Plante Moran auditor Joe Heffernan told the board members he suspected the Rederal authorities might have already stopped revenue sharing with the township because of six unresolved DOJ items total-ing \$83,297.67.

In response to Heffernan's announce-ent, members of the township board nanimously approved a resolution to transfer \$83,397.67, an amount that Edwards claimed was sitting in the
