Landfill odor protests continue

In a situation Northville Township Manager Chip Snider described as "a perfect storm" last year, residents crowded township hall last week seeking a solution to the odor problems from Arbor Hills Landfill.

The residents, many visibly irate, attended the meeting scheduled with representatives from the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality (MDEQ) in an effort to explain the role and responsibilities of the state department in the situation.

Residents have been complaining for several years about the odors and rancid smells emanating from the landfill located about a mile from Ridge Wood Elementary School. Residents' concerns escalated at rumored plans of an expansion at the 337-acre facility operated by Advance Disposal Services (ADS), which have been dispelled by state officials as "off the table."

The landfill has been operating since 1970, processing solid waste from Washtenaw and Wayne counties into one of the largest and tallest landfill sites in the state. According to Scott Miller, district supervisor of the MDEQ Jackson District Office, a major malfunction of the gas collection and control system resulted in the emission of intermittent strong odors in January 2016.

Northville Township Supervisor Bob Nix called the special public meeting to allow disgruntled residents to hear first-hand what remedies, if any, MDEQ is pursuing after a year of issuing violation notices and taking "enforcement action" against the Arbor Hills firm.

"Our goal is to get the information out," Nix said to the standing-room only crowd, which included supporters of Stop Arbor Hills an environmental nonprofit group formed in 2016 in response to the strong odors and expansion rumors.

Last year residents also complained about the truck traffic through residential neighborhoods hauling waste to and from the landfill citing the odor, noise and wear and tear on neighborhood streets. Township police have recently stepped-up enforcement and begun to issue traffic citations to trucks traveling "unlawfully" on the road.

20th Annual Pumpkin Festival set in Romulus

The 20th Annual Romulus Pumpkin Festival will begin tomorrow and continue throughout the weekend, Sept. 15, 16 and 17, in Romulus Historical Park.

Some of the weekend highlights include a car show on Saturday, a tractor and lawn tractor show on Sunday, great food, children's games and a lot of contests. There will be pumpkin-themed events and live musical entertainment all weekend including Fifty Amp Fuse on Friday night. Many of the activities are provided at no cost.

"This is a great opportunity for the community to come together and enjoy our downtown," said Mayor LeRoy D. Burroff. "Our Historical Park really shines during the Pumpkin Festival and we invite people from all over to have fun and take advantage of the events and festivities."

The event traditionally begins with the Romulus Rotary Club sponsored Parade of Lights when crowds line Goddard Road to view lighted vehicles including everything from bicycles to cement trucks.

This year, the Rotary parade will begin at 8 p.m. tomorrow, rain or shine. There is no entry fee or pre-registration but no entries without "an abundance" of lights will be

Victorian Heritage is celebrated in Northville

A celebration of the history of Northville begins tomorrow throughout the community.

The Northville Heritage Festival, celebrating 150 years of the community, is planned for 5-11 p.m. Friday, Sept. 15, from 11 a.m. until 11 p.m. Saturday, Sept. 16 and from 11 a.m. until 4 p.m. Sunday, Sept. 17.

This is the 29th year of the annual event, formerly the Victorian Festival, presented by the Northville Chamber of Commerce.

The Heritage Festival will begin Friday with the traditional Victorian Parade when local residents dress in authentic Victorian attire and stroll through downtown in tribute to the founders of the community. The Festival will continue with events throughout the weekend including community non-profit booths with goods and food for sale, live entertainment at several locations throughout downtown, a Kids Zone, crafters, horse and carriage rides and the always popular Heritage Festival Salon.

As part of the celebration, Northville will commemorate the 150th anniversary of the incorporation of the village. To celebrate this milestone, the city will celebrate with a

District hires new superintendent

Contract negotiations are presently under way with a California educator chosen as the next superintendent of the Wayne Westland Community Schools.

Following interviews with six candidates, the members of the board of education opted to re-interview Dr. Shelley Holt and John Albrecht, the current assistant superintendent for education services with the district. Following those interviews, board members agreed to offer the job to Holt, who has

reportedly accepted the position.

Holt is the executive director of student services for the Fontana Unified School District. She earned her doctorate in urban education and leadership from California State University Sacramento and her bachelor of arts in psychology from the University of California Berkeley. She has been in her current job for about two years.

If negotiations are successful, Holt will replace Michele

Harmata who left the district Aug. 31 to take a teaching position with Madonna University.

According to officials, Holt plans to relocate to the district alone and then have her family follow her at a later date. No start date for Holt was announced.

In the interim, the members of the school board approved a resolution naming Deputy Superintendent for Administration and Business Services Jim Larson-Shidder as the interim superintendent for the district.

Teachers' lawsuit may be settled

Superintendent of Van Buren Public Schools Pete Radlak said at a recent meeting that a lawsuit filed by four teachers has reached an "agreement in concept."

His response came to questions from Sherry Frazier, a former member of the Van Buren Public Schools Board of Education and a current trustee on the Van Buren Township Board of Trustees. She requested answers from her former school board colleagues regarding the lawsuit during a recent meeting of the board.

Frazier asked questions regarding the expense and status of the lawsuit filed against the school board by four teachers at Savage Elementary School who were accused of cheating on state-mandated tests last year.

Frazier said that she had hoped for a report on the lawsuit at the last meeting before classes resumed this year. She reminded the board members that a great deal of time and taxpayers' money had been dedicated to this issue and mentioned the involvement of Radlak who spent time listening to and reading legal depositions.

She estimated that the district has spent more than \$500,000 on the lawsuit to date.

Radlak responded noting that the teachers and the district have "an agreement in concept" and that attorneys were continuing to finalize the "paperwork." He said that he hoped the matter would come before the board again at a

meeting this month.

School Board President Keith Johnston reminded Frazier and the audience present that that discussion of a legal matter is a subject for closed-door sessions and is not for public comment. Frazier said that the funds already spent on this issue would have been better used on classroom needs rather than the lawsuit filed by the teachers in federal court June 3 last year, citing employment discrimination. The suit named the school district, all the board members at the time with the exception of Frazier, former Superintendent of Schools Michael Van Tassel, former school principal Amy Gee and district Curriculum Director Jeff Moore as defendants.

The teachers, Pamela Bradley, Michelle Kousminek, Brent Hall and Rebecca Tennis, were ordered out of their classrooms by Van Tassel and were subsequently marched out of the building in full view of their students, following an investigation by the Michigan State Board of Education and a district investigation by attorneys, which was ordered by Van Tassel.

No criminal charges were filed against the teachers.

Model Air Show takes off

The Flying Pilgrims will present a Radio Control Air Show from 10 a.m. until 5 p.m. Sept. 15 and 16 at a field on Ridge Road 1/4-mile north of Goddard Road.

There is a \$5 parking donation requested which admits all occupants of a vehicle. This is a show put on to demonstrate the Radio Controlled Airplane hobby to the general public.

The airplanes flown are classified as "Giant Scale," meaning the model must be at least 1/2 the size of the real aircraft and include both turbine jet and propeller driven models. Wingspans of more than 100 inches are common. Most of the models weigh between 15 and 50 pounds and engine power ranges from 3 to 12 horsepower.

STATE OF MICHIGAN COUNTY OF WAYNE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH RECREATIONAL VEHICLE PARKING ORDINANCE

ORDINANCE NO. 1845

AMENDMENT NO. 13

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER VII, TO CREATE ARTICLE 2, TO PROHIBIT THE PARKING OF RECREATIONAL VEHICLES ON PUBLIC STREETS, HIGHWAYS, ALLEYS, OR OTHER PUBLIC RIGHTS-OF-WAY, TO PROVIDE FOR PENALTIES FOR VIOLATIONS OF RECREATIONAL VEHICLES, TO PROVIDE FOR PENALTY TO PROHIBIT FOR REPEAL, TO PROVIDE FOR SEVERABILITY, TO PROVIDE FOR SAVINGS CLAUSE, TO PROVIDE FOR PUBLICATION, AND TO PROVIDE FOR EFFECTIVE DATE.

THE CHARTER TOWNSHIP OF PLYMOUTH ORDAINS:

Ordinance No. 1845, is hereby adopted to read as follows:

SECTION 1. AMENDMENT TO CHAPTER VII

ARTICLE 2. RECREATIONAL VEHICLE PARKING

VIB-2.00 Recreational vehicle parking prohibited.

(a) No person shall park any recreational vehicle on any public street, highway, alley or other public right-of-way for the purpose of parking or overnighting such vehicle, except that a recreational vehicle may be parked on a public street or highway for the sole purpose of loading or unloading such vehicle for a period not to exceed twenty-four (24) hours, provided that the parked recreational vehicle does not impede traffic or prospective traffic on such public street or highway.

(b) For purposes of this section, "recreational vehicle" shall include any of the following:

- (1) Buses and host trailers, which shall include flares and tabs, plus the normal equipment used to transport the same on the highway;
- (2) Folding tent trailers, which is defined as a folding structure mounted on wheels and designed for travel and vacation use;
- (3) Motorhomes, which is defined as a portable dwelling structure and constructed as an integral part of a self-propelled vehicle;
- (4) Pick-up camper, which is defined as a structure primarily to be mounted on a pick-up or truck chassis and with sufficient equipment to render it suitable for use as a temporary dwelling for travel, recreational and vacation uses;
- (5) Travel trailers, which is a vehicle, portable structure built on a chassis, designed to be used as a temporary dwelling for recreational and vacation uses, and other licensed as a trailer or permanently attached to a vehicle chassis, or a motorhome or portable dwelling, constructed to be towed on its own chassis and connected to utilities and designed without a permanent foundation for year-round living;
- (6) Utility trailers, which is a vehicle licensed as a trailer used to transport motorcycles, motorcycles, go-carts, off-road vehicles, such carts, or other recreational equipment; or
- (7) Any other vehicle which is not licensed for road use which is primarily intended for off-road recreation, motors, and/or pleasure activities.

(c) Any other vehicle which is not licensed for road use which is primarily intended for off-road recreation, motors, and/or pleasure activities.

Any recreational vehicle is parked in violation of Section VIB-2.00, the person in whose name that recreational vehicle is registered in this state on annual date at the time of the violation is prima facie responsible for that violation.

VIB-2.02 Violation and Penalty

A person who violates this section is responsible for a civil infraction. A parking violation notice changing a violation of this section may be issued by a police officer in the form and manner provided by sub MCL 257.74(2), (7) and (8).

SECTION II. PENALTY.

The penalty for violation of this Ordinance is set forth in Section I, VIB-2.02.

SECTION III. REPEAL.

All Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance, except as herein provided, are hereby repealed only to the extent necessary to give this Ordinance full force and effect.

SECTION IV. SEVERABILITY.

If any section, subsection, clause, phrase or portion of this Ordinance is for any reason held invalid or unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, such portion shall be deemed a separate, distinct and independent provision, and such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions thereof.

SECTION V. SAVINGS CLAUSE.

The repeal or amendment herein shall not abrogate or affect any rights or act committed or done, or any penalty or forfeiture incurred, or any pending litigation or prosecution of any right established or occurring prior to the effective date of this Ordinance.

SECTION VI. PUBLICATION.

The Clerk for the Charter Township of Plymouth shall cause this Ordinance to be published in the manner required by law.

SECTION VII. EFFECTIVE DATE.

This Ordinance shall take full force and effect upon publication.
