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Ousted officials' conduct threatens funds

Tidewatering said he felt compelled to report Edwards and the other officials to the Office of the Inspector General, "because the funds were being spent inappropriately."

Missing funds, incomplete reports, inaccurate and faulty records and a failure of generally accepted accounting practices have prompted both the state and federal government to take punitive and costly action against Plymouth Township.

State treasury officials are still waiting for the 2015 Plymouth Township General Audit due last June and have withheld the August and October payments to the township totaling \$34,285 due to the failure of the municipality to submit the required report.

Officials from the federal Drug Forfeiture Funding program recently informed Police Chief Tom Tidewatering that the

office had "no choice but to extinguish" Plymouth Township from that program due to the failure of the municipality to provide sufficient records and financial documents from the office of the clerk and treasurer. That action could cost the township nearly \$1 million in pending and future funding, according to township auditors.

Those federal funds were the subject of an August 2015 12-day audit by the Department of Justice which determined multi-

ple failures and non-compliance by 20-year Treasurer Ron Edwards, who was recently ousted by voters. The auditors required Edwards to supply specific information regarding the use of \$1.9 million in revenue received by the township police department between Jan. 1, 2010 and Sept. 30, 2014.

Multiple problems were cited by the federal auditors including the failure of funding to be deposited in correct accounts and unreconciled bank state-

ments. According to Tidewatering, the auditors found that the federal funds were being used to pay for township expenses not related to law enforcement activities, including the Fourth of July picnic in the township.

Edwards and former Supervisor Shannon Price, also recently defeated for re-election, signed a settlement agreement with federal authorities agreeing to correct multiple accounting and use errors. Those steps and the necessary accounting for the drug forfeiture funds have not been completed or submitted, according to a spokesman from the federal department.

The multiple problems,

Northville Public Safety Director to retire

Northville Township Public Safety Director John Werth will retire next month after a 32-year career in public safety.

Werth, 54, was hired by the Northville Township Police Department as a patrol officer in 1985 after his graduation from Jackson Community College Police Academy. Werth followed in the footsteps of his father who served as a police officer in Detroit.

Werth was promoted to the rank of sergeant in 1996, road patrol supervisor in 1996, and was named police chief in 2001.

During his career in the department, Werth held various assignments working in conjunction with the Michigan State Police-Western Wayne

Narcotics and Auto Theft units.

In 2007 Werth assumed the responsibility for supervisor of both the police and fire departments when he was named Northville Township Director of Public Safety.

Werth holds a masters degree in Interdisciplinary Technology from Eastern Michigan University and a bachelors degree in Policy Studies-Criminal Justice from Syracuse University where he attended on an athletic football scholarship.

Werth is past president of the Southeast Chiefs of Police Association, the Wayne County Chiefs of Police Association as well as a member of the board of directors of the Michigan Association of Chiefs of Police. He also served as chair of the MMRM Law Enforcement Advisory Board.

"I have no regrets," Werth said last week. Deputy Director of Police Todd Mutchler, will replace him as director of public safety in the township.

"I just don't know if I'd enter the same profession again if I had to do it all over again. Considering the recent events taking place around the country that have caused unprecedented scrutiny of the police profession and how we conduct business, I just don't know," he said.

Werth said he might be interested in becoming involved in the law enforcement accreditation program sometime in the future, but for now he said he is going to spend some time relaxing with his wife, Nancy, two daughters, Morgan and Jessica, in Plymouth Township where he's been a resident since 2001. He also said he will spend more time with his brother.

Teachers aide enters plea in sex charge

The 41-year-old woman accused of having sexual relations with two 15-year-old students at the Plymouth middle school where she was a teachers aide has entered a no contest plea to the criminal charges.

Wayne County Circuit Court Judge Gregory Bill is scheduled to sentence Bridgett Diane Caplin

in January on the charges. The judge allowed her no contest plea to charges of distributing obscene material to children and using a computer to commit a crime. She faces up to four years in prison or a minimum sentence of probation.

The most serious charge leveled against Caplin, who was

fired from her job at East Middle School following the police investigation, was dropped by prosecutors when the 15-year-old victim refused to testify against her. That charge, third-degree criminal sexual conduct involving a person 13-15 years of age, carried a possible 15-year prison sentence upon conviction.

The investigation into the sexual misconduct began last May, according to police reports, when an anonymous report was received through a tip line. Police obtained warrants for searches of online data and determined that the incidents did take place, one in a church parking lot. Caplin is reportedly

the mother of friends of one of the victims and in addition to the online tip, police allegedly received information from one of the victim's fathers who found obscene photos of Caplin on his son's phone.

No sentencing date had been announced by the court at press time.

Inkster man is youngest state representative

Jewell Jones, a student at the University of Michigan-Dearborn, made political history for a second time Nov. 8 when he was overwhelmingly elected to serve as the State Representative from the 11th District.

Jones was the youngest person to serve on the Inkster City Council when last year at age 20 he was sworn in as the councilman from District 4. During the Nov. 8 election, he defeated Republican challenger Robert

Pope for the seat when he garnered 66 percent of the vote. Jones received 22,574 votes to the 11,563 cast for Pope.

Jones, a lifelong Inkster resident, is a full-time student with a double major in political science and finance.

"You and I made history, once again," Jones wrote to his supporters on Nov. 9 in an Instagram post. "I'm looking forward to serving you all in a greater capacity."

The 11th State House District covers part of the city of Dearborn Heights, Garden City, Inkster, part of Livonia and part of Westland.

Jones said he began dabbling in local politics when he was about 8 years old.

"My parents would drag me around to different things in the community. I was very involved in my church," Jones said.

"Serving the people in this capacity has always been pretty

natural for me."

In the past few years, he has been even more active and helped out on political campaigns for Michigan State Sen. David Knepper (D) and former Inkster Mayor Hilliard Hampton.

Jones is involved with several on-campus organizations at U of M - including the Army ROTC, Black Student Union and Student Veterans Association.

Jones plans to graduate in the spring of 2017.

Including the missing funds, came to light last week when auditors from Plante Moran were invited to the board of trustees meeting by Price to address the status of both the Department of Justice (DOJ) and state general audit. Plante Moran auditor Joe Heffernan told the board members he suspected the federal authorities might have already stopped revenue sharing with the township because of six unresolved DOJ items totaling \$883,397.67.

In response to Heffernan's announcement, members of the township board unanimously approved a resolution to transfer \$883,397.67, an amount that Edwards claimed was sitting in the General Fund, to the drug forfeiture fund.

The trustees refused, however, to send a letter prepared by defeated Township Clerk Nancy Conzelman to the DOJ alleging the township had corrected the deficiencies and was now in compliance with the accounting regulations for drug forfeiture funds. Conzelman was insistent the board members review the letter which directly contradicted reports from the DOJ regarding the current status of the township reporting and accounting procedures.

Listed as presenters of the letter were

Heffernan and Cindy Kushner, "Plymouth Township Director of Accounting and Financial Reporting."

Kushner was not present at the meeting. Heffernan, however, said he was unwilling to endorse the prepared letter to the DOJ noting that there were still missing items such as bank statements and general ledger records relating to the drug forfeiture funds. Heffernan commented, "I don't feel comfortable until I see the big picture-bank statements, general ledger."

"I'm not suggesting what you should or should not do-thats up to your judgment. I'm not here to tell you which way to deal with this thing."

Board members rejected sending the letter by a 4-2 vote with only Conzelman and Edwards supporting the motion.

Tidderington said that the problem is not only with the federal funds. He said that \$140,000 in state forfeiture funds were missing and unaccounted for. He said the checks were delivered to Edwards' office and that two state checks totaling \$72,000 were delivered to Edwards by Price but never accounted for by the office of the clerk, who keeps the banking records. He said Edwards' practice of having bank statements sent to an off-site post office box was also of concern.

Tidderington said he felt compelled to report Edwards and the other officials to the Office of the Inspector General, "because the funds were being spent inap-

propriately." At that time, Conzelman publicly claimed that she had called in the DOJ for "help" in the matter, and described the audit-investigation as "training," a statement now denied by a federal official.

"There was \$100,000 missing for over four years from the drug forfeiture account," Tidderington said.

The police chief said he thought the auditors from Plante Moran were requested to appear at the meeting last Tuesday after he notified Price that the sharing of more than \$5 million in seized assets would be lost.

Tidderington said he's tried to bridge the stalemate between township officials and the DOJ, noting the threat of having the police department drug forfeiture funding cut would punish the police department, an entity he sought to protect by calling for

the federal audit.

"I called the DOJ and said if they wanted to extinguish us from the program for non-compliance it would be the police department who's getting punished." He said he asked DOJ investigator for cooperation and reached an agreement to allow the township until Nov. 28 to comply.

Tidderington said the transfer of the funding last week by the board could allow Plymouth to remain in the program.

"The mishandling of these funds, as well as the missing state forfeiture funds, has precluded the police department from accessing these funds to purchase much-needed equipment such as bullet-proof vests and police vehicles," he said.

Tidderington said that he intends to provide the new board, sworn into office this week, with a comprehensive report as well as the investigative file.

Half of Romulus voters cast ballots Nov. 8

More than half of Romulus voters turned out to cast their ballots on Election Day to choose officials at the local, state and federal level.

Romulus City Clerk Ellen Craig Bragg said 11,121 people voted last Tuesday, or about 57 percent of registered voters.

"Everyone came together to help us out," she said. "It was a very busy time."

Boasted by more than 5,500 straight party ticket voters, Hillary Clinton easily won in the city with about 7,500 votes, good for about 68 percent of votes cast at that race. Romulus voters also helped turn John Conyers (7,272 votes) and Erika Geles (7,920) to office.

In the school board, Danielle Punderberg (4,849) retained her seat

while Robert McLaughlin (4,067) and Debi Pyles (3,999) won seats.

"I am humbled to have won the support of Romulus, Inkster, and Westland voters to rejoin the Romulus Board of Education," McLaughlin posted on Facebook. "In the coming weeks and months, you will see the ideas that I have for strengthening the position of our district, both financially and from a curricu-

lar point of view. There will need to be some courageous, challenging discussions as we move forward, and I'm ready to do my part."

Craig Bragg said the heavy voter turnout particularly in precincts that normally see a lot of voter activity led to some

long lines. In traditionally busy precincts, some voters had to wait more than an hour to cast their ballots. She said hoped to correct that issue in the future.

"We are aware of some of those concerns that voters had and we don't take it lightly for those wait times. We are reassessing what went right, what went wrong, what didn't work," she said during a regular meeting of the Romulus City Council members last week.

"We were working on correcting that so, going forward, every voter will have a positive experience," she said.

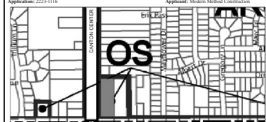

Wayne OK's 2nd marijuana dispensary plan

Wayne City Council members recently approved the site plan for a second medical marijuana dispensary in the community.

The proposed dispensary will be located in an existing vacant home which will be moved to a new foundation on a vacant lot on Van Born Road. The site is close to the area where paving on Van Born Road ends and the surface becomes gravel.

The 1,274-square-foot home

will be renovated to become handicapped accessible, according to the site plans.

According to Wayne City Clerk/Planner Matthew Miller, the marijuana dispensary is a permitted use in the city. Such businesses are not allowed to be within 1,000 feet of a school, day care, church or any residence according to Wayne city ordinances. The site plan was presented to the members of the city council for approval was within all

The site plan was presented by Scott Gogaj of U.S. 12 Bar on Michigan Avenue.

Miller told the city council members that the city would probably not have more than three medical marijuana dispensaries within the borders

because of the added restriction requiring them to be more than 1,000 feet from one another. There is already one dispensary located near the UAW Local 900 Hall.

Additional city permits from the city will be required for construction and utility permits at the site as construction continues, including police monitoring of the dispensary once operational, Miller told the council members.

Westland seeks recreation board applicants

Computer education contract OK'd at Barns center

Members of the Westland City Council have approved a \$38,000 contract with Quadrant 2 Education (Q2E) for the continued management of the Jefferson Barns Community Vitality Center Learning Center. Funding for this partnership is provided by a Michigan State Police JAG Grant.

Quadrant 2 Education provides programming and teachers for the Learning Center at the Norwayque facility. During the first year of the program, more than 100 students, ages 9-18 attended computer sciences-related activities taught by Quadrant 2. Classes began with computer coding and have advanced to

using devices such as robots, drones and white boards. Students are creating games and websites.

"Having Quadrant 2 as a managing partner has been enriching for many students who have utilized the learning center," commented Westland Mayor William Wild. "One student started the

program with a 1.5 grade point average. After working with the Q2E teachers, her grade point is greatly improved and she is a mentor for younger students."

During the 2016-17 school year and summer, Q2E will continue to guide the students as they pursue their interests in the computer science field. The pro-

gram will also continue to provide tutoring in all subjects. All students, ages 10-18 are welcome to participate in the Learning Center. There is no cost to participate.

Landfill warehouse destroyed in 4-alarm fire on Sunday

The Northville Fire Department provided mutual aid to Salem Township and five other area fire departments in response to a four-alarm fire Sunday afternoon at the Great Lakes Recycling facility located near the Arbor Hills Landfill.

Northville Fire Chief Steve Ott said the first alarm came in about 4 p.m. and his crews responded with one truck and five firefighters to the outbuilding at 10833 Five Mile in Salem Township. The facility, closed on Sundays, is one of six operated by Great Lakes and processed recycled paper, cardboard and plastics according to information on the website.

Heavy black smoke was seen coming from the sheet metal structure when the first call came in to the Salem Township Fire Department in Washtenaw County, Ott said.

Because there are no fire hydrants in Salem Township, fire officials sought

permission to hook up to nearby Northville Township fire hydrants according to Northville Township Director of Public Safety John Werth and Fire Chief Brent Siegel, but did not request mutual aid from the fire department located on Six Mile Road. Ott said they had to establish a tanker shuttle and 2000-gallon tanker trucks continuously filled the fire engine pumpers working at the scene.

In addition to Northville City Fire Department, Salem Township, Lyon Township, Ann Arbor, Ann Arbor Township, Pittsfield Township and Canton Township provided mutual aid at the blaze.

Ott said he was not yet aware of any probable cause and there were no reported injuries.

Northville Township Supervisor Robert Nix was at the scene of the fire. The landfill was not affected by the fire.
