Payouts to past officials questioned

Plymouth Township Clerk Jerry Vorva has discovered records showing unauthorized payouts made by former Township Treasurer Ron Edwards that officials say undermine the township health care compensation commitment and could be illegal.

Vorva said the payments totaling nearly \$20,000 were authorized by Edwards and the funds were deposited into four individuals' respective health savings accounts and labeled as

"Retiree Health Care Contributions."

According to accounting records and check receipts obtained by The Eagle under the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA), former Supervisor Shannon Price, Clerk Nancy Conzelmann, Deputy Clerk Michelle Lortz and current

and former Deputy Treasurer Amy Hampe were recipients of the questionable benefits.

The township practice of offering health insurance benefits to eligible retired full-time elected officials is based in part on their respective years of service, Vorva explained. In addition, Vorva said a program for

supplemental health savings accounts (HSAs), governed by Vanguard, Benefit Administrators, is also available to employees and subject to eligibility rules.

According to Vorva, the subject transactions were posted Nov. 18, 2016 after the General Election in which both Price and Conzelmann were defeated. Township records reveal a check issued by Edwards payable to Vanguard Transfer Agents, LLC, dated Nov. 17, 2016, was dispersed just

Senator visits Wayne dam project

Two Wayne businesses received a very special visitor last week as U.S. Sen. Debbie Stabenow dropped in to touch base with small business owner and city officials.

Stabenow came to the City of Wayne last week to take a look at how more than a \$1 million she fought for in Washington, D.C. was spent and dropped in at IKON Computer Solutions and Karma Coffee and Kitchen while she was in town.

Stabenow authored the Great Lakes Restoration Initiative in 2010 which provided just over \$1 million in funding for the Wayne Road Dam Removal and Habitat Improvement Project in the Rouge River near Wayne Road. The project, completed in 2013, reconnected approximately 121 miles of river and tributaries to the Great Lakes system for the first time in more than a century. The dam removal opened new opportunities for canoeing and kayaking and restored passage for a variety of fish, including trout, smallmouth bass, northern pike and walleye, according to ecologists.

Stabenow is now leading the bipartisan effort to stop proposals to eliminate funding for the Great Lakes Restoration Initiative next year.

She joined representatives from the Alliance of Rouge Communities, the City of Wayne, and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) last Friday at the site of the completed Wayne Road Dam Removal and Habitat Improvement Project.

"One in five Michigan jobs is tied to water. It is more important than ever to continue investing in the health of our Great

Lakes and waterways," said Stabenow, co-chair of the bipartisan Senate Great Lakes Task Force. "This successful project is an excellent example of how Great Lakes funding is helping more Michigan families and visitors enjoy fishing, kayaking, and canoeing in the Rouge River."

The Wayne Road Dam was built in the early 1900s along the Lower Branch of the Rouge River in the City of Wayne to provide water for firefighting. The 3-foot-high Wayne Road Dam no

longer served a public purpose and acted as a barrier to fish and promoted the accumulation of sediment and debris behind the dam, officials said in an application for permission from federal authorities to remove the structure.

Removal of the Wayne Road Dam was a priority project for the Rouge River Advisory Council, which is committed to restoring the Rouge River. The

6-month probe ends in arrests

A six-month criminal investigation by Canton Township Police into a high-end retail fraud operation ended in the arrest and arraignment last week of a Detroit pawn shop owner and one of his employees.

The investigation was a cooperative effort between the Canton department, Michigan State Police and the Wayne County Prosecutor's office, according to police. A search warrant was executed at the iPawn Shop on Eight Mile Road in Detroit on June 12, along with another warrant at the Commerce Township home of Gasswan Usama Gargis, 38, the owner of the shop.

Police said that more than \$300,000 in new, in-box merchandise, including high-end electronics, kitchen appliances, generators and power tools were recovered, merchandise allegedly stolen from stores in southeast Michigan, including Centex.

"The defendants are allegedly responsible for thwarting approximately \$200,000 from major big box retailers in the metro Detroit area. These charges today are the result of months of tedious and exhaustive work by the Canton Police Department and the Wayne County Prosecutor's Office," said Wayne County Prosecutor Kym Worthy in a prepared statement. "This case should serve as notice that these wide-scale sales of stolen goods to pawn shop operations will be vigorously investigated and prosecuted in Wayne County."

Gargis was arraigned on multiple felony charges on Aug. 1. He is facing one count of conducting a criminal enterprise; seven counts of organized retail crime and six counts of receiving and concealing stolen property over \$1,000. He also faces two misdemeanor charges. Gargis could face up to 20 years in prison if convicted.

An associate in the pawn shop, Trisha-Lynette Vlado Raman, 29, of Orchard Lake, was also arraigned Aug. 1 on two misdemeanor charges and felony charges including five counts of organized retail crime and two counts of receiving and concealing stolen property over \$1,000. She is facing five years imprisonment, which is committed to Judge Kenneth J. King of 28th District Court set both defendants a \$5,000 personal bond.

Athlete of the Year continues winning streak

When Janet Brady turned 50, she decided to take the advice of a dear friend she met during her 10-year employment at Canton Township Hall. Jerry Gansura, a volunteer at the senior center and Brady had become fast friends and she suggested that Brady participate in local senior athletic competitions, something she had been doing at the local, state and national levels.

Brady took her advice and now, at 59, she is one of the newest members of the Canton Township Hall of Fame and is no stranger to winning. The 25-year township resident also won the Canton Community Achiever award this year.

Last year, she received the National Congress of State Games Adult Female Athlete of the Year and was the first Michigan adult to receive the award. She won the 2016 Meijer State Games of Michigan Adult Female Athlete of the Year and in eight years participated in local, state, and national competi-

tions to win 128 medals.

She was the Michigan Senior Olympics record holder for hammer throw for two years and is currently a Michigan Senior Olympics record holder for deadlift for her weight and age class. She qualified for National Senior Games in Birmingham, AL and the State Games of America in Grand Rapids in 2017.

Her family, she said, is supportive of her competitive endeavors. She and her husband of 32 years, Kevin, are the parents of three adult children. Kelly is a pediatric physician in Troy. Sean is a chef at Picasso restaurant group, and Colin is an Automotive Transmission System Engineer for Ford Motor Co. The family also includes a black Labrador mix named Tilly.

This month, Brady will be in the opening ceremony for the State Games of America. In 2016 and 2015, she received the All-Michigan Athlete for Meijer State Games in track and field. She received the 2016 Canton

Community Support Award for all of her volunteer work in the Canton Community. At the 2016 National United States of America Track and Field in Grand Rapids, she received 7th place in hammer throw event.

When this Canton resident turned 50 in 2008, she said she wanted to challenge herself in many ways by adding different sports and different venues. She won 19 gold, six silver, and two bronze so far in Michigan Senior Olympics. She participated in track and field events (hammer throw, discus, shot put, javelin, long jump), horseshoes and volleyball at the Michigan Senior Olympics. She won 8th place in Javelin, 9th place in Shot Put, and 9th place in discus in the 2011 National Senior Olympics in Houston, TX. She won 2nd place in the 2013 National Senior Games in Horseshoes and 9th in Hammer Throw in Cleveland, OH. She competed in the 2015 National Senior Olympic in horseshoes in Minnesota in July

and won a silver medal. She has received 128 medals; 80 gold, 34 silver, 14 bronze from Canton Western Wayne County Senior Olympics (WWCSO), MSO, USATF, Meijer State Games, Canton State Game and National Senior Olympics.

Brady said she has made new friends and helped encourage

others to become more active. She said she is dedicated to her sports and uses her knowledge and skills to help others.

Brady has organized several sporting events for the Western Wayne County Senior Olympics for Canton. She represented Canton Township in the WWCSO committee for many years and supervised various sporting events. She has lent other seniors her equipment so they can participate in activities. If she doesn't have any competition in her age group, she said she competes against herself to do better. Every year, she learns new things about herself and how to push herself to do better, she added.

Brady has received letters, special tributes, and certificate of recognition for all of her accomplishments in sports from Gov. Rick Snyder, U.S. Senator Debbie Stabenow, Michigan State Sen. Patrick Colbeck, U.S. Congressman David Trott, and Michigan State Rep. Kristy Pagan.

2 Northville schools win 'Lighthouse' honors

Five of only 18 Lighthouse Schools in the State of Michigan are now located in the Northville School District. Winchester and Thornton Creek elementary schools have earned the Lighthouse School designation, based on based on Stephen Covey's 7 Habits of Highly Effective People.

Of the more than 3,500 The Leader in Me schools worldwide, Winchester is the 289th and Thornton Creek is the 342nd to achieve Lighthouse School status. There are 298 Lighthouse Schools in the United States, and just 18 in Michigan, including five in Northville - Moraine, Silver Springs, Ridge Wood, and now Thornton Creek and Winchester.

The Leader in Me is a whole-school transformational framework developed in partnership with educators that empowers students with the leadership and life skills they need to thrive in the 21st century. A Lighthouse Review Team from FranklinCovey Education, spent the day March 22 interviewing Winchester students, teachers, staff and parents; toured the school; visited classrooms; and reviewed data with students. Just 19 days later, Principal Kelly Lindsay got the call that Winchester is a The Leader in Me Lighthouse School.

"We are honored to become a The Leader in Me Lighthouse School," Lindsay said. "We have seen such amazing results from implementing The Leader in Me at our school, such as an enhanced school culture, and an increase in student self-confidence and leadership initiative."

Local business faces discrimination lawsuit

The operator of a Tim Hortons Cafe and Bake Shop in Romulus has been accused of violating federal law when he refused to permit an employee to wear a skirt instead of pants in accordance with her religious beliefs. Attorneys for the U.S. Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC) filed a federal lawsuit last week naming *Shawm Enterprise, LLC* as the defendant.

In the suit, EEOC attorneys

charged that employee Amanda Corley wore a skirt to work at the Tim Hortons Romulus location instead of the standard uniform pants. She did so pursuant to her Pentecostal Apostolic faith. When she attempted to present a letter from her pastor explaining why she could not wear pants, management refused to accept the letter and informed her she was fired, according to the court filings.

The conduct alleged violates

Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 which requires employers to provide reasonable religious accommodations to employees. The EEOC filed suit (Case No. 2:17-cv-12337 in U.S. District Court for the Eastern District of Michigan) after first attempting to reach a pre-litigation settlement through a conciliation process. The EEOC is seeking injunctive relief prohibiting Shawm from discriminating against other employees

who need religious accommodations in the future as well as lost wages, compensatory and punitive damages and other financial relief for Corley, according to a prepared statement.

"Shawm's refusal to accommodate Corley and the decision to instead fire her were completely unjustified and unlawful," said EEOC Indianapolis Regional Attorney Kenneth Bird, "whose jurisdiction includes Michigan." "It would

have been simple to allow Ms. Corley to wear a skirt, and would not have negatively impacted the business in any way. Employers have an obligation to provide these types of reasonable religious accommodations, and when they fail to, the EEOC will step in."

The EEOC's Detroit Field Office is part of the Indianapolis District Office, which oversees Michigan, Indiana, Kentucky and parts of Ohio.

Police seek witnesses in homicide

Michigan State Police investigators are asking anyone who may have information about an Aug. 3 homicide in Inkster to come forward.

Second District Special Investigation Section officers are continuing their investigation into the fatal shooting, which occurred at approximately 6:30 p.m. Aug. 3 at East Franks Party Store, on Inkster Road near New York Street Aug. 3.

Investigators said that the preliminary investigation indi-

cated that the victim, Hassan Ibrahim Tannaa, 31, of Inkster, was shot numerous times during an altercation inside the store with a man described by witnesses as African American.

Hassan is very well known in that neighborhood and especially to regular customers of the party store," said State Police First Lt. Michael Shaw. "He suffered from some mental disabilities and was known to sit outside of the store and ask for spare change to buy pop or

other items inside of the store." The victim lived in a group home near the store, located on Inkster Road near New York Street.

It is believed that the suspect was involved in a verbal altercation with Tannaa, left the store and returned later, confronting the victim in the store and shooting him. The victim was transported to Beaumont Hospital Dearborn where he later died of his injuries.

The suspect fled the scene

after the shooting in a grey Dodge Durango, according to police reports.

"The suspect is also known to be a regular customer at the store," Shaw said. "We are hoping that the public will help us identify the suspect from the surveillance tape, before he hurts someone else."

Suspect arrested in Meth lab operation

A 36-year-old man is due back in court today on charges he was operating a methamphetamine manufacturing laboratory in Westland.

Chad David Wicker, 36, was arrested by Westland police July 30, during an investigation of a suspicious activity at a garage near Greenwood Road and South Wildwood Avenue.

Police arrived at the location in the 34000 block of Decatur Court and discovered the suspected meth lab in the garage.

Personnel in HAZMAT suits from the Michigan State Police Methamphetamine Response Team dismantled the laboratory and assured local officials that the scene was no longer a danger to the surrounding community. Witnesses reported seeing officers remove what police described as "highly toxic" and "flammable" evidence from the garage.

Wicker, described at the time by police as a "person of interest" in the

investigation was arrested on an outstanding warrant he had with a nearby community. Further investigation by Westland police led to Wicker's arrest in connection with the drug operation. While Wicker was initially identified as a Garden City resident, court documents refer to him as homeless.

Wayne County Prosecutor Kym Worthy charged Wicker with operating/maintaining a methamphetamine lab, attempted possession with intent to deliver methamphetamine and breaking and entering of a building with intent to commit a felony.

"Methamphetamine is a very dangerous and highly addictive drug. The possibilities for large explosions are a great risk - especially in urban areas. The alleged activities of this defendant that were thwarted by witnesses and law enforcement potentially saved many lives," Worthy said.

Wicker was arraigned by video Aug. 2 before 18th District Court Magistrate David Wacker. He was due back in court today before Judge Sandra Cleinfield for a probable cause hearing. His preliminary court examination is scheduled for Aug. 17, before Judge Mark McConnell in 18th District Court. Wicker set his bond at \$250,000 cash or surety bond.

Rouge River is one of 14 "Areas of Concern" in Michigan that were identified in the 1980s by the United States and Canadian governments as having severe, long-term environmental problems. The design was completed under a \$57,000 Wayne County Rouge Program Office grant and con-

struction and monitoring of the project was completed under GLRI funding through a NOAA grant of \$1,083,526. The project also restored the river's natural channel and river banks.

"The Alliance for Rouge Communities and its 41 members truly appreciate the Great Lakes Restoration Initiative and Senator Stabenow's continued support. GLRI funding provided through EPA and NOAA allowed us to restore the habitat in six

areas within the Rouge River," said John O'Meara, principal engineer, Alliance of Rouge Communities.

"The Wayne Road Dam Removal and Habitat Improvement project is an excellent example of river restoration when federal, state, and local communities work together. ARC communities have worked together for over 20 years to restore the Rouge River. Senator Stabenow, EPA, NOAA, and the GLRI allow

us to build upon our successes and improve the quality of life throughout Southeast Michigan," he added.

The trustees postponed his motion indefinitely, without a set date for further review or vote.

days before his required exit. Price and Conzelmann received a combined deposit of \$7,550.00 while Loxter and Hammy received a combined total of \$11,850. Special solar eclipse viewing set

The entire area will be in the dark for a while Aug. 21, and the Plymouth District Library will make the momentous occasion a little safer for everyone.

A total solar eclipse will occur on Monday, Aug. 21 and will be completely visible only within a band across the entire contiguous United States and partially visible in the area of southeastern Michigan. The last time a total solar eclipse was visible across the entire contiguous United States was during the June 8, 1918 eclipse.

A solar eclipse occurs when the moon passes between Earth and the sun, thereby totally or partly obscuring the image of the sun for a viewer on Earth. A total eclipse occurs when the apparent diameter of the moon is larger than the sun's, blocking all direct sunlight, turning day into darkness. Totality occurs in a narrow path across Earth's surface, with the partial solar eclipse visible over a surrounding region thousands of kilometers wide.

A group viewing of the eclipse is planned at Plymouth Township Park from 12:30 until 4:30 p.m. Aug. 21.

This eclipse is the 22nd of the 77-member Saros series 145, which also produced the solar eclipse of Aug. 11, 1999. The longest eclipse in this series will occur on June 25, 2522 and last for 7 minutes and 12 seconds. This upcoming eclipse is the first visible solar eclipse from the contiguous United States in 40 years. Thanks to the support of the Bosch Community Fund, there are free eclipse safety glasses available for pick up at the front desk of the Plymouth Library officials said.
