City celebrates \$13.5 million road project

Officials from Wayne County, the City of Romulus and local residents celebrated the completion of a \$13.5 million road improvement project that has expanded transportation and development options in the north end of the community during a special ribbon cutting last week.

The ceremony took place Sept. 25 in the parking lot of the new Amazon Fulfillment Center at 22901 Ecorse Road on the east side of Vining Road.

The Vining/Ecorse improvement project, which started in October 2017, created a four-lane concrete boulevard extension of Vining Road from Smith Road north to Ecorse Road and

expanded Ecorse from a two-lane road to a three-lane road from Vining to Merriman Road.

Intersection upgrades were completed at Merriman and Ecorse roads and Middlebelt and Ecorse roads to enable better traffic flow.

A series of signal light upgrades and water and sewer improvements are also part of the project. Traffic signals were upgraded at the Ecorse-Middlebelt intersection, the Ecorse-Merriman intersection and the Ecorse-Wayne Road intersection. New signal installations occurred at the Ecorse-Vining installation and the entrance drive at the Amazon property.

The total cost of the project was about \$13.5 million, more than \$5.2 million for the Ecorse Road construction, more than \$7.8 million for the Vining Road construction, plus nearly \$300,000 in ancillary costs.

"The goals were to complete the last link of Vining Road to I-94 with Ecorse Road and to improve the Ecorse Road corridor across from Amazon," said Romulus Mayor LeRoy Bureff. "The improvements will have an immediate and lasting impact on our transportation needs and development options."

Economic Development Director Tim Keyes said the job saw two engineering firms work

simultaneously to get the project completed. Wade Trim designed the Vining Road portion of the work, while OHM Advisors designed the Ecorse Road portion of the project. Dan's Excavating was the contractor.

"This is an important day that marks big improvements for the Romulus community," said OHM Advisors Director of Municipal Services Kent Early during the ribbon cutting. "We're pleased to be a continued partner of the City of Romulus, and are especially proud to be part of the team delivering infrastructure

Township considers new ambulance service

Plymouth Township officials are considering the need for a more effective emergency response in the deployment of ambulances, paramedics and firefighters. It is anticipated township officials will soon consider changes in the delivery of emergency response service when 9-1-1 callers require patient transport to a hospital.

Michigan law provides that a local government unit may operate an ambulance operation or non-transport pre-hospital life support operation, or

contract with persons to furnish any of those services and receive private funds for the purpose of providing emergency medical services.

For decades Huron Valley Ambulance Co. (HVA), an Ann Arbor based non-profit licensed to operate in Washtenaw County and parts of Wayne and Oakland counties, has conducted business

inside the township without contractual agreement or performance obligation, maintaining restricted control over patient care, according to township records.

Last June, based on the recommendation of Plymouth Township Trustee Jack Dempsey, members of the board of trustees approved a resolution seeking bids for con-

tract ambulance services. Township Clerk Jerry Vorva then issued a Request for Proposal (RFP) for supplemental ambulance service to determine whether there is interest on the part of private providers to enter into a contract with Plymouth Township, beneficial to both parties. Sealed bids were opened at a public meeting on the inquiry due date, Aug. 31.

An informal arrangement with HVA based on a handshake deal crafted by former Township Supervisor Maurice Brown has been in place since

Judge's ruling leaves lone mayoral candidate

Wayne County Circuit Court Chief Judge Robert J. Colombo has again ruled against the mayoral candidacy of former City Councilman Christopher Sanders.

Currently, the only candidate on the ballot seeking the office of mayor is City Councilman John Rhaesa who was successful in having Sanders, his only challenger, removed from the ballot by Colombo during an Aug. 28 court proceeding.

In that ruling by Colombo, Sanders' candidacy was disallowed due to his "defection" of his affidavit of identity on which he handwrote "No" in response to a question regarding the payment of all past filing and election fees to the county. Sanders still owes about \$4,000 in past fees, according to county records.

Sanders then filed an emergency motion and appended

complaint Sept. 17, claiming that Rhaesa had not properly completed his required affidavit of identity by not completing specific information about his voting precinct.

An emergency court hearing on Sanders' claims took place last Tuesday during which Colombo ruled that Sanders had "no standing" in the matter and vigorously rejected his claims. Colombo additionally ruled that timelines for any such claims by Sanders had expired. Sanders' claims were based on previous rulings Colombo issued in unrelated legal challenges to a Plymouth Township candidate's legitimacy based on the same failure to complete the section

of the affidavit detailing the individual's voting precinct. In that instance, Colombo ruled that the candidate's failure to designate his voting precinct on the form invalidated the affidavit and ordered his name removed from the ballot.

In this latest hearing, Colombo rejected Sanders' argument and also awarded both legal fees and court costs to Rhaesa.

Sanders' attorney, Tarek Baydoun, indicated that he would file for a writ from the Michigan State Court of Appeals.

"The decision rendered by Judge Colombo in this matter is highly regrettable," Baydoun

said. "Judge Colombo not only abused the court's discretion in this miscarriage of justice, he doubled down. Colombo abused his position of power by prejudicially and prematurely finding that even the filing of a lawsuit against John Rhaesa, a candidate who admits his entire candidacy began with the filing of a false affidavit, was frivolous and then awarding attorney fees where no motion for attorney fees had been filed."

Baydoun said that this latest ruling of the court is a disenfranchisement of citizens who signed Sanders' nominating petitions and who support his candidacy.

Sanders said that he had no comment on the outcome other than to express his disappointment. He said he has made no decision about a write-in campaign. Candidates must file as write-ins by Oct. 26.

2 new officers join Westland department

The City of Westland welcomed two new police officers to the force last week.

Michael Bolton and Shamir Enrique Garcia-Romero were sworn in to their new positions during a ceremony at city hall.

Bolton grew up in Wayne and graduated from Wayne Memorial High School. He earned an associates degree in Criminal Justice from Schofield College and graduated from the Wayne County Regional Police Academy.

Bolton is familiar with the department as he worked as a police service aide for 1 1/2 years before accepting a position as a full-time police officer with the Wayne Police Department.

Romero was born in Puerto Rico and moved to Westland in 1995. He attended Wayne-Westland Schools: Patehin Elementary, Stevenson Middle School and John Glenn High School.

He also worked at John Glenn as a school safety officer.

Romero mentored 67 students in the Wayne-Westland Community School District Scholars Program and is an active varsity wrestling coach for the John Glenn Rockets. Romero also worked for 2 years as a Westland Police Service Aide and graduated from the Washtenaw College Police Academy where he was sponsored by the Westland Police Department through the police service aide chit's program.

"The aides are trained with the techniques that Westland officers receive and the program allows us to train and evaluate potential new officers," commented Police Chief Jeff Jedrusik. "We have hired a number of service aids as Westland Police Officers over the years and it has proven to be an effective tool to build diversity within the department."

Suspect in Northville bank robbery arrested

A 47-year-old Westland man has been arrested in connection with the armed robbery of the Chase Bank in Northville Township Sept. 13.

According to police reports, Brian Allen Littlejohn was arrested in the early morning hours of Sept. 19 in Detroit and charged with the robbery of the Chase Bank located at 42901 Seven Mile Road in Northville Township at about 9:40 a.m. on Thursday, Sept. 13.

According to police reports of the incident, the robber walked up to a teller and told her to "open your drawer; this is a robbery." The suspect implied he had a weapon, according to police. The man allegedly took the money and then fled the scene on foot, along Seven Mile Road. The incident caused a brief lockdown of school buildings in the area.

The amount of cash taken was not disclosed by authorities.

Littlejohn is currently lodged at the Wayne County Jail awaiting his next court appearance.

Littlejohn was arraigned the same day he was arrested before Judge James Plakas at the 33th

District Court on three counts including bank robbery, armed robbery and felonious assault.

Plakas set a \$5 million cash bond in the case and Littlejohn is currently lodged at the Wayne County Jail awaiting his next court appearance.

Northville Township issued a statement thanking the local, state and federal law enforcement departments who assisted in the investigation and the apprehension of Littlejohn.

Street repair bond to be topic at public meeting

Northville City officials have scheduled a second community forum regarding the street repair bond.

The public meeting is planned for 1:30 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 20 at the Northville Community Center, 333 West Main St.

Officials said multiple aspects of the bond which will be on the Nov. 6 ballot will be discussed. Voters will be asked to decide on a .96 millage for the issuance of a \$3,000,000 Street Improvement Bond to fund street repairs and upgrades in the community during the next 10 years.

During the first informational forum last month, Mayor Ken Roth presented an overview of the ballot proposal: its cost, the impact on area streets, and the strate-

gy of how repairs and replacement will be assessed and scheduled if the measure is approved by voters. Public works, engineering and finance professionals were in attendance to offer more information and answer questions.

According to officials, one of the questions most often asked about the proposal is how other communities are handling street repairs.

The answer, available on the city website, is "Canton approved a millage of 1.45 over 20 years on the townships Aug. 7 ballot. Novi passed a 1.5 millage for roads in 2012. It was enacted in 2013 and does not expire. In 2014, Royal Oak voters approved a 10-year, 2.5-mill tax increase

to upgrade local streets. In 2016, Ann Arbor renewed a street, bridge and sidewalk millage, and bridges of up to 2.125 mills for five years (2017-2021). Brighton did not pass a recent request for a 4.34 mill increase to repair and maintain

streets."

To determine the cost at individual homes if the millage is approved, residents need only multiply the taxable value, usually one-half the market value, of their property by .00096.

improvements that pave the way for the new Amazon distribution center - resulting in economic development advantages and up to 1,600 jobs in the community."

Shawn Keough, municipal services lead for Wade Trim, said: "The completion of the Vining Road Improvements represents the city's commitment to a vision for economic growth and connectivity that started when the project was conceptualized nearly 20 years ago. This new roadway and public infrastructure open up development potential and significant investment that will help the community for future generations. Wade Trim is very thankful for the opportunity to help the city's team create a safe roadway for its residents, business users and visitors."

The city has issued a 15-year bond to fund \$11.9 million of the project. The

bonds will be paid by funds pledged from the tax increment revenue capture from the existing Romulus Tax Increment Finance Authority (TIFA) and a Detroit Region Aeropolis Local Development Finance Authority (LDFA).

Other partners included Wayne County, the Michigan Economic Development Corporation and the Aeropolis. The county provided \$1.6 million for the project. The State of Michigan enabled the city to utilize the Aeropolis to create the LDFA on the Amazon project, which allows the city to capture state millage to help fund the project.

"This project shows the benefits of collaboration and partnership between local, county and state government working with the private sector," said Wayne County Executive Warren C. Evans. "Wayne County is proud to have partnered on this effort. The road improvements benefit the community while providing the infrastructure Amazon needs to be successful at the site. It's truly a win-win."

Criminal charges filed in Westland jail death

A Westland police officer and two paramedics are facing criminal charges in connection with death of a man held in police custody last December.

On Monday, Wayne County Prosecutor Kym Worthy filed charges of involuntary manslaughter against Police Sgt. Ronald Buckley 54, and Westland Paramedics Matt DiCicola, 50, and Leah Maynard, 36.

According to the prosecutor, William Marshall, 35, of Inkster was arrested at about 6:28 a.m. Dec. 10, 2017 when cocaine and marijuana were found in his possession during a traffic stop. Police reports indicate that Mr. Marshall denied he had ingested drugs and claimed white powder on his mouth was from a donut. He walked and spoke normally at the time of the arrest, according to police. He was taken to the Westland jail for booking where the inside of his mouth was swabbed for the presence of drugs. Police reports indicate that Marshall did not report any medical issues and appeared to be in good health.

At approximately 7:51 a.m., Mr. Marshall went into convulsions, experienced muscle spasms and

was unable to walk, according to police reports. Mr. Marshall and other inmates in his cell asked jail personnel for help and at that time, Buckley, the watch commander for the jail, called for EMS personnel, reports stated.

Westland Paramedics DiCicola and Maynard were dispatched to the jail and arrived at 8:01 a.m. It is alleged that Buckley and the paramedics observed Mr. Marshall on the cell floor at 8:02 a.m., at which time they saw Mr. Marshall convulsing, telling them he was having a seizure, and asking for help. He was then dragged from the cell into a hallway, according to a statement from Worthy's office. It is alleged that neither paramedic took vital signs for Mr. Marshall, or performed a medical assessment. Neither paramedic intervened in any manner as they watched Mr. Marshall on the floor, in distress, repeatedly requesting their help, according to the charges.

At 8:07 a.m., Mr. Marshall was placed back in the jail cell while convulsing, and an inmate tried to come to his aid. It is further alleged that DiCicola looked at Mr. Marshall and indicated that he and Maynard could transport

him to the hospital in case he had ingested something, but he concluded that he was not having a seizure. It is alleged that despite observing Mr. Marshall in distress, Buckley determined that Mr. Marshall should remain in jail and dismissed the paramedics at 8:10 a.m. At approximately 8:27 a.m., the report claims that Buckley observed Mr. Marshall continuing to have convulsions. Buckley failed to seek medical attention for Mr. Marshall when he left the cell area at approximately 8:30 a.m., according to the prosecutor's office.

Mr. Marshall continued to convulse after being placed back in the cell, although the force and frequency of the convulsions diminished over time. At 9:17 a.m., Mr. Marshall was motionless. At 9:27 a.m., Buckley observed Mr. Marshall not moving and he had another officer

check his pulse and drag him into the hallway where they administered CPR and used a defibrillator. At approximately 9:29 a.m., paramedics returned to the jail. At 9:41 a.m., Mr. Marshall was transported from the jail to a local hospital where he was pronounced dead. Mr. Marshall's cause of death was determined to be from cocaine toxicity.

Buckley, DiCicola and Maynard have each been charged with one count of involuntary manslaughter—failure to perform a legal duty, a felony with a 15-year maximum penalty. They have also been charged with misconduct in office, a common law felony with a 5-year maximum penalty.

"The alleged conduct of the defendants in this case shows an inexcusable and criminal disregard for human life from those who have the duty to serve, protect, and render aid to those in

need," Worthy said.

All three defendants are expected to make arrangements to turn themselves in to the Michigan State Police for arrest on the charges.

Westland Mayor William R. Wild expressed his condolences to the family of Mr. Marshall, as did Westland Fire Chief Michael Strudner and Chief of Police Jeff Jedruski.

Strudner said that Westland has been cooperating with the investigation and would continue to do so. DiCicola and Maynard are no longer employed with the Westland Fire Department.

Jedruski said that Buckley has been suspended and that the department will continue their own investigation into the matter.

"After the investigation, we will take the necessary discipline up to and including termination of the officer," Jedruski said.

Both Strudner and Jedruski reiterated their sympathy for Mr. Marshall's family and both noted that there has been additional training in both the fire and police departments.

"We are fully committed to ensure nothing like this ever happens again," Wild said.

Parents face murder charge

A Wayne couple has been charged with second-degree murder in the death of a 2-year-old child last March.

Matthew Luke and Joanne Starr, both 24, were charged and arraigned in 24th District Court Sept. 22 the murder charges.

Matthew Starr was the father of the 2-year-old victim, Devin Bissel. The child was in the care of the couple when Wayne police and EMTs were called to a home on the 2900 block of Wayne Road at 4:46 p.m. March 18. Once inside the home, emergency responders observed the lifeless body of the child who was cold to the touch, according to police and fire reports of the incident.

Prosecutors allege that his father and

stepmother caused the death of the victim by keeping him in a "pack and play" type crib with a gate on top forming a makeshift cage, according to reports from the office of the Wayne County prosecutor. Investigators allege that the child was left unattended and suffocated. Prosecutors believe the suspects moved the child from the crib, cleaned the room and then called 911. The cause of death, according to the office of the Wayne County medical examiner was asphyxiation.

The Michigan State Police assisted in the investigation of the death.

The defendants are being held without bond. A preliminary court examination on the charges is set for Oct. 9.
