## Domestic abuse ordinance OK'd in Canton

*The newly-adopted ordinance is an effort to bring swifter justice for victims according to township officials.*

Misdemeanor domestic abuse cases which occur in Canton Township will now be prosecuted in the 35th District Court rather than by Wayne County.

The second reading of a local ordinance changing the jurisdiction for some cases was approved by a vote of the Canton Township Board of Trustees last week, over the objections of Wayne County Prosecutor Kim Worthy. Worthy, who attended the board meeting, told the trustees that the claim by local law enforcement that her office had lost or failed to respond to 40 warrant requests in domestic abuse cases was "wholly incorrect."

"We have documentation for each and every warrant that was ever sent us by the Canton Public Safety Department," she said. "We stand by our statistics," Canton Public Safety Director

Todd Mutchler said.

The vote of the board of trustees to assign some domestic abuse cases to local prosecutor Greg Demopoulos was unanimous after a motion by Tom Yack to table the question for more discussion was withdrawn.

Worthy insisted her office has never lost or ignored warrant requests from the township. She said that some information sent to her office from Canton police was being faxed to an incorrect domestic violence unit. She added that her office has accounted for every case when 35th District Court was missing and recited a

detailed report of those cases during the meeting, saying that each case was prosecuted, dismissed or is still pending.

She said her office has had difficulty in obtaining information on the cases Canton police said were missing. Mutchler responded that his department has experienced similar difficulties in obtaining information from Worthy's office.

The newly-adopted ordinance is an effort to bring swifter justice for victims according to township officials. Discussion of the new ordinance began more than a year ago when 35th District Court Chief Judge James Plakas

expressed his concerns about the number of domestic violence cases being dismissed at the pretrial stage, according to Kristin Kolb, corporation counsel for the township.

Kolb told the board members that the new ordinance had been "in the works" for more than a year.

"And never a phone call to me," Worthy responded. She went on to note that the prosecution of such cases is difficult, at best, because victims are often reluctant to cooperate and that the attorneys in her office have special training in the handling of these cases. She also said that Canton was exposing the municipality to risks of lawsuits in the handling of these cases.

She said her office would be watching the prosecution of these cases at the local level. "We have our radar on Canton now," she said.

## Worth his weight in gold — medals

### Local lifter brings home medals from World Special Olympic games

Ben Bednarsz, a local power lifting athlete who recently competed in the 2015 Special Olympics World Games, was honored by the Canton Board of Trustees at their October 13, board meeting. Canton celebrated the accomplishments of Bednarsz, a Canton resident, with an official Canton Township Resolution acknowledging his participation and achievements in the 2015 Special Olympics World Games and 2014 USA Special Olympics Games.

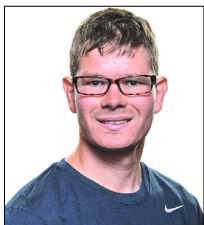
Most recently Bednarsz won one gold and three silver medals at the Special Olympics World Games California in July, which was the first time Bednarsz competed in the Special Olympics World Games. In the USA Games, Bednarsz was awarded the gold medal in the bench press, and silver medals in both the squat and deadlift. His combined weight lifted in all three events also earned him an overall silver medal at the World Games.

As a member of Team Michigan, he previously won four gold medals in powerlifting during the 2014 USA

Games in New Jersey. Bednarsz has been a member of Michigan Area 23's Power Lifting Team for more than 10 years. He has also participated in softball and cycling events for almost as long, which keeps him very busy all year round.

"We are pleased to honor this local athlete for his outstanding Special Olympics achievements and dedication to his sport," said Phil LaJoy, Canton Township supervisor. "To be a hard-working athlete who qualifies for and competes in an arena with over 6,500 international champions from 165 countries is quite an accomplishment and truly inspirational. We, as a community, could not be more proud to have him call Canton home."

Bednarsz, who has been working at a Canton grocery store since January as a Courtesy Clerk, is a long-time Detroit sports fan who makes fast friends wherever he goes. Bednarsz enjoys being a member of Michigan Area 23's Power Lifting Team, where he is able to obtain year-round sports training while meeting new people, making friends,

traveling and participating in social events with other Special Olympics athletes and volunteers, he said.

of the official board resolution, a special reception was sponsored by the Canton Leisure Services Therapeutic Recreation (TR) Program.

## Canton to spend \$11.6 million for water tower

*Officials estimate that the new facility could save the township as much as \$3.4 million annually in water costs.*

Members of the Canton Township Board of Trustees voted unanimously last week to spend \$11.6 million to build a water storage tank and pump station to help curb rising water rates in the community.

Officials said that the new plan is an effort to mitigate future increases in escalating water rates which currently cost average homeowners more than \$500 every three months. Officials estimate that the new facility could save the township as much as \$3.4 million annually in water costs.

OHM Advisors, the firm

hired to perform an engineering study for the proposed ground-level facility, said there is a possibility the tank and station could be operational in 2017.

The new facility will be located southeast of Joy and Morton Taylor roads and access an adjacent Detroit Water and

Sewerage reservoir. The storage tank will fill with water from the Detroit system during low-usage time periods, store the water and then release it to Canton customers on demand.

The ability to avoid the use of Detroit water during peak hours results in lower rates to the township, officials said.

The project will be funded using \$8 million of unspent bond money the board approved in 2007 for water and sewer improvements and the remaining \$3.6 million will be paid from the \$19 million water sewer fund in the township, according to Finance and Budget Director Wendy Trumbull. There will be no increase in taxes in the township to fund the project, officials stressed.

The operation of the new facility will cost an anticipated \$131,000 annually, including some maintenance.

## City hires consultant as new city manager

Wayne has a new city manager, again.

A formal, one-year contract was approved by members of the Wayne City Council with Lisa Nocerini, of Nocerini Strategy Group, earlier this month. Under terms of the contract, Nocerini will receive \$10,000 a month with no health care, no retirement and no paid time off. She will work as an outside consultant rather than an employee and therefore receive no employee

benefits.

Nocerini had been working as the interim city manager while a search for a replacement for David Murphy, who resigned to take a position in Farmington Hills, was sought. Murphy was the fourth city manager in Wayne since the resignation of Robert English in 2013. Former City Engineer Ramzi El-Gharab served as the interim manager prior to the hiring of Joseph Merucci. When Merucci abruptly

resigned in September of 2014, Police Chief Jason Wright was named as the interim manager. Murphy was hired as the interim manager in October of 2014 and accepted the job on a permanent basis in February. He resigned in May.

Nocerini's firm was under contract with the city at the time to help with grant writing and as a consultant. Council members asked her to assume the interim city manager job while a formal

search continued, but were not satisfied with the candidates who applied for the position. Nocerini accepted the job, through her firm, and agreed to the contract terms last week.

The contract with Murphy exceeded the fee negotiated with Nocerini. He was paid a base salary of \$108,000 and a benefit package of \$40-\$50,000. Her \$120,000 is a flat annual fee, but will allow her to work on other projects for her company includ-

ing grant writing and communications for some other municipalities. She has agreed not to work on political campaigns in the area.

Her contract was approved by a unanimous vote of the council members.

Nocerini earned her Bachelor of Science degree at Northern Michigan University and is a native of the Upper Peninsula, where her family still resides.

Smiley said that the increased need in the community has prompted an early start on sales.

"Last year, we were able to help 200 children in 32 families," he said. "We do a lot more than just Christmas toys and groceries for the families, too," he said. "We try to do about two weeks of food for them."

Smiley said that the help from Meijer and Kroger is phenomenal and an integral part of the effort. The Saturday before the Christmas holiday, the families are invited to the Inkster Community Center to pick up the groceries and toys.

"We try to do fresh produce, dairy items and toiletries along with the other, traditional groceries, for the families," he said.

Families are chosen for the program

from recommendations by officials in the Romulus and Westland school districts and referrals from the 22nd District Court.

"Last year we had a single mother with nine children and another single mom with seven children," Smiley said. "These are people who really need our help."

The effort is funded completely by fundraisers, including a golf outing and a fundraising effort at a local restaurant, along with the raffle. Smiley, who oper-

ates the Inkster Legends Basketball Camps said, "The camps are in their 18th year and continue to be completely free to youths 9-16."

Smiley, a former All American Basketball star from Northwood University, was among the founders of the basketball camps designed to teach basic sportsmanship and mentor children.

## Plans for repairs to ice arena are revealed

The ice has officially been broken on the plans for improvements at the Mike Modano Ice Arena in Westland.

Representative from the Westland Hockey and Figure Skating associations, dignitaries and members of Mayor William R. Wild's administration gathered at center ice for a special Tuesday event to mark the beginning of the

planned improvements which include: a four-locker room addition for men and women with separate showers and bathrooms for men and women, something currently shared; an activity room for community gatherings, parties etc.; the re-purposing of the existing locker rooms into additional female locker rooms; a referee locker room and a storage room

for a second Zamboni and improvements to the lobby restrooms.

The project, estimated at approximately \$1 million, will be bid and completed during the next 4-6 months and will not disrupt activities within the arena, officials said. Funding for the project will come from the capital improvement fund of the city and



several years of fundraising efforts including notable donations from The Mike Modano Foundation. The project is part of the approved 2015/2016 budget.

"This much-needed improvement will finalize the moderniza-

tion of the Mike Modano Ice Arena and will play an integral part in building our hockey and figure skating programs," commented Wild.

The Mike Modano Ice Arena is located at 6210 Wildwood.

## County to spend \$2.5 million on Cherry Hill

Drivers traveling down Cherry Hill Road in Westland and Garden City will soon see \$2.5 million in improvements to the section between Merriman and Wayne roads.

Wayne County Executive Warren C. Evans and Commissioner Richard LeBlanc announced last week Cherry Hill will be resurfaced as part of a \$2.5 million project that will include structural adjustments to manholes, ADA

sidewalk ramp repair, permanent lane line markings and signage upgrades and replacement.

"The resurfacing and other improvements made to this stretch of Cherry Hill Road will help local businesses thrive, and make it easier for residents to move about their neighborhood," said Evans.

"Projects like this serve as an example of how collaboration, and building

strong relationships with local communities, can lead to a more vibrant Wayne County."

Cherry Hill is one of the most traveled corridors between Westland and Garden City, officials said.

The resurfacing of the 10 1/2 lane miles of Cherry Hill Road is scheduled to begin in spring 2016 and be complete by mid-November 2016.

"I would like to thank CEO Evans,

Commissioner LeBlanc and the entire Wayne County Team for their leadership in addressing what is, by far, Westland's largest road issue and I'm certain Wayne County drivers will appreciate it as well," said Westland Mayor William Wild.

"Without their help and commitment to improving Wayne County's roadways, this project would not have been possible."

## Library renovations move into final chapter

The Plymouth District Library main project will move into the final stage of construction during the next few months.

Barrier-free access to the library will change temporarily as the limestone caps around the ramp and porch are replaced, explained Susan Stoney, community relations specialist at the downtown Plymouth facility. The handicap ramp is scheduled to close for two weeks starting today, Oct. 22 and barrier free

access will be available through the staff entry door, behind the fire station and city hall.

Handicap parking will be relocated to marked spaces behind the fire station, Stoney said, and this entry was heavily used in the summer months when the ramp was unavailable for use.

"Library staff and volunteers will be posted at the barrier-free entry to assist library users coming into the building. The steps

to the main parking lot entrance will remain open during this phase of the construction," she said in a prepared release.

Within a week of the ramp construction work, work will begin on the vestibule of the library parking lot entrance and the front entrance will remain open. Work will take place each night after the library is closed and an air curtain will be installed just inside the front doors to battle the extreme tem-

peratures of winter and summer. This curtain will keep the cold air out of the library in the winter and the hot air out in the summer, resulting in energy savings for the library.

The floor of the vestibule will be replaced and a decorative tile wall will be installed at the entryway which is expected to be complete in late December.

The projects will be paid for using the library building reserve account, Stoney said, and

no added taxes will be used or needed for the projects.

She said project updates will be available on the main level Building Repair display, the Building Repair Project blog, found on the library website [plymouthlibrary.org](http://plymouthlibrary.org) and on the library Facebook page [www.facebook.com/plymouthlibrary](http://www.facebook.com/plymouthlibrary).

## Body found on school playground

Plymouth police are awaiting results of an autopsy by the Wayne County Medical Examiner to determine the cause of death of a man found outside Smith Elementary School Monday morning. The school is located on McKinley Street.

Police said that preliminary findings do not indicate foul play in the death of the man, a Plymouth resident in his 40s. The body was discovered on the playground by a school employee at about 8:20 a.m., about 35 minutes before classes were scheduled to begin at the school. The employee immediately called police and responding officers and EMTs used emergency blankets to screen the body from arriving students and parents.

School officials had the students wait inside as they arrived and guided both children and parents away from any view of the body.

Only the yellow caution tape was visible to those arriving at the school, officials said. Police immediately determined there was no danger to the public. The body was removed in time for the children to participate in an outdoor recess and return to a normal day, they added. Police left the scene at about 10 a.m.

Parents were notified of the incident at the school through a mass email and robo-calls.

Police had not released the name of the deceased at press time.

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
