Canton officials outlaw internet bullying

Bullying on the internet in Canton Township could result in 93 days in jail and a \$500 fine following a vote of the township board members last week.

The officials agreed to extend the existing ordinances prohibiting harassment by telephone or in writing to those actions, including bullying, done through the internet. The new rules will take effect Aug. 20 following a second vote by the board members.

The new restriction was in response to a report from

Public Safety Director Todd Mutchler who noted that prosecutors have had some difficulty to prove cases in court involving internet bullying or cyberstalking. The new ordinance would be used in all cases of such offenses, regardless of age.

“It’s really a remedy for people

who are being harassed through social media and use of the Internet,” Mutchler said of the new ordinance at the meeting.

According to Township Supervisor Phil LaJoy, the new rules will be an important change.

“Harassment via the Internet or a social media site is, unfortunately, becoming a regular occurrence,” he commented.

Mutchler said the Canton Police Department has officers trained and able to assist victims of internet bullying or stalking through social media or other internet sources and the capability to secure forensic evidence to prove these electronic crimes took place. He urged anyone who felt victimized to contact the police.

Big Top Kelly Miller Circus in Wayne Saturday

Tigers, zebras, camels and an elephant will join a cast of international circus stars this Saturday in Wayne.

The Kelly Miller Circus will arrive at Atwood Park in Wayne early in the morning Saturday, Aug. 8. The public is invited to come out and watch the circus animals being unloaded and fed beginning at about 7:30 a.m. and a free show, including a tiger meet and greet will begin at about 9 a.m. at the Anderson Ballfields II at the park. The traditional "old style" circus will present performances at 2 and 5 p.m. and features many new acts and entertainers. Performances last about 2 hours.

Started in 1938 by Obert Miller and his sons, Kelly and Dory, the Al G. Kelly Miller Brothers Circus, now known simply as Kelly Miller, has entertained millions of American and Canadian citizens during the past 77 years.

The Miller Family built it into the second-largest big top show in America. They introduced hundreds of new circus artists to the American public and countless innovations in circus operations.



The circus travels on a fleet of 36 vehicles and requires an area of 350 by 350 feet on which to set up. The colorful circus big top has a seating capacity of 1100 and is made of waterproof vinyl. The tent is 120 by 120 feet and is 40 feet high and is supported by more than a quarter of a mile of heavy gauge aluminum tubing as well as several miles of rope, steel cable and chain.

Eleven members of the circus are employed strictly for the care, comfort and welfare of the animals and are dedicated to their care and well-being, according to the circus website. The animals receive a veterinary examination every 30 days to ensure their health.

According to the website, the Kelly Miller Circus exceeds all federal animal welfare standards set by the



United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) under the Animal Welfare Act. The circus is regulated by and inspected frequently by the USDA, state and local authorities.

Advance tickets are priced at \$12 for adults, \$6 for children ages 2-11, and free for children under 2.

Tickets are available at the Wayne Community Center, Westland City Hall, Professional Insurance Associates, Jack Demmer Ford, Mark Chevrolet, Wayne Westland Federal Credit Union and at the Wayne Public Library.

Atwood Park is located at 33601 Annapolis St. in Wayne.

Vitality Center opens in historic NorWayne

The past meets the future in the newly-opened Jefferson Barns Community Vitality Center in Westland where some of the most modern and up-to-date resident services are housed in a historic building.

Westland officials opened the Vitality Center in what was formerly an elementary school that was closed in 2010. The school building was constructed during World War II to educate the children of parents working as part of the Arsenal for Democracy war effort. The city rented the historic building from the Wayne-Westland Community Schools for \$1 per year and

began major renovations at the site. Funds for the project were loaned to the city by the federal Department of Housing and Urban Development. The city will repay the 15-year loan using Community Development Block Grant funds, according to a spokesman.

The exterior of the building remains similar to the original design while the interior saw

major renovations, including the installation of a wooden floor that was originally a feature of the long-shuttered Melvin G. Bailey Recreation Center.

New tenants at the building include the Westland Housing and Community Development Department, Wayne Metropolitan Community Action Agency, Nankin Transsit and the NorWayne Boxing Gym. The

center also features a library and community space.

Community rooms are available for rentals for public and private events. The Westland Police Department will have an office at the center for community police officers and events.

Safe Step / Beginning Step Communities will lease space at the Dorsey Center where Alcoholics Anonymous and Narcotics Anonymous continue to meet.

Police identify body found in Romulus ditch

Investigators from the Michigan State Police have identified a body found in a Romulus ditch last Wednesday.

According to police reports, at about 3 p.m. July 29, a mowing crew from DTE energy located a human body in the ditch on the ramp from eastbound I-94 to

southbound I-275 in Romulus. Police identified the deceased as Emanuel David Lofton, 50, of Romulus.

Special Investigations Section detectives from the Michigan State Police were called to the scene along with technicians from the Michigan

State Police Forensic Lab. Police said that the advanced decomposition of the body did not allow for any immediate identification other than evidence that it was a man.

The body was transported to the Wayne County Morgue for an autopsy which determined the

cause of death as suffocation, authorities said. Police said they had no further information available but did say foul play was suspected in the death.

Lighting causes home fire

A lightning strike is believed to have been the cause of a devastating home fire early Monday morning.

According to the Canton Public Safety Department, a 911 call was received at about 1:15 a.m. Monday from a homeowner in the 8000 block of Tilbury Court.

First responding fire crews found the garage and roof of the home fully engulfed by fire when they arrived on the scene, according to fire department reports. Firefighters, using several hand lines and two aerial ladder trucks, worked for several hours to extinguish the fire.

The occupants of the home were alerted of the fire by their second floor smoke detectors and everyone in the home was able to exit the structure without injury. The homeowner told responding firefighters that he believed his house was struck by lightning at approximately 11:15 p.m., causing the home to lose partial power.

“Any resident whose home is struck by lightning during a storm is advised to contact the Canton Fire Department,” said Fire Chief Joshua Meier. “Firefighters will check the structure for possible smoldering or fire not initially visible to the resident with a thermal imaging camera.”

The 3,500 square foot home suffered extensive damage as a result of the fire.

The Day of Review of Apportionments is an opportunity to review the apportionment with the Drain Commissioner or a member of his staff. The Drain Commissioner and other staff members will be available to assist individuals throughout the day, and make revisions where necessary. There is no need to schedule an appointment for a specific time on the Day of Review. The computation of costs for the Drains will also be available at the Day of Review.

Drain assessments will be collected in the same manner as property taxes. If the assessment period is greater than one year, you may pay the assessments in full with any interest to date at any time and thereby avoid further interest charges.

Persons with disabilities needing accommodations for effective participation in the Day of Review should contact the Wayne County Drain Commissioner's Office at (313) 749-8340 or through the Michigan Relay Center at 7-1-1 (TDD) at least 24 hours in advance of the Day of Review to request mobility, visual, hearing or other assistance.

You may appeal the Drain Commissioner's decision to revise the district boundary to the Wayne County Circuit Court within ten (10) days. You may appeal the Drain Commissioner's determination of apportionments to the Wayne County Probate Court within ten (10) days.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND APPENDIX A – THE ZONING ORDINANCE OF THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF CANTON CODE OF ORDINANCES, BY AMENDING ARTICLE 4.00, SECTION 4.01 REGULATING OFF-STREET PARKING IN CANTON TOWNSHIP. THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF CANTON ORDAINS: SECTION 1. AMENDMENT TO CODE** Article 4.00, Section 4.01 of Appendix A to the Charter Township of Canton Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows: **ARTICLE 4.00. OFF-STREET PARKING AND LOADING REQUIREMENTS 4.01. Off-street Parking requirements.** A. – D. [No change.] *Recreational vehicles parking in residential districts.* Any owner of camping and recreational equipment may park or store such equipment on residentially used property subject to the following conditions: – 2. [No change.] 3. Recreational vehicles may be parked in the owner's driveway for a period not to exceed three calendar days or any part thereof within a rolling seven-day period. 4. – 7. [No change.] **SECTION 2. VIOLATION AND PENALTY** Any person or entity found responsible for a violation of this Ordinance shall be guilty of a civil infraction and may be fined a civil not more than \$100.00, plus any costs and fees that may be imposed by the court. **SECTION 3. SEVERABILITY** If any clause, sentence, section, paragraph or part of this Ordinance, or the application of thereof to any person, firm, corporation, legal entity or circumstances, shall be for any reason adjudged by a court of competent jurisdiction to be unconstitutional or invalid, said judgment shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remainder of this Ordinance. It is hereby declared to the legislative intent of this body that the Ordinance is severable, and that the Ordinance would have been adopted had such invalid or unconstitutional provisions not have been included in this ordinance. **SECTION 4. REPEAL OF CONFLICTING ORDINANCES** All Ordinance or parts of Ordinance is conflict herewith is hereby repealed only to the extent necessary to give this Ordinance full force and effect. **SECTION 5. SAVINGS CLAUSE** All rights and duties which have matured penalties which have been incurred, proceedings which have begun and prosecution for violations of law occurring before the effective date of this Ordinance are not affected or abated by this Ordinance. **SECTION 6. PUBLICATION** The Clerk for the Charter Township of Canton shall cause this Ordinance to be published in the manner required by law. **SECTION 7. Lifesavers honored by Plymouth Township

One golfer who plays in a weekly league at The Inn at St. John's in Plymouth will never forget May 25. That was the day he teed off at the 19th hole with the best shot of his life...it was also the day he suffered a massive heart attack right after his swing.

Adam Johnson, a security supervisor at St. John's and Joseph Micallef, a golf ranger at the course were each honored by the Plymouth Township Board of Trustees last month with life saving awards for their successful efforts to save the man's life.

The incident began as the golfer teed off at about 5:19 p.m.

and immediately suffered cardiac arrest. His brother, and golf partner, immediately dialed 911 just as the situation was noticed by Micallef, who was on duty at the time. Micallef radioed his supervisor, PGA golf professional and Director of Golf James Mrozinski for assistance. He, in turn contacted Johnson who responded by grabbing a AED (Automated External Defibrillator) and rushing to the aid of the stricken golfer. According to all witness accounts, he arrived within 5 minutes of the cardiac incident.

Johnson said he applied the

AED pads to the man's chest after he was unable to obtain a pulse and noticed the blue tone of the man's skin. He said he delivered one shock from the AED at 5:26 and then performed three cycles of CPR. He said the man began to regain consciousness just as the EMS ambulance arrived at the scene. The EMS vehicle transported the man to St. Mary Mercy Hospital.

He was released from the hospital in a few days and is now doing well.

A member of the golf league said that had the staff at The Inn of St. John's not responded in the

timely manner they did and had they not been trained and equipped with an AED, his friend would probably not have survived the incident.

A spokesperson from The Inn at St. John's said that more than 50 staff members are trained in First Aid and the security people are on duty 24-hours a day.

“We are extremely proud of Mr. Micallef and Mr. Johnson and their efforts to save our guest's life,” said Assistant General Manager Jim Fowler.

Vehicle repossession results in assault charges

A 46-year-old Westland woman will return to 18th District Court Aug. 13 on charges of assaulting a man attempting to repossess her vehicle.

The repossession man called Westland police at about 1:15 a.m. July 24. He told officers that Tonia Cramier, 46, had physically assaulted him as he had her 2013 Dodge Journey hooked to a tow truck on the 32000 block of Merritt Street. He said he was repossessing the vehicle due to financing problems.

The tow truck driver told police that Cramier confronted him as he had her vehicle hooked up to his truck and nearly on the trailer. He said she came running from a home and got into the passenger side seat in the tow truck and pushed and scratched him. He told police that Cramier insisted that he could not repossess the vehicle and refused to look at the legal documents he attempted to show her, according to police reports. Officers who examined the documents at the

scene determined that the driver's paperwork was in order. They noted that he had visible scratches and redness on the right side of his face and neck, according to police reports.

Police arrested Cramier at the scene and noted that according to test results she had a .13 blood alcohol level at the time of the incident. She was subsequently issued a court appearance ticket. She appeared in court and entered a not guilty plea, claiming that the repossession agent

had used a key to cause the injuries to himself. She was released on \$2,500 or 10 percent bond.

According to court records, Cramier is currently on probation on charges she embezzled funds from the Westland Housing Department. Prosecutors alleged that in 2007 she forged the signature of a client at the Family Self-Sufficiency Program through the Dorsey Center in Westland. The client claimed that Cramier, who was an employee of an outside

agency, kept part of the money from the check.

In 2008, Cramier and one of her sons was accused of forging a neighbor's checks. She was also sentenced to probation on those charges after entering a plea of no-contest, according to court records. In 2013, she was again placed on probation after being charged with forging her ex-husband's name on home loan documents in an effort to lower payments on the Merritt Street residence.

Van Buren trustees OK 6.5 mill ballot request

Van Buren Township voters will see a request for a 6.5 mill public safety tax on their Nov. 3 ballot.

Members of the Van Buren Township Board of Trustees approved placing the public safety millage question on the ballot by a 6-1 vote last week. The millage would be in effect for 7 years and be levied Dec. 1, 2017 if approved by voters.

According to Township Supervisor Linda Combs, the new millage would cost the average homeowner in the township about \$125 more annually, based on a State Equalized Value of \$50,000 on a \$100,000 market value home. The millage, an increase of 2.5 mills from the current millage rate, would generate \$6,478,215 at a rate of \$6.50 for every \$1,000 of taxable value on property in the township. The current millage expires Dec. 31, 2016.

The only no vote was cast by board member Brenda McClanahan who said the taxpayers were not amenable to any tax increase, proven by a recent survey completed by the Van Buren Public Schools. She said based on that survey, the school district reduced a sinking fund renewal request to half a mill.

Clerk Leon Wright was in favor of the new millage noting that future growth in the township populations will require more service and increased requests for public safety services.

Wright said that the current system of funding public safety places an undue burden on the township general fund.

Trustee Jeff Jahr said that the township now provides a high level of service. He said residents now pick up the phone and receive help immediately from the public safety department.

“People feel safe in this community,” he said.

Combs criticized the recent comment of former Supervisor Paul White who referred to the proposed millage increase as “bait and switch.” She said that the township is facing a serious liability without the approval of the proposed millage.

Treasurer Sharry Budd reinforced Combs’ statements and noted that the public safety budget is now \$7.7 million annually and the current 4 mills brings in only \$3.4 mills toward that expense. Budd said township auditors have warned officials that spending must come in line with revenue.

“If the residents say no, there will have to be severe changes,” Budd said.
