Circuit Court Judge Michael Hathaway will sentence three former Romulus Police detectives Oct. 29 as part of a plea bargain in the corruption investigation which began more than three years ago. Hathaway will determine the amount of restitution the three will pay at sentencing.

The three, Richard Balzer, Richard Landry and Donald Hopkins, entered no contest or nolo contendere pleas to embezzlement charges and will lose their certification to be employed as police officers as part of a plea arrangement reached with prosecutors in the

Balzer pleaded no contest to one count of embezzlement by a public official and misconduct in office. Hopkins and Landry pleaded no contest to one count of embezzlement by a public

official. All remaining counts against the men were dismissed in return for the plea, prosecutors said.

The three defendants were among seven people charged in the investigation of corruption in the Romulus Police Department. The former police chief, his wife and five detectives were charged with embezzling more than \$100,000 in drug forfeiture funds and running a criminal enterprise from 2006-2011. Prosecutors maintained the police officers claimed to be involved in an undercover investigation at the Landing Strip Bar in Romulus and Subi's Place in Southgate. The investigations were a ruse, prosecutors said, and allowed the men to hire prostitutes from nearby strip clubs and submit false expense vouchers for which they were reimbursed from the drug funds. Prosecutors said that in one year, the men spent more than \$40,000 on prostitutes, marijuana and drugs.

Former Romulus Police Chief Michael St. Andre will be sentenced tomorrow before Hathaway following his guilty plea in May to one charge of conducting a continuing criminal enterprise, a 20-year offense, embezzlement by a public official, a 10-year offense and misconduct in office, punishable by up to five years in prison. His wife, Sandra Vlaz St. Andre, 52, is currently serving a five to seven year prison term following her conviction by a jury last January. She was found guilty of operating a criminal enterprise; conspiring to operate a criminal enterprise; filing a fraudulent tax return and receiving and concealing stolen property.

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Prosecutors said that more than \$75,000 of drug forfeiture money was used by St. Andre to buy a Westland tanning salon for his wife.

Two other officers, Larry Droege and Jeremy Channels, were found guilty on related charges after a trial that ended in March. Channels was sentenced to three years of probation; Droege received 18 months of probation.

## Plymouth priest target of embezzlement investigation

**Auxiliary Bishop Francis** Reiss confirmed last week that the Rev. Thomas Belczak, 60, has been removed as the priest at St. Kenneth Parish Catholic Church in Plymouth in response to a criminal investigation into the use of parish funds.

In a letter to parishioners, Reiss wrote that Belczak, "has been required to step aside as pastor of St. Kenneth Parish, effective October 9. This action results from a law enforcement investigation into the alleged improper use of St. Kenneth Parish funds." Belczak is the brother of the Rev. Edward Belczak, 69, who was convicted, along with his church administrator, of embezzling nearly \$700,000 from St. Thomas More Church in Troy. Those crimes took place, according to prosecutors in that case, during a

or comments on the investigation. span of eight years. There was no indication from the archdio-

cese or law enforcement officials that the St. Kenneth investigation is connected to the Troy prosecution..

Thomas Belczak has served at the 2,400-family Plymouth parish for 10 years. St. Kenneth is one of the largest Catholic parishes in Wayne County.

"I am well aware, and deeply regret, how difficult and painful a situation this is for parishioners of St. Kenneth, and especially for those close to Father Belczak. It's an unfortunate reality, but news like this can reverberate far beyond parish borders, impacting the priests and people of the archdiocese in various ways. This is a situation nobody wants to be in, though we have been led here by our obligation to do what is right," Reiss continued in the letter to parishioners.

He added that Belczak will not be permitted to be present at St. Kenneth in any capacity and will only be allowed to perform any public ministerial duties with the expressed consent of the Archdiocese of Detroit.

The Rev. Robert Blondell, a senior priest with the Detroit Archdiocese, has been named administrator of St. Kenneth, effective immediately.

Reiss said that no one from the archdiocese would offer any additional comment on the criminal investigation.

"Because of our cooperation with law enforcement authorities, we are unable to give details or comments on the investigation," he said.

Thomas Belczak ordained in 1980 and served as associate pastor in Our Lady of the Lakes in Waterford from 1980-84, St. John Neumann Parish in Canton Township from 1984-89 and at St. Valentine Parish in Redford Township from 1989 to 2004 when he was transferred to St. Kenneth in Plymouth.

# City seeks volunteers for Veterans' parade

# Grand opening set for newest Romulus park this Saturday

The newest old park in the City of Romulus is opening to the public on Saturday.

The city will host a ribbon cutting and grand opening at Oakbrook Neighborhood Park-formally Merriman Park-from noon to

"We've worked very hard at it," said Romulus Mayor Leroy Burcroff. "It's going to be a great little neighborhood park where people can come out and exercise

The park was redeveloped over the past five weeks into a combination people park and dog park under a plan that Bob Dickerson, Burcroff's chief of staff, brought to the council at the end of August. The southern half of the park, where an old baseball field was located, was fenced in and converted into a dog park with an area for large and small dogs, complete with hoops, ramps and tunnels for the dogs to jump through or climb. In the northern portion, the playscapes and swing sets were cleaned up, repainted and a pavilion was added. The park, like others in the city, had been closed for years due to budget cuts. It is now the only dog park in the area.

"It looks good," said Dickerson. "They did a good job with it."

The city did not have to use additional tax revenue to fund the plan but utilized savings from a tax settlement with Wayne County, along with a grant through the

The city has been working diligently to re-open parks throughout the year, with Elmer Johnson and Eugenio Fernandez Park brought back earlier this summer. The city also entered into an agreement with the Romulus school district to lease Mt. Pleasant Park, which is attached to Mt. Pleasant Elementary School, for \$1.

"The city needs to do more of this kind of thing," said Dickerson. "We have to find creative ways of doing things because the budget is still tight."

Because it is funded through Wayne County grants, the dog park is open to anyone, not just Romulus residents.

The grand opening ceremony will feature face painting, games for children, free hot dogs, dog competitions and pictures with the Romulus police and K-9 officers.


"It'll be a fun event," said Burcroff. "We hope the community comes out."

# Golf course wins honor as Audubon sanctuary

Fellows Creek Golf Course has achieved designation as a Certified Audubon Cooperative Sanctuary through the Audubon Cooperative Sanctuary Program for Golf Courses. Jason McIntyre, Fellows Creek Golf Course superintendent, led the effort to obtain sanctuary designation on the property is being recognized for Environmental Stewardship by Audubon International.

"Fellows Creek Golf Course has shown a strong commitment to its environmental program. They are to be commended for their efforts to provide a sanctuary for wildlife on the golf course property," said Doug Bechtel, executive director at Audubon International. "Fellows Creek Golf Course is one of 12 golf courses in Michigan and 911 in the world to be designated as an Audubon Cooperative Sanctuary."

This certification is presented by the Audubon Cooperative Sanctuary System (ACSS), the educational division of Audubon International.

"To reach certification, a course must demonstrate that they are maintaining a high degree of environmental quality in a number of areas," explained Bechtel. These categories include: Environmental Planning, Wildlife and Habitat Management, Outreach and Education, Chemical Use Reduction and Safety, Water Conservation and Water Quality Management.

The Audubon Cooperative Sanctuary Program for Golf Courses, endorsed by the United States Golf Association, provides information and guidance to help golf courses preserve and enhance wildlife habitat and protect natural resources. Golf courses from the United States, Africa, Australia, Canada, Central America, Europe, New Zealand, and Southeast Asia have achieved certification in the program.

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



# Council hires new interim city manager

David Murphy has been hired as the interim city manager in Wayne.

Last week, members of the Wayne City Council voted unanimously to offer the job, which could last for as long as six months, to Murphy, a former city manager in South Lyon.

Murphy's contract was terminated by the South Lyon City Council Oct. 28, 2013 and he received six months full pay and benefits as part of that severance package, according to minutes of the South Lyon City Council meeting. Murphy and candidate David Mackie, the current deputy mayor in Taylor, were interviewed for the job earlier this month.

"I feel we had two good candidates. I thought David Mackie showed great qualities," said Councilman David James. "The budget he manages (in Taylor) is three times what we have here. He's currently in Wayne County. He knows what we need."

Councilwoman Susan Rowe agreed that both Mackie and Murphy were strong candidates but she felt Murphy was more suited to the needs of Wayne.

"He has prepared several city budgets. Mr. Mackie is well qualified but said he has never prepared a budget," said Rowe. "Mr. Murphy can step right in after he passes his background check."

Since the abrupt resignation of former City Manager Joseph Merucci last month, Police Chief Jason Wright has been acting as city manager. That arrangement

will end with the Oct. 17 retirement of Wright, a 21-year veteran of the department. Since July, all but one Wayne department head has retired or resigned leaving only Matt Miller, the city clerk/building department head in place. Long-time Mayor Al Haidous will leave office in January to become the 11th Wavne District County

Commissioner:

Wayne officials continue to struggle with a \$500,000 budget deficit and a deficit of about \$1.5 million is predicted for the next budget cycle.

Murphy told the council members during the job interview that he would be able to provide recommendations regarding the budget problems after a month on the job. He worked in South Lyon for more than five years and also worked in Almont, Caro and Brighton along with interim positions in Franklin and **Huntington Woods.**





# Citizens criticize award of construction contract

New details regarding the Plymouth Township Park pavilion were revealed at the meeting of the township board of trustees last week following the award of the construction contract. Quotations for the initial advertised sealed-bid inquiry were due July 14 and were opened publicly on that date in Township Hall.

The original bid specifications information and accompanying project manual, prepared by Township Clerk Nancy Conzelman, called for a baseproject bid and an alternate construction-management bid that would allow the township to purchase certain materials directly for installation by subcontractors.

Construction of the pavilion at Plymouth Township Park will begin this fall after approval of the construction bid to Acme Enterprise Inc. of Roseville, the second-lowest bidder, by a 5-2 vote. The two dissenting trustees, Bob Doroshewitz and Chuck Curmi, and several members of the audience questioned the procedures and accounting utilized in the bidding process.

Township Supervisor Reaume and Treasurer Ron Edwards have argued strongly for approval on both the pavilion and amphitheater projects since they introduced their first plans to build a basic-structure pavilion, estimated to cost about \$85,000. The amphitheater initially was not discussed or advertised.

"Recreation amenities enhance our community's livability," said Reaume, in his fall letter to the community. The 12page, four-color publication highlights a new \$350,000 amphitheater and all-season pavilion warming station that Doroshewitz said may cost nearly \$700,000 when complete.

Township board meeting have attracted hundreds of residents during the past months calling for greater accountability and public input into the use of township funds, prompted by

the plans for the amphitheater and pavilion. Many have cited public safety as a priority and suggested trustees concentrate funding in the understaffed fire department which currently does not have a ladder truck and where the 20-year-old fire engines and equipment suffer constant breakdowns.

At the board meeting last week, township resident and activist Chris Hunter criticized the board and what Curmi described as "value engineering" which occurred between members of the board and Acme representatives after the bids were submitted and opened.

"It seems to me we are rewarding someone for poor behavior," Hunter said. The first bid from Acme was \$547,303 and after conversations regarding costs with township officials took place, Acme lowered the cost to \$492,573, a savings of \$54,550.

Hunter told the board that he was in favor of "value engineering" but that it should take place "before the bids were finalized,

"It seems to me we are rewarding a company that gave us a high bid for an inefficient building. Now they claim the new bid includes better, more efficient materials that will better withstand the weather," Hunter said. He asked why those materials at the lower cost were not in the original bid.

Doroshewitz said he estimated the true cost of the project was going to be \$677,000 despite the assurances from Reaume and Edwards that the bids were complete.

Included in the project are construction costs of \$492,753; \$150,000 for utility lines to the new building; \$24,500 for architectural fees and another \$10,000 for furnishings. It's unclear how the pavilion specifications and purchase instructions were changed from the initial inquiry without revising the engineering drawings or involving the architect-designer firm D.S. Wright. No further details emerged about Conzelman's alternate construction-management bid requirement.

The pavilion, as planned, will be a 4,500 square foot structure near the baseball fields in the park, at the top of the sledding hill. It will include restrooms, a warming center and a kitchen area with a sink and refrigera-

Doroshewitz questioned a reference in building plans to a water connection for a snowmaking machine.


