from the Government Finance Officers Association (GPOA), the award represents a significant achievement that reflects the commitment of the governing body and staff to meeting the highest principles of governmental budgeting. tion, which requires that a budget be developed to serve in four categories: as a policy document, financial plan, opera-tions guide and communications device.
