Jury finds former Inkster officer guilty in beating

Former Inkster Police Ofc William Melendez was found guilty of two felonies and remanded to jail last Wednesday in Wayne County Circuit Court.

A jury of eight women and four men fremd Melendez milh of misconduct in office, a five-year felony and assault with intent to do great bodily harm less than murder, a 10-year felony. The charges stemmed from a traffic stop Jan. 28 in Inkster when patrol car video showed Melendez, 47, pulling Floyd Dent 58 from his car wrestling him to the ground and then striking him with his closed fist 16 times while restraining him in what appears to be a chokehold. Other Infester officers commuter officers are seen on the tape kicking Dent viciously and using a taser on him.

Wayne County Prosecute Kym Worthy issued a statement Rym Worthy issued a statement following the verdict noting, "The jury's verdict in this case is important because it shows that police brutality cannot and will not be tolerated."

Worthy's office dropped all charges, including cocaine pos-session, against Dent when her office was provided a copy of the patrol car videotape, something officers did not send with the original warrant request. Earlier, 22nd District Court Judge 22nd District Court Judge Sabrina Johnson dropped attempted escape charges against Dent when she viewed the tape. While Melendez and other officers claimed Dent was using cocaine and had the drug ision when he was arrested, no evidence of any drug use was found by the office

ADHD is a common and very real dical condition that impacts numer numer-ous children with displays of hyperactivi-ty, inattention and impulsiveness. These symptoms often take a toll on a child's social and emotional life, and leave parents looking for ways to make things easi er both in and out of school.

Amanda Lawson, a nurse practi at the Begumont Center for Expentional is, says there are a lot of popular sconceptions about ADHD. "It is a very real, very com

She recommends establishing r tines and breaking down tasks into small-er steps in order to help children estab lish healthy and effective habits that could have a positive, long-term impact on their overall health. "It takes about 30 days to build a habit, but only one day to tags to bind a natif, out only one day to break it," she added. Litogot's 14-year-old daughter has been working with her par-ents and teachers to find strategies for tents and totacners to find strangest for the classroom and at home. For example, she and her mom made a supply box to help her at school and they've also tweaked their routine at home in order to provide a quiet, distruction free environ-ment to help improve her study habits. While these tactics are easy to incorpowhile take tacks are easy to incorpo-rate into a regular day. Litogot says the most effective tactic is asking her daugh-ter her opinion about what would best help in school.

"Listen to your kid," she said. "Listen to what they say and learn about what they find to be hard and what they think might help. They usually have a lot of great ideas about what works for and motivates them." In her work with par-ents, Lawson emphasizes the importance
