Voters face key decisions Tuesday

Voters will, in effect, choose the new supervisor, clerk and several trustees from the primary ballot.

Voters throughout the area will be asked to make crucial decisions during the primary election next Tuesday.

In several communities, the winning candidates Tuesday will face no opposition in November and ballot questions can be approved or rejected by voters. One of the most crucial questions is the approval of Proposition 5 in Wayne. Voters will be asked to approve the joining of SMERISA, a funding mechanism which will allow the city to levy up to another 15 mills for 10 years to fund public safety. The city currently faces a \$1.5 million deficit and has

been told by auditors that the municipality will completely run out of money by the end of next year. The proposal has been characterized as the only mechanism open to officials to save the city from state intervention and the possible appointment of an emergency financial manager. Opponents claim it will place too serious a burden on taxpayers. Proponents also argue that

while the millage rate may be higher because of the decrease in property values, residents will actually only pay the same amount as they did in 2008. Opponents claim that the dedicated millage approved by voters to fund public safety years ago was used by officials for general fund expenses and that the burden is too severe.

In Plymouth Township the winners of the Republican pri-

mary balloting for the top jobs will be unopposed in November with one exception.

Voters will, in effect, choose the new supervisor, clerk and several trustees from the primary ballot.

The hotly contested and controversial supervisor's ballot section will offer only the name of current Supervisor Shannon Price, who was appointed to the position last year. He is opposed by write-in candidate State Rep. Kurt Heise whose name was removed from the ballot following a lawsuit by a Price supporting

Concours d'elegance

Rare vehicles displayed at show this weekend

The 38th annual Concours d'Elegance will roll millions of dollars in vehicles onto the lawns at the Inn at St. John's in Plymouth this weekend and whether it is Duesenbergs or modern collectibles, every automobile enthusiast will find something to love.

More than 300 vintage and classic automobiles and motorcycles are arriving daily from 31 states and countries to participate in one of the most prestigious automotive events in the world. The show attracts 15,000 show day attendees and almost 3,000 special event attendees every year, according to Larry Moss, chairman of the Concours d'Elegance.

"Our 38th annual Concours promises to be one of our best ever," Moss said. "We've expanded our program over three days in order to attract a wider audience of automotive enthusiasts and first-time visitors. I encourage people who have never attended a Concours event to make it a point to check us out."

Barry Megar, best known as the host of Discovery's Velocity series "Car Crazy," will be honored as the 2016 Concours d'Elegance of America "Enthusiast of the Year." The board members are recognizing Megar for his decades of automotive enthusiasm and his association with the classic car community throughout the U.S.

"I'm excited to be recognized by the Concours d'Elegance of America board and I

look forward to renewing old friendships and making new ones in the car capital of the world," Megar said.

The Concours d'Elegance has its roots in 17th century France, when the aristocracy would parade their horse-drawn carriages through the parks of Paris. With the advent of the automobile, Concours d'Elegance events

Cooling centers designated in local areas

This is serious heat and it makes for a very serious situation for many.

Soaring temperatures along with high humidity is causing a 'heat dome' over much of the country, according to meteorologists, prompting several local communities to designate cooling centers for public use last week.

While somewhat cooler temperatures are predicted this week, Michigan State Police have sent out warnings including safety tips to prevent serious consequences from the severe heat and the Red Cross has made access to extreme heat safety tips and severe weather alerts including heat advisories, watches and warnings instantly available at redcross.org/apps.

"This is serious heat and it makes for a very serious situa-

tion for many. The Red Cross wants Michiganders to know how to deal with the extreme heat," said Kimberly Burton, American Red Cross regional chief executive officer. "We're encouraging people to check in on their friends and neighbors who don't have air conditioning or who live alone, be aware of increased pet needs and pay attention to signs that may indicate a heat-related emergency."

Kathleen Rich, the emergency planner in Canton Township where cooling centers

have been designated, seconded those remarks and echoed the safety tips from the Red Cross and Michigan State Police.

Key tips include:

- Never leave children or pets in a vehicle - even for a few minutes. The inside temperature of a car can quickly reach 120 degrees.
- Stay hydrated by drinking plenty of fluids throughout the day. Avoid drinks with alcohol or caffeine.
- Slow down, stay indoors and avoid strenuous exercise during

the hottest part of the day

- Wear loose-fitting, light-colored clothing, avoiding dark colors because they absorb the rays of the sun.

- Use a buddy system if required to work outdoors and take frequent breaks.
- Check on animals frequently to ensure that they are not suffering from the heat. Make sure they have plenty of cool water and shade.

"Many pets are considered part of the family and in such high temperatures it's time to closely look after all family members," said Burton. "To help, we've created a new app where pet owners can find use-

gays."

He noted that there was discussion and disagreement in ratifying the new contract. "We understand the financial condition of the city and we know how important it is to have a viable fire department moving forward."

Tokarski said that the firefighters, who do not receive

Social Security, but rather contributions to a pension fund, have now agreed to reduce that contribution by the city to 5.73 percent, which is less than the 6.2 percent required by the federal government for Social Security contributions. The firefighters have also agreed to contribute 30 percent rather than 20 percent to the healthcare and

have a \$250,000 annual deduction to meet before their benefits are paid at the full rate.

"That means about \$6,000 per year for each member," Tokarski said. "We also took an across-the-board 2 percent wage concession in an effort to help out."

"This is horrible for our guys, but we know the importance of providing services," he said. The new agreement will be in effect from July 1 until June 30, 2019.

The city did agree to allow

Council approves appointments

Robert Dunajski and Sam Durante have been named to the Westland Planning Commission and Scott Catallo to the Brownfield Redevelopment Authority.

The appointments, made by Mayor William Wild, were confirmed by unanimous vote of the members of the city council at the July 18 meeting.

Dunajski and Durante will join the nine-member board which meets at 7:30 p.m. the first Tuesday of every month in the Council Chambers of city hall. The members review site plan approvals, special land use requests, rezoning requests, land division requests, mechanical amusement licenses, street and alley vacations and other issues of concern. Dunajski and his wife, Miranda, have been Westland residents since 2007. He has been employed with Alta Equipment Co. as a Regional Operations

Manager for 14 years. He also served on the Zoning Board of Appeals and was appointed to the Planning Commission in 2012.

Durante is a retired 9 years ago from Terminex as a sales associate. He also served as Director of Environmental Services at San Hospital. He has served on the Planning Commission since 2010 and will serve another three-year term.

The Brownfield Redevelopment Authority is an 11-member board which meets following the submission of a Brownfield Redevelopment Plan. The

authority members facilitate business and property owners' redeveloping brownfield sites throughout Westland.

Catallo has lived in Westland for more than 30 years. He is an architect at NORR and is married with three children. He also serves on the Economic Development Corp. and the Tax Increment Finance Authority. He was first appointed to the Brownfield Authority in 2010 and will serve another three years with this appointment.

"These gentlemen have worked hard on their respective boards and commissions during their previous terms and I look forward to continuing to work with them throughout their upcoming terms," commented Wild. "They bring with them a wealth of knowledge and experience from their unique fields and will continue to be great assets to the community they serve."

firefighters to engage in specific types of outside employment work which had previously been restricted but still does not impair his or her ability to perform his or her job duties with

the city.

The city also agreed not to sub-contract services to a private non-governmental entity if such subcontracting would result in the layoff of any member of the bargaining unit.

The city also agreed to re-open the contract for a specific pension plan manager on Nov. 1, 2018 and on Nov. 1 of this year for

bargaining of the payout of earned and unused annual leave.

The 2 percent wage cuts will be restored to the firefighters, according to the new agreement, when the city annual audit confirms that the General Fund Balance has reached at least 20 percent of the General Fund expenses.

er who claimed that Heise's failure to indicate the precinct in which he voted in the township invalidated his candidacy. Also removed from the ballot and running as a write-in candidate is Don Schnettler, seeking to become a township trustee. He was also named in the lawsuit and his name removed from the primary ballot for the same reasons.

Incumbent Plymouth Township Treasurer Ron Edwards is being challenged by Mark Clinton. That candidate will face the only Democrat to file in the township, Mary Siefert, a former Harrison Township treasurer, in

November.

Incumbent Township Clerk Nancy Conzelmann is being challenged by former State Rep. Jerry Vorva. Both are Republicans and the winner of the primary Tuesday will be unopposed in the November race.

Trustee candidates include incumbents Mike Kelly, Bob Doroshewitz and Chuck Carmi who are being challenged by Jack Dempsey, Gary Heitman, Michael Ollansky, Thomas Parrelly, Teresa Somereck and Alexander Roehl, along with write-in Schnettler.

Voters will also be asked to decide on judicial candidates and the continuation of the zoo and parks Wayne County millages.

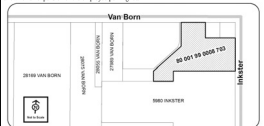

State process to fund DeHoCo razing begins

Initial steps are under way for demolition at the site of the former Detroit House of Corrections.

The buildings, described as blight by state officials, has hindered development in both Plymouth and Northville townships.

The Michigan Land Bank Fast Track Authority has awarded the ATC Group of Novi a contract to begin preliminary environmental analysis work at the site, located on Five Mile Road.

Gov. Rick Snyder in May

signed into law a plan to transfer \$4 million to the Michigan Land Bank Fast Track Fund so it could start preparation work at the 125-acre site, which was used for the Detroit House of Corrections from the early 1900s to mid-1990s, and also as a rubbish dump from the 1920s through the 1950s. Buildings on the site have been vacant since 2004.

"Redeveloping the DeHoCo site will not only be an economic boost to Plymouth and Northville townships, but it also will improve the quality of life for its

residents, making it a stronger community," said Steve Arwood, director of the State Department of Talent and Economic Development, which oversees the Land Bank Fast Track Authority. "These are the first steps of a long process, but mark an important step to move forward on improving this site. We are committed to moving quickly, but diligently to ensure safe demolition of these blighted structures."

State Rep. Kurt Heise, R-Plymouth Township, sponsored

the legislation to provide the initial resources, bills approved with overwhelming bipartisan support.

"This site isn't just an eyesore, it has hurt surrounding property values and has been a barrier to economic development that could create more and better jobs in the community," Heise said. "It's taken a lot of work to get to this point and we have far to go. But I'm focused on getting this project started so the region can benefit."

State agencies and the ATC

Group are planning to start reviewing the structures on the site this week to gather information needed to plan for future demolition work. The land bank is planning an aggressive timeline that could see the demolition work under way before the end of the year.

The environmental studies also are needed to determine potential uses for the site, or what additional work beyond demolition could be needed before the land could be redeveloped, officials said.
