Lake Pointe Fire Station to reopen

While leaders from the Northville and Plymouth communities celebrated the cooperative effort and new intergovernmental agreement that will open the Lake Pointe Fire Station this month, station firefighters and informed sources say the move will do little in reality to improve public safety in Plymouth Township.

After receiving approval last month, fire chiefs from both townships finalized move-in plans at the station and commenced hiring to implement the joint occupancy agreement that will open the old station building located on Wilcox Road. The Plymouth Township station has been closed since 2012. It was closed by the previous administration, along with a reduction in fire department staffing of 50 percent. The moves were criticized publicly by residents and described by many as politically motivated and a retaliatory move. The Lake Pointe Fire Station serves the largest and most heavily-

populated subdivision in the township.

This new plan calls for each township to have two emergency vehicles and two firefighters on duty at the station to respond to emergencies in both communities. The firefighters will also maintain the current mutual aid protocols. In reality, firefighters from the Plymouth and Northville departments

will share the building.

Professional fire department statistics show insufficient staffing levels place the public and firefighters at risk by increasing response times and reducing firefighters' ability to rescue, fight fires and save lives.

The National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) sets national standards for fire

department public safety and staffing. In 2016 the NFPA standard on fire department deployment was revised to reflect the appropriate response staffing levels spelling out the absolute minimum requirement for each fire engine. This staffing is referred to by firefighters as a "company."

Westland man facing murder charge

A 22-year-old Westland man is facing life in prison if convicted of the murder of his 25-year-old roommate.

Wayne County Prosecutor Ryan Worthy has charged Jovica Nikolski in connection with the murder of his roommate, Spase Granzhdan.

According to police reports, Westland officers were dispatched to the Skygate Apartments in the 6500 block of Yale at about 5 p.m. Sept. 9 following a report of a possible homicide. Upon arrival, officers spoke with Nikolski, who reported the incident. Officers

then checked the apartment of the two men where they discovered the lifeless body of Granzhdan originally of Albania. As a result of the officers' investigation, Nikolski was placed under arrest at the scene.

Police said that Nikolski fled the apartment for several hours before returning to summon police to the scene. Police reports indicated that the pair argued in the early-morning hours Saturday when one of them brandished a knife. Nikolski stabbed Granzhdan and the two struggled until Nikolski secured the knife and

stabbed the victim several more times.

Nikolski was arraigned last week at the 18th District Court before Judge Sandra Cicirelli on one count of homicide-murder first degree-premeditated, and was remanded to the Wayne County Jail without bond. He is due back at the 18th District Court for a probable cause hearing today.

Police said the incident was a result of an interaction between roommates, and was not a random act. There is no current danger to the public stemming from this incident, officials said.

District plans forums on bond request

Members of the Northville Public Schools Board of Education unanimously agreed to put a \$104.85 million bond question on the Nov. 7 ballot.

The bond proposal would allow the district to upgrade school facilities, enhance existing building security, and provide modern learning environments across the school district, officials said. If approved, the \$104.85 million bond proposal would result in a zero increase in the current debt millage rate for taxpayers, they stressed.

A Bond 2017 community forum is scheduled from 6:30 until 8 p.m. Wednesday, Sept. 27 at Hillside Middle School, 775 North Center St. in Northville. The meeting will

take place in the media center. A second forum is planned for the same times on Tuesday, Oct. 3 at Meads Mill Middle School, 16700 Franklin Road in Northville.

upgrades to meet modern learning and teaching practices; improvements to address the aging infrastructure of district buildings; safety and security upgrades that build on security upgrades already in place and energy and operational initiatives to improve the environmental quality and efficiency of buildings, as well as reduce operational expenses.

Canton athletic field renovations are scheduled

Canton Sports Center, a popular sports destination for local softball/baseball leagues and national tournaments, is set to undergo a full field make-over including laser grading starting in October.

Each quad of fields will feature upgrades and the infield surface will be replaced with a higher performing clay compound called DuraEdge to improve safety and reduce dust and weather delays for players and fans. In addition, washout sideline areas will be filled in with new sod to help improve performance in foul ball areas and overall drainage on the fields. New protective netting and warm up areas will round out the improvements.

The Canton Sports Center

plans to overhaul eight of the 12 lighted ball diamonds in early October depending on weather, leaving four fields open for minimal usage through November.

The project, which was partially financed through a Wayne County Park millage, will be completed in two phases. The first phase will undertake the renovation of the first eight fields in 2017 with the remaining four fields scheduled for upgrades in fall of 2018.

This project will deliver a

superior field refresher to our premier facility, which hosts over 2,500 league and tournament teams from April-October each year," said Canton Sports Coordinator Ann-Marie Carravallano. "We draw local youth and senior players along with national elite players to Canton as their destination for baseball, softball, cricket, lacrosse and flag football. This dramatic improvement will secure our ranking as one of the best sports facilities in the

Michigan."

Michigan Ave. features a 12-diamond lighted softball/baseball operation with state-of-the-art facilities, as well as Kicker's Bar & Grill - a full-service restaurant. Shooting suspect sought

Michigan State Police are continuing the investigation into a shooting that took place at about 11:30 p.m. Sunday, Sept. 17 in Inkster.

According to police reports of the incident Michigan State Police (MSP) Second District, Special Investigation Section and troopers assigned to the Secure Cities Partnership-Inkster responded to the 28000 block of Fernwood Street after a report of a non-fatal shooting.

Troopers' preliminary investigation revealed that a 24-year-old male victim was transported by a friend to Garden

City Hospital with two gunshot wounds to his left leg. The victim stated he was outside his house when he heard gunshots and felt pain. The man told the officers that he had no idea who shot him or why. Troopers called the K9 unit to the scene in an unsuccessful attempt to locate the firearm or suspects, although several shell casings were collected.

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RESOLUTION CREATING A LOCAL DEVELOPMENT FINANCE AUTHORITY FOR THE DETROIT REGION AEROTROPOLIS DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION, DESIGNATING BOUNDARIES OF THE AUTHORITY DISTRICT AND PROVIDING FOR OTHER MATTERS

Detroit Region Aerotropolis Development Corporation
County of Wayne, State of Michigan

Minutes of a regular meeting of the Executive Committee (the "Executive Committee") of the Detroit Region Aerotropolis Development Corporation, County of Wayne, State of Michigan (the "Corporation"), held on September 12, 2017, at 3:30 p.m. prevailing Eastern Time.

PRESENT: Members Dill, Dobson, Haidous, Kandrevas, Keyes, Sutton

ABSENT: Members Sollars, Stumbo

The following preamble and resolution were offered by Member Kandrevas and supported by Member Dobson:

WHEREAS, the Corporation is authorized by the provisions of Act 281, Public Acts of Michigan, 1986, as amended ("Act 281"), to create a local development finance authority; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Act 281 the Corporation is required to hold a public hearing on the establishment of a local development finance authority and the creation of an authority district in which the local development finance authority will exercise its powers; and

WHEREAS, on July 13, 2017, 2017, the Executive Committee conducted a public hearing on the establishment of a local development finance authority and on the designation of the proposed boundaries of the authority district.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

1. **Declaration of Necessity.** The Executive Committee hereby determines that it is necessary and in the best interests of the Corporation to create a local development finance authority pursuant to Act 281 in order to eliminate causes of unemployment, underemployment and joblessness and to promote economic growth in the region.

2. **Definitions.** The terms used in this resolution shall have the same meaning as given to them in Act 281 or as hereinafter in this section provided unless the context clearly indicates to the contrary. In addition to terms defined in the preamble, as used in this resolution:

"Authority" means the Local Development Finance Authority of the Detroit Region Aerotropolis Development Corporation created by this resolution.

"Authority District" means the authority district designated by this resolution as now existing or hereafter amended, and within which the Authority shall exercise its powers.

"Board" or "Board of Directors" means the Board of Directors of the Authority, the governing body of the Authority.

"Corporation Governing Body" means the Executive Committee, or any body serving as the governing body of the Corporation pursuant to the Interlocal Agreement creating the Corporation, as the same may be hereafter amended or restated.

3. **Creation of Authority.** There is hereby created pursuant to Act 281 a local development finance authority for the Corporation. The Authority shall be a public body corporate and shall be known and exercise its powers under the title of "LOCAL DEVELOPMENT FINANCE AUTHORITY OF THE DETROIT REGION AEROTROPOLIS DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION." The Authority may adopt a seal, may sue and be sued in any court of this State and shall possess all of the powers necessary to carry out the purpose of its incorporation as provided by this resolution and Act 281. The emanation of a power in this resolution or in Act 281 shall not be construed as a limitation upon the general powers of the Authority.

4. **Termination.** Upon completion of its purposes, the Authority may be dissolved by the Corporation Governing Body. The property and assets of the Authority, after dissolution and satisfaction of its obligations, shall revert to the Corporation or shall be distributed as otherwise provided by the Corporation Governing Body.

5. **Description of Authority District.** The Authority District shall consist of the territory in the Corporation described in Exhibit A, attached hereto and made a part hereof, subject to such changes as may hereafter be made pursuant to the provisions of Act 281.

6. **Board of Directors.** The Authority shall be under the supervision and control of the Board. The members of the Corporation Governing Body shall serve as the Board. The chairperson and any other officers of the Board shall be elected by the Board. The Board shall adopt bylaws governing its procedures.

7. **Exercise of Authority.** Except as specifically otherwise provided in this resolution, the Authority shall have all powers provided by law subject to the limitations imposed by law and herein.

8. **Fiscal Year; Adoption of Budget.**

(a) The fiscal year of the Authority shall begin on January 1st and end on December 31st of each year, or such other fiscal year as may hereafter be adopted by the Board and approved by the Corporation Governing Body.

(b) The Board shall prepare annually a budget and shall submit it to the Corporation Governing Body for approval in the manner and at the time and which budget shall contain the information required of municipal departments. The Board shall not finally adopt a budget for any fiscal year until the budget has been approved by the Corporation Governing Body. The Board may, however, temporarily adopt a budget in connection with the operation of any improvements which have been financed by revenue bonds where required to do so by the resolution authorizing the revenue bonds.

(c) The Authority shall submit financial reports to the Corporation Governing Body at the same time and on the same basis as staff of the Corporation are required to submit reports. The Authority shall be audited annually by the same independent auditors auditing the Corporation and copies of the audit report shall be filed with the Corporation Governing Body. Such audit may be prepared as a standalone audit or as a section of the Corporation audit.

9. **Publication, Recording and Filing.** This resolution shall be published once after its adoption in full in the Associated Newspapers of Michigan, a newspaper of general circulation in the Detroit Region Aerotropolis Development Corporation and the Secretary shall file a certified copy of this resolution with the Michigan Secretary of State promptly after its adoption.

10. **Repeal.** All resolutions and parts of resolutions in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

11. **Effective Date.** This resolution shall take effect immediately upon its publication.

ny" or "squad," and requires they be staffed with a minimum of four on-duty members.

A landmark 2010 National Institute of Standards and Technology (NIST) study, funded by the U.S. Department of Homeland Security Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Assistance to Firefighters grant program, states the size of fire fighting crews has a substantial effect on the ability of a fire department to protect lives and property in residential fires. A basic safety requirement is that no firefighters may enter a burning building unless four firefighters are "on-scene," the so-called "two-in, two-out" rule.

Professional firefighters say the criticism of the new plan is justified when the NFPA minimum of four firefighters is frequently not met, as is the case in a 20-man department. Review shows many Plymouth emergency runs have just two or three firefighters on board ambulance rigs or fire engines, the total shift manpower requirement to keep open the respective fire stations.

"Firefighters say it's often impossible to meet that standard in Plymouth Township with a total of 21 firefighters as opposed to other neighboring departments. Northville Township, relatively the same size in population and area, has a 20-man department. Neighboring Livonia at the other end of the spectrum operates five fire stations and has 83

firefighters. Their minimum daily staffing is 21 firefighters with four firefighter paramedics at each station at any given time.

Three new Plymouth Township firefighter/paramedics were officially sworn in Sept. 11 at Plymouth Township Hall. Adam Guinn, Anthony Schoenheer and Tyler Casswell joined the department.

Even with the three new firefighters, according to Plymouth Township Fire Chief Dan Phillips, it will be necessary to close the Lake Pointe Station a minimum of 30 to 40 days in the course of one year because of insufficient manpower when vacations, time-off and sick days are factored into available staffing. The three new firefighters will bring the total shift staffing in Plymouth Township to six firefighters.

Township Trustee Jack Dempsey, who promised the re-opening of Station 2 and public safety during his campaign last year, said he was pleased to attend the swearing in ceremony Sept. 11, but still had some concerns about adequate staffing.

"Swearing in the new firefighters was a very meaningful and a powerful reminder there is still more to do to achieve the appropriate level of public safety here in the township," Dempsey said.

A ribbon-cutting ceremony and celebration is scheduled for 3 p.m. Friday, Sept. 29, at the Wilcox Road Station. The ceremony is open to the public and township officials, fire chiefs and firefighters from both townships are expected to attend.

Bug off Canton is collecting insect repellent for donation to victims of hurricanes

Canton Township is currently partnering with the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR), along with several other community groups, to collect a specific relief item in an effort to provide aid to those individuals impacted by recent hurricanes.

Canton Township will be collecting spray cans and bottles of insect repellent, which will be packed with other relief items in 5-gallon buckets, and then distributed to areas recently affected by hurricanes. Collection organizers are asking for aerosol or spray pump insect repellent cans or bottles in sizes ranging from 6 to 14 ounces. Area residents are encouraged to donate

any brand of insect repellent to the Summit on the Park by Sept. 25.

Volunteers will add these insect repellent bottles to buckets and assemble cleaning kits by adding other relief items such as liquid laundry detergent, liquid household cleaner, dish soap, cans of air freshener, scrub brushes, cleaning wipes, sponges and work gloves. These additional cleaning items are currently being collected by several organizations in surrounding communities.

Council OK's purchase of new fire truck

The purchase of a new aerial ladder truck for the Westland Fire Department was good news for Fire Chief Michael Stradner. "With the recent approval of a new 75-foot aerial ladder truck, our firefighters are better able to serve our community with aerial devices located in the north and south ends of our city," commented Stradner. "This ladder will have a greater reach and ability than the current unit it is replacing."

Members of the Westland City Council approved the purchase

of the new EONE fire truck with a 75-foot aerial ladder in the amount of \$701,800, at a meeting earlier this month. The purchase will be financed through the city Capital Improvement Fund.

The new truck will replace Engine 1 which is a 2002 ladder truck with more than 11,550 hours of service, Stradner said.

"This ladder will have a greater reach and ability than the current unit it is replacing."

The new truck offers a 2,000 gallon per minute pump and carries 500 gallons of water on board to provide for a quick fire attack as additional water supplies are being connected, officials noted. The new design allows for multiple lines to be deployed in conjunction with the use of the aerial device for fire extinguishment. The truck is also equipped with three pre-

connected attack lines for rapid deployment and fire extinguishment in addition to various sized ground ladders to access windows and roofs. The unit being replaced had limited reach and

ability and the new truck will provide greater coverage of high rise buildings, the chief explained.

"The approval of this purchase comes on the heels of the purchase of two new Emergency Medical Service vehicles," commented Mayor William R. Wild.

"The City of Westland understands the importance of providing our firefighters with the tools necessary to provide for the safety needs of the community and this new purchase is one more example of that commitment."
