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Future of golf course discussed

Township Trustee Bob Doroshewitz urged the board to examine all possible solutions before closing the golf course.

During a meeting last week, Township Supervisor Kurt Heise told members of the board of trustees that the township does not have the funding for those requested improvements. Representatives from the management company have said the course would be more attractive to golfers with the improvements helping reverse the annual financial losses.

Heise told the board members that the financial losses at the course could not continue while he was convinced that the golf course employees were "doing the best they can with

what they've got."

He suggested that golf courses are being repurposed by communities and that the Hilltop site might be a recreational area to be used for walking, jogging, bike and cross-country skiing, with paths, green space, pavilions and other amenities.

He suggested forming a committee including township trustees and residents to examine possible uses for the site should township officials decide to close the golf course.

Township Trustee Bob Doroshewitz urged the board to examine all possible solutions

before closing the golf course. Trustee Chuck Curnl urged the board members and the audience members not to interpret the discussion as a death sentence for the golf course.

Heise also suggested selling off a portion of the land on the southernmost section of the golf course for development of condominiums. He said he estimated the township could realize \$2 million from the sale of that section of the property.

Treasurer Mark Clinton suggested that residents were already concerned regarding worsening traffic congestion throughout the township as more homes are constructed.

Heise said that no decision had been made but the management contract with Billy Casper will expire in March of 2019 and the township is required to provide the company with 120 days notice if officials opt not to renew the agreement.

Philharmonic conductor's contract

The Michigan Philharmonic has signed a three-year contract extension with Music Director and Conductor Nan Washburn. Now in her 12th season with the Michigan Philharmonic, Washburn has led the organization's evolution into one of the most innovative and dynamic professional symphony orchestras in the region since her arrival in 1999, noted Beth Stewart, executive director of the Michigan Philharmonic.

The winner of The American Prize in Orchestral Conducting, professional division, in 2013 and 18 ASCAP Awards for Adventurous Programming from the League of American Orchestras, Washburn is one of the most innovative conductors working in the United States today. For her engaging performances and leading-edge approach to concert programming, critics have hailed her work as having "perspicacity, verve, imagination and all-around savvy." Under her direction, the Michigan Philharmonic has garnered national awards

and recognition, winning six ASCAP awards from the League of American Orchestras as well as First Place in the prestigious American Prize for professional orchestras in 2016, Stewart continued.

Before being recruited to Michigan from California, Washburn served as artistic director and conductor of the West Hollywood Orchestra for five years; music director of Orchestra Sonoma, the Camella Symphony, and the San Francisco State University Symphony Orchestra. Washburn first came to national attention as a co-founder, the artistic director, and associate conductor of the San Francisco-based Women's Philharmonic from 1980 to 1990, during which time she became one of the leading authorities on and advocates for orchestral works of women composers. For her pioneering work in this field, she was awarded the WIA - Joanne C. Rae Award for Advancement of Women's Culture.

Michigan Philharmonic on the map by working with and performing works by many of the leading composers in the U.S. today, including Joseph Schwantner, William Bolcom, Libby Larsen, John Corigliano, Chen Yi, Lou Harrison, Tobias Picker, Michael Daugherty, Jennifer Higdon, Gabriela Lena Frank, Andre Myers and Michael Gilbertson, Stewart said.

"We are thrilled to engage Nan for another three years and the artistic head of our organization," said Stewart. "Nan brings the background and artistic leadership we need as the organization enters an exciting phase with the possibility of having a performance home for the orchestra."

As the Plymouth Arts & Recreation Complex, which houses the administrative offices of the Michigan Phil and 36 other arts and recreational organizations, plans to renovate and expand the facility, a new performing arts center is one of the goals of the project, Stewart said.

"Having a performing arts center right in the heart of our hometown of Plymouth would be a dream come true for the Michigan Philharmonic," Washburn said. "It is something we have waited so long for and would be a perfect way to celebrate my two decades with the orchestra."



Philharmonic awards teen scholarship

The Michigan Philharmonic has awarded a full year String Fellowship to Rachel Browning, bassist with the Michigan Philharmonic Youth Orchestra.

Browning is a senior at Plymouth High School and has been studying and playing the double bass for seven years. She joined the Michigan Philharmonic Youth Sinfonia in 2012 and became the principle bassist for the Michigan Philharmonic Youth Symphony in 2013. She is also the principle bassist for the Plymouth-Canton Educational Park (PCEP) orchestra.

An accomplished musician, Browning has received a number one rating for three consecutive years at the Michigan State Band and Orchestra Association solo and ensemble state competition and was selected as a member of the Michigan Honors Orchestra for the Michigan Youth Arts Festival in the spring of 2017. To broaden her experi-

ence with the bass, she participates in multiple pit orchestras and joined the John Coltrane Jazz Band at PCEP.

Browning said she is excited about her upcoming senior year in high school and plans to continue to her study of music and the double bass in college.

The Michigan Philharmonic String Fellowship is an award given to an advanced string player in the Michigan Philharmonic Youth Orchestra. Winners of the Fellowship have the opportunity to perform with the Michigan Philharmonic on several concerts per year and receive a stipend for their work.

"We have never awarded the string fellowship to a bass player before and we are excited that Rachel is such an accomplished musician," said Michigan Philharmonic Youth Orchestra conductor Holger Qyfel.

The Michigan Philharmonic Youth Orchestra was founded in 2003 and has

grown significantly since its inception. Currently the youth orchestra consists of more than 135 students in five different ensembles - two levels of beginning and intermediate strings, the Chamber Winds, the Flute Choir and the full Youth Symphony. Students have the opportunity to give two performances on a professional stage at the Village Theater in Canton in addition to side-by-side performances with the Michigan Philharmonic for the two upper ensembles.

School district names new operations director

Northville Public Schools have a new director of operations.

District officials have hired Steven Banercho for the position, replacing Chris Gearms who announced his retirement after 20 years at the helm of the Maintenance and Operations Department for the district.

During the two decades of his leadership, Gearms oversaw building maintenance during periods of significant reductions in school funding, assisted with the transition to contracting of trans-

portation and custodial services, and provided leadership in the implementation of Sinking Fund dollars toward facility needs, explained Superintendent of Schools Mary Kay Gallagher.

She said that following a thorough search and interview process, the district selected Banercho for the director's position.

Banercho comes to Northville Public Schools with 18 years of experience as a construction project manager for McCarthy & Smith, Inc., in Farmington

Hills, specializing in the planning, budgeting, and construction of educational facilities, Gallagher said. Banercho has a bachelor's degree from Michigan Technological University and a master's degree from Eastern Michigan University in Civil Engineering and Construction Management.

"Steve is a Northville community member and school parent, who most recently volunteered his time and expertise in co-chairing the district Facility Review/Bond Study Committee. His

expertise in facilities and construction will be of great benefit to the district as we move forward with the implementation of Bond 2017 projects, and in overseeing facility operations and maintenance district-wide," Gallagher said.

"As we welcome Steve to the Northville Public Schools team, I also want to take the opportunity to thank Chris Gearms for his 20 years of service, and his gracious offer to make himself available as needed to support the transition process," she concluded.

Local teacher to travel to Finland

One Wayne teacher will be providing guidance to a whole different group of "students" this month.

Jacqueline St. Antoine, a dual-diagnosis teacher at Franklin Middle School in Wayne, will travel to Tampere, Finland to present information at an international conference of educators regarding teaching students with cognitive impairments and social/emotional/behavioral deficits.

"I'll be attending the Art, Ecopsychology, and Education Conference at the University of Tampere," St. Antoine explained. "My presentation is on Ecopsychology Education and Disability. Ecopsychology Education is an approach to teaching that is concerned with an ecological analysis and pedagogy of responsibility to develop citizens who are prepared to support and achieve diverse, democratic, and sustainable societies," she said. "In short, Ecopsychology Education is an approach focused on relationship building, place-based learning, increasing engagement, and fostering community. It focuses on building partnerships between students, families, schools, and the outside community. Typically, this approach has not included individuals with disabilities."

Three years ago, St. Antoine and Amanda Meyers began Franklin United, a student-led inclusion program at Franklin Middle School. Franklin United includes a variety of activities like unified athletics during the school day to bring together general and special education students. This year, the educators are planning unified basketball and unified bowling. Each

spring they have a unified field day.

Aside from athletics, Franklin United students create videos promoting respect and positivity within the school.

"We also hold an annual pledge campaign where students sign and commit to respect and include others," St. Antoine said.

"We have increased participation by 400 percent in the last three years. Students are motivated to make a difference, take ownership in their school, and to lead," she said. "Franklin United's goal is to develop pride in our students for their school community while promoting inclusion and acceptance."

"When students care about their school and their community, they are more engaged. Students can develop relationships that make school a safer, more joyful, and more supportive place. When families see their students as a part of a community, they feel more positive and invited into the school culture," she said.

St. Antoine's students have started a class named called Next Cafe where they sell breakfast and beverages to the staff at the school to help finance their fundraising and service learning efforts.

The staff supports the Franklin United effort too.

"This winter we will be holding a fundraiser for Special Olympics Polar Plunge - our principals Stacy Williamson and Debra Pringle will be getting taped up! I'll be jumping into Lake Bellevoe this February for our team. We also do a community service project each year, which

has been building and maintaining a memorial garden," she added.

St. Antoine has taught at Franklin Middle School for six years and is in her eighth year with Wayne-Westland Community Schools. She is also completing a doctorate in educational studies with an emphasis on urban education and focus on disability studies at Eastern Michigan University and is an adjunct professor at the college in the special education department.

"The work I have been doing centers on the need for community-based partnerships. Ecopsychology education, and democratic schooling to be more inclusive of individuals with disabilities. Wayne-Westland is one of the largest hubs for students with special needs in the state. We are truly leaders among low-incidence areas. I am advocating for the need to include individuals with disabilities in more community-based school efforts. Using an Ecopsychology framework, I believe this is a real possibility," St. Antoine said.

She is one of the very few scholars bringing together disability and Ecopsychology.

"I love Wayne-Westland Schools. It has been my home, and I am committed to serving Wayne Westland Community Schools. We are doing great work here. I want to do more of that important work," she said. "Very few programs of this type are fully inclusive of students with significant disabilities; I want to be on the forefront of developing such a program here."
