## Council approves new library board

There is a new library board in the City of Westland.

Following months of controversy and the subsequent resignation of the entire library board, members of the city council confirmed the appointment of five new members of the body during their most recent meeting.

"In light of the unique situation of appointing an entirely new library board, I reached out to The Library Network, which is the largest library cooperative in the State of Michigan, serving over 2.4 million residents, to oversee the

vetting process of potential candidates," commented Mayor William R. Wild. Fourteen residents expressed an interest in serving on the board which oversees the library director and operations at the facility.

Director James Fietz forwarded the names of the top five candidates for consideration to Wild which he then submitted to the council members for their confirmation.

Appointed to the board were: Julie Herrin, who has more than 38 years of library administration experience. Her background includes extensive work with library boards, strategic

plan development and oversight, plus staff management in a collective bargaining environment. Herrin was appointed to a five-year term which will expire Aug. 7, 2022.

Kathryn Sample, the current finance director for the City of Wayne. Sample has seven years of management experience for a local non-profit organization. She will complete an unexpired term that will expire Aug. 15 of 2021.

Gayle Nicholson, a long-term Westland resident with exten-

## Elusive contractor 'served' at fundraiser

Republican Party supporter and one-time party official, Sam Baki received an unexpected acknowledgement of his presence at a recent political fundraiser in Livonia. After two months of failed attempts, 35th District Court officers were finally able to hand the principle officer of SRRAB, Inc. a summons from Plymouth Township demanding his appearance in court to answer charges related to damaged cable lines.

Plymouth Township officials confirmed successful service of the court summons to Baki, a one-time licensed contractor and officer of township vendor SRRAB, after months of frustration. Those familiar with the case say addresses used by Baki were non-existent and he could not be found at his official registered voter address during several visits.

Baki, 55, was being sought by the court to answer a small claims complaint filed by Township Clerk Jerry Vorva on June 13 in an effort to collect \$3,652.87. An affidavit signed by Vorva and filed in the 35th District Court alleges that careless excavation while Baki's employees were installing a wooden fence in McClumpha Park in August 2016 severed cable lines owned by Wide Open West (WOW).

State records show Baki as listed the resident agent of SRRAB and as an active licensed Realtor. According to state records, Baki held an individual builder license that lapsed in 2006.

Invoices from Baki's firm were also cited in a forensic audit of Hilltop Golf Course performed by Plante Moran and completed in June. The findings included what appear to be duplicate billings, fictitious invoices, questionable purchase orders and the potential manipulation of address data, according to the audit report.

According to invoices submitted to the township for payment, SRRAB, Inc. is located at 38901 Plymouth Road in Livonia. Court records state officers

## Romulus voters reject millages

In the future, we hope we're able to more clearly illustrate the schools' needs in our community and to earn our voters' support.

Of those, 987 were absentee ballots with only 716 voters at the polls on election day.

"The Romulus Community School District is disappointed at the results of (Tuesday's) election. Our board of education will take these results under advisement and will soon inform the community of our next steps. Clearly, without sufficient funding to safely maintain all of our facilities, we will have to begin the process of

evaluating our facilities' usage and how that usage best addresses the education needs of our students," stated the members of the board of education in a prepared statement following the announcement of the vote.

"In the future, we hope we're able to more clearly illustrate the schools' needs in our community and to earn our voters' support," said school board secretary Robert McLaughlin.

Voters in the Romulus Community School District defeated two proposals on the ballot last Tuesday.

A renewal of the district operating millage for 10 years was rejected by voters by at total of 967 votes against and 723 votes in favor of the proposal.

A second request for a sinking fund millage to fund improvements in technology, building security and vocational education was also defeated by a total of 693 votes against the question and 309 votes in favor of the request.

Only 1,703 of the 17,058 registered voters took part in the election, less than 10 percent.

## Scout leader pleads guilty to sex offense

A former border control agent and Boy Scout leader has been sentenced to five years probation after pleading guilty to felony charges of molesting children for immoral purposes and criminal sexual conduct fourth degree.

David Radecki, 37, of Romulus was charged with the crimes when allegations first surfaced in October of last year. The 12-year-old victim told Romulus police that he had been touched inappropriately several times by Radecki, the leader of his Boy Scout Troop.

Radecki was sentenced last Tuesday, Aug. 8, before Circuit Court Judge Lawrence Tabor to five years probation. He must serve the first year of probation in the Wayne County Jail, have no contact with either the victim or his mother; have no unsupervised contact with minors under 16; have no participation in activities which involve/include minors and be must register as a sex offender.

Radecki was scheduled for a jury trial set to begin June 22 in Wayne County

Circuit Court but opted to enter a guilty plea to the charges and avoid trial.

Radecki was arraigned on the charges Feb. 16 before 34th District Judge David Parrott who set bail and allowed him to leave police custody only while on an electronic tether.

The Boy Scouts of America released the following statement immediately after news of Radecki's arrest was made public: "The behavior included in these allegations is abhorrent and runs counter to everything for which the Boy Scouts of America stands. Upon learning of these allegations we took action to preclude this individual from any further participation in the Scouting program.

"The safety of our youth members is of paramount importance and we seek to prevent child abuse through a comprehensive program of education on the subject, the chartered organization leader selection process, criminal background and other checks, policies and procedures to serve as barriers to abuse."

### Family business marks 75th anniversary

Woolf Aircraft in Romulus celebrated 75 years in business with an open house where owners proudly displayed the company history.

Founder, Clarence Woolf, began as a welder at Stinson Aircraft and based on his expertise, soon became an instructor at Willow Run. Recognizing the need for welders, he rented a two-car garage in Wayne to repair parts, specifically B-24 bomber fuselages. After the war, his business grew to 50 employees and expanded until his death in 1973.

His son, Dan Woolf continued the legacy and purchased property on Cogswell Road in Romulus where he built a new manufacturing building that sits on the western boundary of the

forgotten Stinson Aircraft.

Woolf Aircraft now employs more than 100 workers, specializing in building tubular aircraft parts. Racing exhaust is also a large part of the business and Woolf is the largest stocking manufacturer of tubular bent elbows in the US. Welding and full CNC machining are primary to the business.

The family-owned business continues into the third generation with Dan Woolf's son, Adam Woolf, as president, and son-in-law David Canada as vice president. They agreed that traditions of Clarence and Dan Woolf in building a better community and encouraging workers to build better lives remain a primary mission at the company.

## Study of historic district homes OK'd

For the first time in 45 years, historic homes in the City of Northville will be studied and evaluated for their significance in the community.

A grant from the State Historic Preservation Office will fund part of the survey while the federal government and the City of Northville will share in the cost of evaluating the more than 300 homes in the 144-acre historic district. The survey will be managed by Carlisle Wortman Associates principal Sally Elmiger who noted that the study would be a good resource for the Historic District Commission members and property owners.

State and federal agencies dedicated to historic preservation will also receive a copy of the anticipated report which will include color photos as well as survey data and summary reports. The information will also be available on the City of Northville website, officials said.

The survey will provide needed information for the members of the Historic District Commission who are charged with approving petitions for changes to structures in the district. The comprehensive survey will help commissioners

understand building components and the historical significance of architectural features.

The study should also help homeowners understand the historic importance of some of the features of their homes and the need for preserving those elements of the past, officials said.

City officials are currently accepting applications for a historical architect to help perform the survey and evaluation. Currently, prior to changes to homes in the historic district, owners must complete an application which includes the date of construction of the home, the architectural style, historic photos, the name of the original owner, builder developer and the timeline for any construction. Owners also need to provide a detailed description of the building materials relevant to the home and historic information such as notable residents, whether the home is a recognized landmark or important site and any other historic attributes.

Qualified architects or building historians can find the Request For Proposal form on the on the Northville city website. Proposals will be accepted until noon Sept. 5.

## Seniors celebrate summer

Wayne County Executive Warren Evans stopped by the annual picnic for Inkster senior citizens organized by the Inkster Commission on Aging.

Evans thanked the group for all the support the Inkster commission provides for the Wayne County Home Delivered Meals Program (Meals on Wheels). The Inkster Commission on Aging provides two drivers and recently purchased two cargo vans that are used for home delivery of meals to Inkster seniors. The service was made possible by the dedicated mileage approved by voters to support senior services in Inkster.

The Saints, Inc. also assist in the program and deliver a route weekdays.

The Commission on Aging also purchased a vehicle that is used as a shuttle bus to provide transportation between seniors in their homes and the Dozier Recreation Complex. This allows residents with no transportation to be a part of the programming at recreation center Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays.

More than 100 seniors attended the annual picnic Aug. 4 at Wheatley Park, noted Commission on Aging Program Director Denise Champagne.

## Inspections required for Inkster businesses

Businesses throughout the City of Inkster have been visited by city inspectors during the past few weeks as part of the annual renewal of business licenses.

Businesses received a letter from Mayor Byron H. Nolen in June, notifying them that the license renewal process includes the inspection of the business premises as part of a new process adopted in the city

July 1. The new inspection will result in the issuance of a Certificate of Compliance which will be necessary to renew business licenses.

Annual inspections of commercial property are required by the 2015 International Property Maintenance Code and by city ordinance, Nolen told business owners.

"Additionally this inspection is important in order to ensure

that public health and safety standards are maintained," he noted in his letter.

The mayor cautioned business owners that failing to renew business licenses puts them in violation of a city ordinance which could then require them to appear in court for operating without a license in the city.

The cost of the annual inspection is \$190 per property address and inspectors from the city

building department will inspect the property for compliance with all codes and ordinances. Any noted violations must be corrected prior to the issuance of the certificate of compliance. Once a business owner has received their certificate, they can take it to the office of the city clerk to renew their license. This must be done prior to the Dec. 31 deadline, Nolen cautioned.

"It is best not to wait for the business license deadline to schedule your annual inspection as it may take some time to address any violations that may be noted," Nolen cautioned business owners.
