State requires corrections at park project

Officials from the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality (MDEQ) have determined that the 4-acre, 209-spot parking lot under construction in McClumpha Park in Plymouth Township is in violation of state regulations.

Following a second meeting with state regulators early Monday morning, Hae-Jin Yoon, Southeast Michigan supervisor for the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality (MDEQ) said the township needs to make improvements to comply with state regulations by changing the location of the outflow at the parking lot site, “so runoff water goes in more of an upland area.”

Yoon said with the current design most of the (runoff) water goes into storm drains that empty

too close to the valley which is a designated Rouge River sub-watershed. The storm drains lead to perforated underground piping. Runoff water, Yoon explained, can contain many types of contaminants, including gas and oil from automobiles which can seriously threaten water quality.

“They (Plymouth Township) need to change the location of the outflow...” Yoon explained. She was referring to is the same area township officials have designated for proposed construction of an outdoor amphitheater where vegetation was removed and core drillings for soil samples were completed last year.

This was the second meeting with the MDEQ officials and the township. Yoon and Wayne County Water Quality Analyst Andrew Bahrou met with Township Supervisor Shannon Price, Township Park Director Mike Mitchell, Township Engineer Patrick Felrath and David Richmond, project manager from Spalding DeDecker, the consulting engineers who replaced the original project engineering firm, on Aug. 7 to discuss changes to the plans that would mitigate the problems and bring the township into compliance with recommended MDEQ requirements.

Following the second meeting on Monday, both Yoon and Sally Petrella, volunteer monitoring program manager from Friends of the Rouge, confirmed that the township was in the process of developing revised drawings and delving into the plans. Yoon said the township had agreed to change the plans to mitigate the water flow. Price did not attend the meeting Monday morning but said that his understanding of the meeting was that it went well.

“Everybody’s on the same page...nobody’s trying to hide anything, everybody’s happy,” Price said.

“They are addressing the problems,” Yoon said Monday. “They’re changing the outfall location to go up stream.”

Petrella said the township also promised to clean silt out of the

Woman faces murder charges in Wayne crash

Onika Adrenelle-Cannon Fields, 39, reportedly of Detroit, will face second-degree murder and driving on a suspended license charges in the death of a Romulus woman Aug. 12.

Police said that Fields was fleeing another hit-and-run accident when she struck the vehicle of 67-year-old Alzada Dolencic at the intersection of Merriman and Van Born roads in Wayne at about 2 p.m. last Wednesday. Other passengers were also injured in the crash, according to police reports.

Fields was arraigned last

Friday morning by 29th District Court Judge Laura Mack on charges of second-degree murder, and driving while license suspended, causing death. She entered a not guilty plea and remains in custody in lieu of a \$10,000 cash bond. Her preliminary court examination is set for Sept. 1.

Investigators said that Fields ignored a red light and crashed into a vehicle at the intersection of Middlebelt and Van Born roads in Westland and then “fled at a high rate of speed.”

Police said Fields had earlier ignored another red light in Romulus, causing a rear-end collision when another motorist was forced to slam on his brakes abruptly. While she was not directly involved in that collision, police said, her actions apparently caused that crash.

Police from Wayne, Westland and Romulus blocked numerous streets surrounding the area of the fatal collision during the investigation. Police said that Fields was partially through the intersection when the fatal crash

occurred.

Dolencic had reportedly just left her doctor’s office and was only about a mile from her home when the crash took place. She was airlifted to a hospital for treatment of her injuries but died the same day.

Wayne County Prosecutor Kym L. Worthy said, “The alleged defendant’s conduct in this case was dangerous to everyone who was on Wayne County roads at 2 p.m. Aug. 12. Cars can be a murder weapon just like a gun or a knife.”

Teen’s boyfriend to spend life in prison for plot

Michael Rivera was sentenced to life in prison by Wayne County Circuit Court Judge James Callahan last week, following his conviction on charges of plotting to murder his teenage girlfriend’s Plymouth Township family last October.

Rivera, now 24, and Rokzana Sikorski, 14 at the time of the attack, were each accused of four counts of conspiracy to

commit murder, one count of attempted murder, one count of using a computer to commit a crime and felonious assault with a dangerous weapon. A jury found Rivera guilty of all charges July 23. Sikorski, being tried as an adult despite her age, is scheduled to go to trial in October.

Sikorski was 15 when she and Rivera allegedly plotted to kill her parents, sister and

brother so they could run away together and he could avoid sexual misconduct charges her parents had filed against him in an attempt to separate the two. Sikorski allegedly slashed the throat of her sleeping 12-year-old brother whose screams alerted the rest of the family. Investigators said at the time that Sikorski fled the home, leaving behind her cell phone on which they found messages

between her and Rivera, who was 22 at the time, including explicit instructions on ways to kill her family by slitting their throats as they slept.

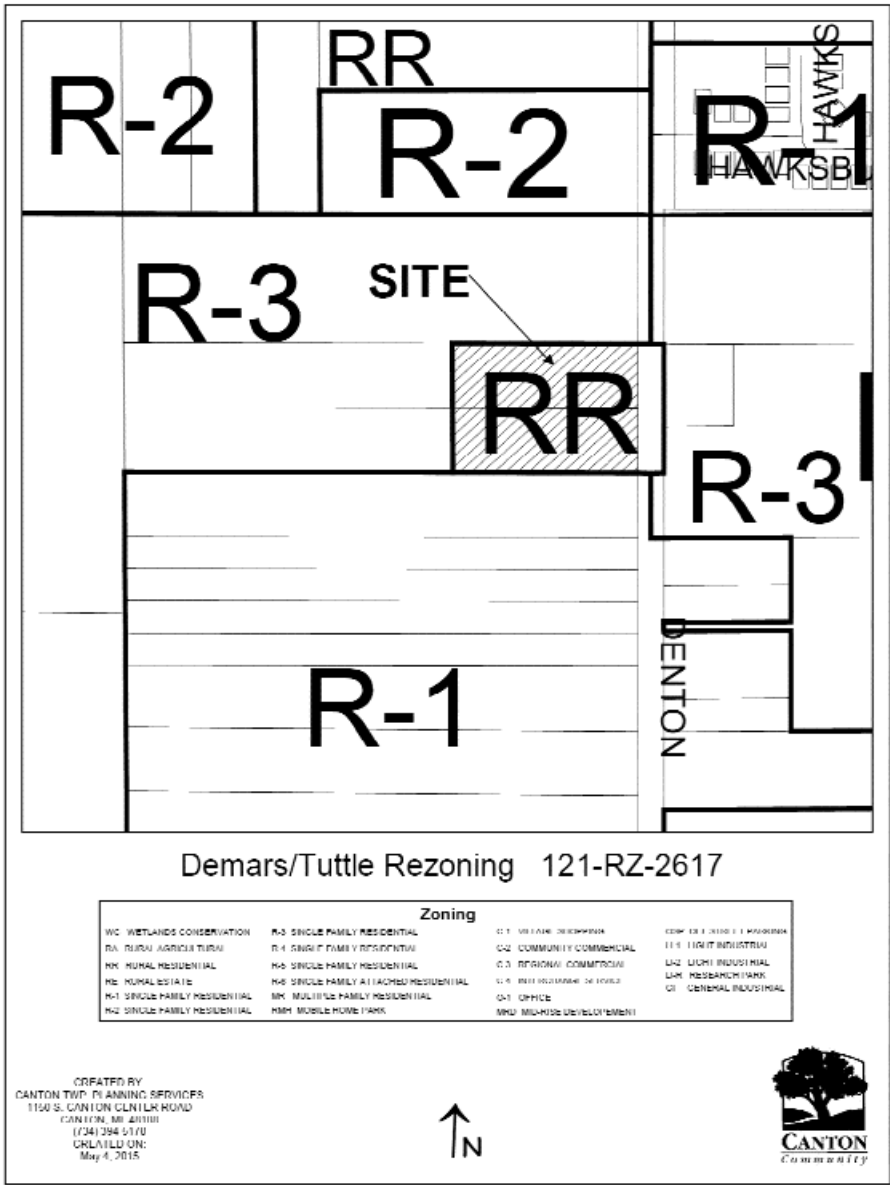
Sikorski and Rivera were arrested the next morning at his Detroit home and both have remained in custody since that time. Prosecutor Kym Worthy opted to charge Sikorski as an

(6) Making an unsolicited commercial telephone call which is received between the hours of 9:00 p.m. and 9:00 a.m. For the purpose of this subsection, the term "an unsolicited commercial telephone call" means a call made by a person or recording device on behalf of a person soliciting business or contributions. AMENDMENT TO CODE. Article IV. - Sexually Oriented Businesses Division 2. - Licenses Sec. 18-172. - Application** An application for a license under this division must be made on a form provided by the township and submitted to the township clerk. All applicants must be qualified according to the provisions of this article. The application may request and the applicant shall provide such information as to enable the township to determine whether the applicant meets the qualifications established in this article. If a person who wishes to operate a sexually oriented business is an individual, the person must sign the application for a license as applicant. If a person who wishes to operate a sexually oriented business is other than an individual, each individual who has a 20 percent or greater interest in the business must sign the application for a license as applicant. Each applicant must be qualified under section 18-173 and each applicant shall be considered a licensee if a license is granted. The completed application for a sexually oriented business license shall contain the following information and shall be accompanied by the following documents: (1) If the applicant is: a. An individual, the individual shall state his legal name and any aliases and submit proof that he is 18 years of age. b. A partnership, the partnership shall state its complete name and the names of all partners, whether the partnership is general or limited, and a copy of the partnership agreement, if any. c. A corporation, the corporation shall state its complete name, the date of its incorporation, evidence that the corporation is in good standing under the laws of its state of incorporation, the names and capacity of all officers, directors and principal stockholders, and the name of the registered corporate agent and the address of the registered office for service of process. (2) If the applicant intends to operate the sexually oriented business under a name other than that of the applicant, he must state the sexually oriented business's fictitious name and submit the required registration documents. (3) The application shall state whether the applicant, or a person residing with the applicant, has been convicted of a specified criminal activity as defined in this article and, if so, the specified criminal activity involved, and the date, place and jurisdiction of each. The Applicant shall obtain and submit an Internet Criminal History Access Tool ("ICHAT") with the other required application materials. ICHATS are available online at www.michigan.gov/msp. (4) The application shall state whether the applicant, or a person residing with the applicant, has had a previous license under this article or other similar sexually oriented business ordinances from another municipality or county denied, suspended or revoked, including the name and location of the sexually oriented business for which the permit was denied, suspended or revoked, and whether the applicant or a person residing with the applicant has been a partner in a partnership or an officer, director or principal stockholder of a corporation that is licensed under this article whose license has previously been denied, suspended or revoked, including the name and location of the sexually oriented business for which the permit was denied, suspended or revoked as well as the date of denial, suspension or revocation. (5) The application shall state whether the applicant, or a person residing with the applicant, holds any other licenses under this article or other similar sexually oriented business ordinances from another municipality or county and, if so, the names and locations of such other licensed businesses. (6) The application shall state the single classification of license for which the applicant is filing. (7) The application shall state the location of the proposed sexually oriented business, including a legal description of the property, street address, and telephone number, if any. (8) The application shall state the applicant's mailing address and residential address. (9) A recent photograph of the applicant shall be included. (10) The applicant's driver's license number, social security number, and/or state or federally issued tax identification number shall be included. (11) A sketch or diagram showing the configuration of the premises, including a statement of total floorspace occupied by the business, shall be included. The sketch or diagram need not be professionally prepared, but it must be drawn to a designated scale or drawn with marked dimensions of the interior of the premises to an accuracy of plus or minus six inches. (12) The application shall include a current certificate and straight-line drawing prepared within 30 days prior to application by a registered land surveyor depicting the property lines and the structures containing any existing sexually oriented businesses within 1,000 feet of the property to be certified, and the property lines of any established religious institution/synagogue, school, or public park or recreation area within 1,000 feet of the property to be certified. (e) Before any application may be issued a sexually oriented business employee license, the applicant shall submit on a form to be provided by the township the following information: (1) The applicant's name or any other name (including "stage" names) or aliases used by the individual; (2) Age, date, and place of birth; (3) Height, weight, and hair and eye color; (4) Present residence address and telephone number; (5) Present business and address and telephone number; (6) Date, issuing state and number of driver's permit or other identification card information; (7) Social security number; and (8) Proof that the individual is at least 18 years of age. (f) Attached to the application form for a sexually oriented business employee license as provided in subsection (e) of this section shall be the following: (1) A color photograph of the applicant clearly showing the applicant's face. Any fees for the photograph shall be paid by the applicant. (2) A statement detailing the license history of the applicant for the five years immediately preceding the date of the filing of the application, including whether such applicant previously operated or is seeking to operate a sexually oriented business, in this or any other county, municipality, state or county, has ever had a license, permit, or authorization to do business denied, revoked, or suspended, or had any professional or vocational license or permit denied, revoked, or suspended. Northville to appoint new school board trustee

Northville Board of Education Vice President Scott Craig will step down Sept. 1 as he is moving to Southfield.

The serving members of the board will now appoint a trustee to complete the remaining 16-months on Craig's term within 30 days of the effective date of the resignation or vacancy.

The appointee will serve through Dec. 31, 2016, and may choose to run for election to the four-year term beginning in January 2017, in the next regular school board election on Nov. 8, 2016.

Northville school district residents interested in serving the 16-month term are asked to complete the Board of Education Appointment Application, which will be available at www.northvilleschools.org.

The deadline for applications is noon on Wednesday, Sept. 2. Board of Education members will interview candidates at a public meeting(s) to be scheduled between Tuesday, Sept. 8, and Tuesday, Sept. 15, with the individual expected to take his or her seat on the board on Tuesday, Sept. 29. Specific dates, times and locations for candidate interviews, which are open to the public, will be announced as soon as they are available, a district spokesperson said.

“Scott has served as an advocate for public education in his role as a board member for nearly four years,” said Northville Superintendent of Schools Mary Kay Gallagher. “We appreciate Scott's input into board decisions and the perspective he brings as an educator; and wish him well in his future endeavors.”

“We appreciate Scott's service to the children and families of Northville Public Schools, and recognize the impact he has had as a member of the board of education,” said Board President Cyndy Jankowski. “We welcome applications from Northville school district residents interested in serving on the Northville Board of Education, and look forward, as a board, to working in partnership with district leaders, school families, staff and community members to serve the educational needs of all our students.”

Elected to the Northville Board of Education in November 2011, Craig has served three terms as a trustee and 8 months as vice president. He also has been the board liaison for the Office of Instruction, the PTA Legislative Action Network, and the Wayne County Association of School Boards.

Michigan Avenue Kroger store in Wayne to close

The Kroger store on Michigan Avenue in Wayne will close at the end of the year to make way for the expansion of an adjacent business.

During a public hearing recently, Wayne Industries requested the city grant an Industrial Development District to facilitate expansion of their steel distribution center.

Established in 1989, family-owned Wayne Industries/Steel Pro is a 600,000 square-foot steel distribution center. Steel/Pro is the largest integrated steel products warehouse in the United States.

Wayne Industries owns Wayne Commons, the 4.2 acre strip center where Kroger is currently located along with another parcel of about the same size at 36121 East Michigan Ave. Wayne Industries is currently located adjacent to Wayne Commons on the west side.

According to Paul Russo, president of Wayne Industries, Kroger notified his office that the store would close at the end of the year. He said that decision coincided with this first stage of expansion of Steel/Pro which has seen an increased demand for aluminum.

Members of the Wayne City Council approved the request for the establishment of the Industrial Development District, necessary for the application for a tax abatement. Steel/Pro, Wayne Industries, is expected to request a 50 percent tax abatement on the investment in the expanded facilities.

Primary transport of the aluminum and steel parts to manufacturers and to Steel Pro is accomplished by rail through the DSX and Norfolk Southern railroads, according to a company official.

Westland awarded federal grant to hire firefighters

Inkster and Westland have each been awarded federal funding to hire firefighters in their communities.

Westland will receive \$2.3 million in federal funding to hire 13 new firefighters for 2 years. Inkster will receive \$1.8 million in SAFER (Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response) funding through the federal department of Homeland Security.

Each community will receive funding for the 2 year term, after which the city can pay the firefighters' salaries or lay the men off.

In Westland, the 13 new firefighters will bring the staff to 67, which is “where it needs to be” according to officials. A union spokesman said that there is a hiring list with candidates in the city.

“I'd like to thank both Fire Chief Michael Reddy and Lisa Nocerini, the interim Wayne City Manager and management consultant), for traveling to Washington, D.C., with me to meet with our Michigan (Congressional) delegation to stress the importance of this grant to both Westland and the surrounding cities that we help every day with mutual aid,” said Westland Mayor William Wild.

Wayne also applied for a SAFER grant to augment the 12 firefighter staff in the city. Wayne and Westland combined fire operations last year but each community funds a roster of firefighters independently. Currently, Wayne is paying overtime to firefighters to meet daily staffing requirements. Grant awards are still being announced by the Homeland Security office.

Board refuses discussion of staff ‘exit interviews’

A question regarding possible exit interviews with employees leaving the district remains unanswered by members of the Van Buren Public Schools Board of Education.

The question came from Barbara Rogalle Miller who followed the regular procedures for questions to the board toward the end of the recent meeting.

Board president Brent Mikulski answered Miller's question with an assurance that Superintendent of Schools Michael Van Tassel and the administration staff would prepare a report which would be available to the staff and to the public. Van Tassel confirmed that the survey was planned for October and would include parents and members of the administration. He characterized the survey as “exactly what is needed.”

Miller asked when the board members had approved such a survey as she had attended most recent meetings and could not recall this issue being approved. She asked if there was a cost or expense for the survey.

Mikulski said the survey was approved in emails among board members and Martha Toth, the vice president of the board, said the expense would be paid from accounts payable.

Miller, however, asked for clarification noting that she had not asked about a survey, but about exit interviews.

Miller said morale among the teaching staff is low and there is an abnormally low retention rate of staff. She said she felt exit interviews should be discussed publicly by the board members.

Board members did not reply to her request although Frazier offered a motion adding the question of exit interviews to the next meeting agenda for discussion.

“Ms. Miller represents a good portion of the 79 percent of people who do not have children in the schools,” she said, noting that these people are also voters.

“We need to address exit interviews,” Frazier said. “We need to not sweep it under the rug, but discuss it openly. Professional exit interviews can be very beneficial to the organization that uses them.”

Toth responded during some heated discussion that Frazier would not get a second to her motion to put exit interviews on the agenda.

Miller asked Toth if she was speaking for the entire board in denying support for a discussion of exit interviews as the other board members offered criticism of Frazier's attempts to put the issue on the agenda.

“It's not going to go away until we address it,” Frazier said.

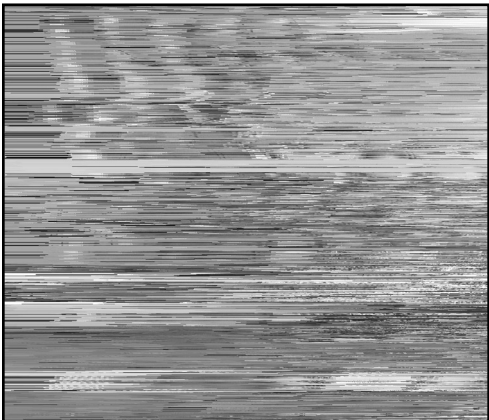
Romulus educator is named science teacher of 2015

Inkster man faces charges in death of woman in crash

David Burnham, 34, of Inkster has been charged in the death of a 37-year-old Onstead woman.

Burnham faces charges of operating while intoxicated causing death and one count of operating while intoxicated. He was arraigned on the charges on Aug. 7.

The occupants of the eastbound vehicle, 16 and 17-year-old boys from Dearborn and Burnham were transported by EMS services to a nearby hospital with non-life threatening injuries, police said.

Burnham posted a \$400 bond, or 10 percent of \$4,000, set by Magistrate Thomas Truesdell and is awaiting his preliminary examination set for Aug. 25.

mouth of the stream. The silt had migrated to the area following the installation of a new drainpipe. She said with the revised plan, the storm water would run along and near a path that is close to the pond.

She added that answers to her questions about a proposed new amphitheater in the sub-watershed area were "evasive...they said that plans (for the amphitheater) were off the table."

Price said later that there is no plan to build the amphitheater right now. "We're going to do an open space and requirement plan and find out," he said.

Local environmentalists from Friends of the Rouge have been sampling the creek that flows through Plymouth Township Park since 2003, Petrella said. The environmental group is worried about the impact of the new construction on the pristine waters in the nearby creek and pond, especially after identifying a rare species of fish called the Least Darter.

"We currently know of no other location where this sensitive darter can be found in the watershed. All darters are sensitive to changes in water quality and habitat," she said.

In an email communication addressed to the MDEQ, to the attention of Yoon, Petrella said, "Changes to the land around this stream will impact water quality. Adding 4 acres of impervious surface will increase the amount of runoff into the Rouge and lead to increased temperature, sedimentation, nutrient enrichment and other pollutants.

"In a degraded system such as the Rouge, this creek is one of the remaining good quality areas. Not mitigating for this parking lot could be the tipping point that would lead to declining water quality and the loss of

another good quality stream in the Rouge. The Rouge has so few good quality areas that remain. There are many techniques to mitigate the negative effects of impervious surfaces on creeks that could be easily incorporated. We would be happy to provide information about these techniques."

"We're working with the MDEQ and going to make some changes...We're trying to work with everybody to make them happy," Richmond said.

Felrath said that the township would work with the state regarding the problems.

"We're working to insure we're in accordance with their (MDEQ) requirements," he said. He would not comment on the impact or cost factors.

The attention of the state followed a one-day stop work order issued by Wayne County Land Resource Management Division two weeks ago. Officials from MDEQ Southeast Michigan Industrial and Storm Water unit initiated an investigation of the park waterways, demanding the township meet post-construction requirements for run-off water in work order as no soil erosion permit had been issued. The work order read, "You have been ordered to cease and desist all earth disturbing activity until such time as a SESC permit is obtained." Wayne County officials confirmed that the township allowed construction to begin in the sub-watershed area without seeking or obtaining the proper permits.

Within 48 hours, the contractor, Merlo Construction, resumed work at the parking lot, armed with an SESC permit that Price said was previously applied for but delayed because of a check the county failed to cash.

In what he described as a separate issue, Price said that concrete at the site "has to come out."

"The big middle section (of concrete) that was just poured has to come out. The ready mix company poured the wrong stuff...it's at no cost to us or Merlo, but it has to be replaced," he said.

adult due to the evidence presented by investigators. Her parents have repeatedly maintained that she suffers Post Traumatic Stress and other mental trauma due to mistreatment prior to her adoption from a Polish orphanage 10 years ago and should be charged as a juvenile.

Callahan, in sentencing Rivera, cited the law which dictates that the sentence

for conspiring to commit murder must be the same as if the act had been committed. Rivera will not be eligible for parole.

Rivera's attorney, Wright Blake, said that his client continues to maintain his innocence and that he was trying to help Sikorski. Rivera will be back in court next month charged with criminal sexual conduct for having sexual relations with a minor, charges filed when Sikorski ran away from home in July of 2014 to be with him.

Rivera showed no emotion at his sentencing, saying only, "I'm sorry for my family, for them having to go through this."

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
