Township OK's \$14.9 million budget

The Plymouth Township Board of Trustees has approved a \$14.4 million budget by a 5-2 vote.

Casting the no votes on the new budget and spending plan were trustees Chuck Curmi and Bob Doroshevich.

The new budget includes plans to hire more public safety employees in both the police and fire departments using money cut from other line-item spending. The budget also includes adding a \$81,000 surplus to the \$3.9 million general fund balance.

Curmi said that his objections to the plans to hire more police and firefighters were based on an old-model fire department that does not promote regionalization and cooperation. He said he opposed the possible hiring of three firefighters as the township recently

increased the fire department by three new hires when Station 2 was reopened this fall.

Township Supervisor Kurt Heise supported the budget as did Clerk Jerry Verba, Treasurer Mark Clinton and trustees Gary Helman and Jack Dempsey. Heise noted that the bond rating for the township had been upgraded to AA-plus, which means better interest rates for financing. He said the new rating was due to the strong budgeting process now in place in the township.

That budgeting process is

now a zero-based plan which Heise said he examined line by line and made cuts to nearly 90 percent of spending plans. Those cuts included the elimination of a new economic development position, a reduction in part-time employees and changes to planning department personnel.

While the budget includes funding for three firefighters and three police officers, a decision on those hirings will wait until an evaluation of the shared services agreement with Northville Township at Fire

Station No. 2. Heise said that the township will also evaluate the current situation with Huron Valley Ambulance, a matter of contention with fire department employees for some time.

Clinton suggested that the addition of the 1 percent administration fee on tax bills, expected to generate \$640,000 in revenue, might alleviate Curmi's stated concerns about retiree costs and funding for capital improvements. Clinton added that the anticipated revenue would go into the general fund and could be used for public safety.

The budget did not include any changes to the township owned Hilltop Golf Course, which has been the subject of public criticism at meetings. An analysis by Plante Moran stated that the facility will lose more than \$300,000 by the end of 2020.

Ringing success Salvation Army Red Kettle effort continues

Volunteer bell ringers are still needed for the Salvation Army Christmas Fundraising Campaign in the Belleville, Canton, Northville and Plymouth service area.

Officials from the organization said the group had collected \$10,800 of the \$225,000 Red Kettle Campaign goal for this year. Donations are "on pace with last year's collections" representatives said. These donations last year provided groceries and provisions for about 150 local families to prepare a traditional Thanksgiving meal.

"We live in a great community that cares for others, said Major Keith Bailey, corps officer of the Salvation Army Plymouth Corps. "The Salvation Army could not do what it does without the generous support our neighbors and our local businesses."

Overall, The Salvation Army in the Metro Detroit area is looking to raise \$7.85 million during the Christmas season from Nov. 1 through Jan. 31, 2018.

Founded by William and Catherine Booth in London, England in 1865, The Salvation Army is a faith-based, non-profit organization dedicated to serving people in need without discrimination.

Restoration expenses of the home which dates from 1865 were estimated at \$750,000 by Ed Funke, representing the Guidobonos at the Nov. 15 meeting of the commission.

A report from consulting engineers hired by the Guidobonos stated that restoration would require a



total rebuild and recommended the structure be razed. A second engineering report, funded and hired by the commissioners, also determined that the structure had serious foundation and other problems but did not suggest razing the house but rather addressing the problems in the near term to prevent further deterioration.

Funke said the house presents a safety hazard and is not in the best interest of the community. Opponents of the demolition of the old house claim it would be a loss of a historic building and could set a precedent for other demolitions of historic sites.

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Fate of historic house weighed

Time continues to pass by for a home built during the 1800s in Northville.

The fate of the structure will be the topic of a hearing Dec. 20 during the meeting of the Historic District Commission. Owners of the house have requested permission to demolish the structure at 341 East Main and erect a three-story, 12,000 square foot office and condominium building.

The last occupant of the building was McGuire's Fine Art Gallery.

An earlier hearing in September did not result in any decision on the request from Eric and Renee Guidobono who purchased the

house last December for \$460,000 with the intent, they said, to establish their building company offices in the house. When renovations began, however, the couple said, the plan was cost prohibitive as the house was badly deteriorated and had warped floors, an unstable roof and foundation insufficiencies.

Winterfest parade to welcome Santa

Entries for the parade are now being accepted at the Belleville Area Chamber of Commerce, 248 Main St., Belleville, 48111.

Rules for parade entries require that the vehicle must be decorated with working lights. Vehicles with headlights that remain should cover them during participation as headlights distract other participants and judges. Music, however, is welcomed.

Each entry will be evaluated based on theme and use of lights. A minimum of 1000 lights is suggested. Any color or clear lights is acceptable.

Chamber of commerce officials reserve the right to reject any entry that is not in good taste, inappropriate, or not in the best interest of the parade. All entries should be properly identified with signs or banners with the name of the organization so spectators and the announcer can identify the entry.

Only one powered vehicle per entry will be permitted.

Equestrian and animal units must provide their own accompanying clean up personnel and equipment. Those will be a vehicle

or carriage, must have lights on it to go through the parade.

All parade participants are required to conduct themselves in such a manner as not to infringe on the rights of those people living along the parade route.

No Santas or Mrs. Claus please as the "real" Santa and Mrs. Claus have been invited to join the event.

The parade will step off from Belleville High School at 6 p.m.

All participants in walking entries must carry lights or have a trailer pulling them with lights on it. Walkers could have flashlights or pins that light up their clothing.

All generators for floats should be hidden from sight and confined to a small area to eliminate noise. The individual operating the float should determine where that would be.

Santa Claus will be at the First United Methodist Church after the parade to greet children and hand out stockings.

Line up for parade participants will begin at 3:30 p.m. on Davis Street behind Belleville High School.

The City of Northville has now received 12 consecutive Distinguished Budget Presentation Awards from the Government Finance Officers Association.

The 12th award was presented for fiscal year 2017 to Sandi Wiktorowski last month. Wiktorowski is the finance director/treasurer in the city. She and several department leaders worked to accomplish the goal under the direction of City Manager Pat Sullivan.

According to a prepared statement from the Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA), the award represents a significant achievement that reflects the commitment of the governing body and staff to meeting the highest principles of governmental budgeting. The City of Northville met the nationally recognized guidelines for effective budget presentation.

which requires that a budget be developed to serve in four categories: as a policy document, financial plan, operations guide and communications device. A panel of independent judges reviewed the budgets to ensure they adhered to 27 nationally recognized guidelines within those four categories, according to the prepared release.

The GFOA professional association serves nearly 19,000 appointed and elected government officials at the local, state and provincial level, and other finance practitioners, according to the website. The organization noted that award recipients, 1,800 for budgets beginning in 2017, have pioneered efforts to improve the quality of budgeting and provide an excellent example for other governments throughout North America.

Board criticized for program cancellation

To the editor:
It was recently announced that the successful John Glenn Scholars program would no longer continue.

As a Scholars board member, I am deeply disappointed that the students of John Glenn will be denied the opportunity to be challenged by this program. The decision to end the program was very difficult, but necessary.

As was reported by The Eagle, the founders and financial supporters of the Scholars program, Mr. and Mrs. Shaw, no longer received the staff support that was promised when approached to start the program. The Scholars program was a collaboration of staff, students and parents. The success of the program can be traced to the leadership and enthusiasm of John Glenn's school psychologist and the scores of staff who served as mentors. The former superintendent, with the support of the board of education, was responsible for the demise of the Scholars program. The withdrawal of staff support made it impossible to continue the program.

The success of the Scholars program can be denied. By any metric, the program was not only improving student grade point averages, but also changing lives. One only had to attend an awards banquet to understand how meaningful and life-changing the experience was for both students and mentors. These banquets were the largest gathering of students, parents and staff outside of graduation.

This program realized significant student academic success through its ALL IN behavior by its founders, students and parents. It is shocking that members of the board of education who were present at the banquets did not stand up for the program instead of acquiescing to the actions of the former superintendent.

As a former 11-year school board member, I believed it was essential for each board member to think for themselves and make decisions in the best interests of students. In this case, the members of the Wayne-Westland School Board chose to follow the lead of the superintendent instead of supporting the students of John Glenn.

By all accounts, the Scholars program has not only impacted academic grades, it has created a high school culture supportive of academic achievement. It is sad to think that half of Wayne-Westland's high school students will not have available to them this outstanding academic program. More than 600 John Glenn students each semester will be denied the opportunity to have an academic and personal development mentor.

If, as a school board member, I was made aware of a high school program that produced significant academic results, engaged students, teachers, and parents, resulted in a positive change to the school culture and was accomplished with limited funds, I would have said I'm ALL IN. Seldom does a program like John Glenn Scholars come along, it is a shame that the Wayne-Westland Board of Education wasn't ALL IN.
