo's ruling, claims the 2010 State Tax Commission bulletin exempting municipal property from foreclosure did not recognize that the land is only exempted when it is used for a public purpose. In court filings, township attorneys say that Detroit left the land undeveloped and therefore the State Tax Commission exceeded it's authority in exempting the land and that the "inclusion of municipally-owned land is flawed."

The Plymouth Township legal filing in the Court of Appeals started the clock for the city to respond. Raimi says he's already responded and filed a brief in the appellate court stating he ready for oral arguments and hopes the ruling won't take more than six months.

"I feel Judge Columbo's decision was entirely proper." Raimi said.




